There she placed it to "William Preston, Plasterer, Eugene Or."

Four days later G. W. Plaster called at the Eugene office, and the clerk thoughtlessly handed out Preston's mail. The reason is obvious to all, and Plaster took it over to his clothes-making establishment and opened it. "Ere reading it, however, a customer came in, and the missive was thrust into a dry shaving mug, where it remained till the next day, when it was taken out and "contentedly" perused and lively sketches that although he had discovered the mistake, Plaster showed its sacred contents to all the bums in town, and finally gave it to Preston, who, having read of the incident, called for the letter. The barber tried to send it to the post office, but he intended to mail it, but Mr. Preston could not see it in that way and caused Plaster's arrest.

Exposition in a Separator. The Salem Journal says: Last Monday evening while the men on Mont Savage's place on Howell prairie, an explosion took place in G. W. Woodworth's separator. A ROBBERY PREVENTED.

Brave Little Mrs. Donaldson Stands Off Two Thieves. Portland Telegram. About 7 o'clock last night two men, one heavy set the other slimly built, drove up to Donaldson's butcher shop. The smaller man alighted, entered the shop and purchased 10 cents worth of meat. For payment he tendered a \$20 gold piece, but the proprietor Donaldson declined to change it, saying that it would take all his small change. He then produced a \$10 gold piece, and Donaldson started to the safe to make the change. No sooner had he opened the safe than the man presented a revolver to his head and told him to deliver the money he had in the safe. Just then Mrs. Donaldson, who is little, but plucky, entered and grasping the would-be robber by the arm declared that she should not rob her husband. The rascal turned upon the little woman and pointed the revolver at her, but she did not seem worth a cent and struggled with her assailant. Just then the man who was left outside came into the shop and took a hand in the battle. The husband and wife, however made it too hot for them, and they jumped into the buggy and drove off. Mrs. Donaldson followed a short distance and saw them drive across the steel bridge into Portland. The matter has been reported to the police station in this city, and a description of the men furnished.

Spars for China. The Oregonian says that on his last trip to Hong Kong, Captain C. M. Moyes received a special order for \$200,000 worth of spars for the Hong Kong and Whampoa Dock Company. The Coloma is now taking these spars on board at Smith's mill. They are of larger size than the Coloma usually carries to that market, being about thirty two inches in diameter and 100 feet long, and suitable for the lower masts of ships. The Coloma will sail about October 20, and a full list of cabin passengers has already been booked. The cabin passengers will come back and will give such accounts of their trip to the city as will want to go and before long the cabin of the Coloma will have to be enlarged.

All had a good word for Oregon and intend to return, excepting one man, and on being questioned he admitted that he owed money here and could not come back if he would.

The Electric Light as an Insecticide. But few are aware of the enormous destruction of insects effected by the electric light. A German entomologist has been investigating and reports that he has found that as many as 33,000 are destroyed in one night by a single gl. light. Insects must be more plentiful in Germany than here to furnish such an item. But there is no question but that the electric light might be made of great use in destroying many noxious insects which infest our gardens and fields. Mosquitoes, however, and grapevine pests and the pestiferous potato-bug seem to be too wise to be thus ensnared. The chief species which succumb to the wires of the electric light are gnats and midges.
