Arrested for Embezzlement.

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—Walter Potter and W. D. Lovell, of Potter, Lovell & Co., were arrested on the charge of embezzlement and larceny of \$25,000 worth of bonds of the Edgill company and held in \$75,000 bail. Both furnished bonds. The money was paid.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—The time for making a payment by the English syndicate for the Philadelphia brewery, in this city, expired to-day, and the money was paid over about noon. The amount was \$1,000,000 cash in 10-cent bonds for the remainder.

WIRE CLIPPINGS.

The Paris Siecle recently published a statement that Rochefort drew 200,000 francs from the Boston city treasury. Rochefort denied the statement and demands the paper to retract it. He has also written to Duchess Duses, who is said to have given largely to the fund, asking her to deny the story.

Three of the La Plata, Buenos Ayres, ministers have resigned. General Baez failed to arrange matters at Entre Rios, and has returned to this city.

Special Supervisor Wardle, of the census department, gave out the figures of the recount in St. Paul as 133,301. St. Paul's increase since 1880 is 91,483 or 223.83 per cent.

President Fitzgerald, of the Irish National League, received a cablegram from Timothy Harrington, saying that John Dillon, William O'Brien, T. P. Gill and himself would sail for America early in October.

Rufus H. King, president of the Catskill New York Savings bank, died suddenly, aged 70. He was a member of the Forty-third congress in 1880, and was one of the thirty-eight supporters of the republican national convention.

Saturday night's frost was general throughout the Northwest, and in some places snow fell. Three inches of snow fell near Bismarck, and Ashland, Wis., reports that two inches fell last night, but little damage was done. Late garden truck suffered somewhat in both Dakota. All of Minnesota and Wisconsin were in the frost and snow belt last night, although the most damage was probably done in Iowa.

An Ellensburg, Wash., dispatch says that eight hundred feet of track, a large number of ties and several ties, near the east mouth of the tunnel, were destroyed this afternoon by a fire. The eastbound passenger train is indefinitely delayed. A large force has been sent up to repair the damage.

In the Russell-Gray fracas in Eugene, last Saturday, the examination resulted in Russell being released and Gray being bound over to the next term of court.

The boiler of a switch engine exploded in East St. Louis, blowing Engineer Barrett and Fireman Daugherty into fragments. The train was wrecked.

At Tacoma George Fritz, aged 6 years, lost an eye, and Emma Jarry, his playmate, received a painful wound in the hand, by the explosion of a cartridge which one of the children struck with a hammer.

The Mexican war veterans held

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SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—Grand Master Williamson of the Brotherhood of Railroad Brakemen, and leading representatives of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, the Brotherhood of Conductors and the Brotherhood of Switchmen, the organizations to which the Southern Pacific employees belong, were in conference with General Manager Fillmore and other officials to-day, regarding the reconstruction of a higher basis of company payroll. Schedules prepared by the division superintendent, which differ according to conditions on various actions, were considered at length, and by the time negotiations were ended the men will all be getting better pay. The company did not oppose the men when it was learned that they would strike unless the demands were met. This morning the session of the locomotive firemen's convention was largely taken up in consideration of the report of the beneficiary claims committee. A resolution was unanimously passed strongly condemning the unauthorized strikes. This afternoon's session was devoted to clearing up miscellaneous business, and to the election and installing of the grand officers. The convention closed to-night. Tomorrow the delegates will embark on an excursion to Mount Shasta, then they will go to Los Angeles and thence to their respective homes.

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MIZNER IS SILENT.

Mexican and Central American Affairs.

LONDON PISTOL PRACTICE.

Ghost of the Cronin Case—Mexican Assassinations—A Sensational Case—The Triple Alliance.

Washington, Sept. 15.—It is said that the Mexican government has received in the Guatemalan mail yesterday from Minister Mizner respecting the Cronin case, and so there is nothing officially known about the matter.

Assistant Secretary Wharton expressed some surprise at the failure to receive an account of the recent stirring events in Central America. It was confidently expected the steamer which sailed from Guatemala after the attempted assassination of Mizner would bring particulars of the shooting, but the department is still without information on the subject.

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HARDSHIPS AT SEA.

An Oregonian Concludes to Suicide Off this Mortal Coil.

AFTER THE SMOUGLERS.

The Switchman Concludes—The Key Oregon State Fair—For Universal Safety—Hasket for Damage.

New York, Sept. 15.—The captain of the steamer Normandie reports yesterday afternoon that he sighted the American ship Challenger flying signals of distress. He sent a boat to her through the howling storm.

Captain Thompson, of the Challenger, reported that during a terrific hurricane on September 1, 12 of his crew were washed overboard. A majority of the remainder were too ill to work. In addition to the 12 men killed four had their arms and legs broken, leaving but four men to work the ship. The Challenger was terribly crippled.

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
