WHAT ALBANY IS DOING.

Some of the Great Advantages That Are Making it Prominent.

The big manufacturing edition of the Oregonian, issued yesterday, has this to say in regard to Albany, besides a summary of the annual output of our factories: Albany is the gem of the valley. A vast agricultural country is tributary to it. It is a natural distributing point, and its jobbers are reaching out in all directions for trade. It is the junction of the southern Pacific and Oregon Pacific lines, the latter of which will be a trans-continental line when the Chicago and North-western connects with it. Twenty-six regular trains arrive and depart daily. Albany possesses a magnificent water power. It is furnished by the Albany Sanitarium water district—a canal with a capacity of 20,000,000 gallons per minute, constructed from a point on the south side of the city, some 14 miles distant, to the southeast of this place, and within the same distance to the city. This canal divides into two branches, one flowing directly north and emptying into the Willamette, and the other east down Eighth street to Thurston street, thence running north with said street and emptying into the Willamette river near the north end of the city. From this lower branch three lateral branches are let off, running down Ferry, Broadalbin and Lyon streets. Between the point where the upper branch of said canal flows into the Calapooia and the lower branch into the Willamette, there is over a mile of water front with high banks. A canal can be obtained at any point within these limits of from 25 to 35 feet; and from the lower branch near its mouth, water can, with the same advantages be conducted for half a mile farther down the river. At 25 miles from the Falls, a quarter of a mile south of the city, furnishes 2,000 horsepower. But a small portion of this power is utilized at the present time, and should occasion demand, the capacity of the canal can be doubled, thus furnishing ample water power, the cheapest and the best, for all the demands of a Lowell or a Manchester.

TERMS OF INTEREST.

Astoria has raised the subsidy for the electric railway from the city across the peninsula to Youngs river, and the work will probably be pushed to completion.

On John Day's river, back of Astoria, where prospecting for coal is going on, the drill has reached 200 feet, and penetrated small seams of the coveted article.

The Goldendale Gazette says a swarm of bees have recently taken possession of a chimney in the house of Mr. John K. Eaton in Vancouver, and have come industriously to work putting up their winter stock of honey. When Mr. Eaton gets hungry for honey, all that will be necessary will be to cut a small fire in the chimney and as the honey melts and runs over he can catch it in a dropping can.

Articles of incorporation of the Eastern Oregon co-operative association, Patrons of Husbandry, have been filed in the clerk's office at the Dalles. The object of the association is for the purpose of carrying general merchandise, farm implements and handling all the supplies of the farm. The capital stock \$4,000.

A most terrible accident is reported from near Seattle in which an unknown man, whose name is given as John K. Eaton, was killed by a runaway horse. The horse, a brown one, was in the harness of a stagecoach, and when the driver, seeing the horse had become unmanageable, jumped to his feet and escaped into the bushes, but later when the 2 o'clock passenger came along at the rate of 25 miles an hour the same man sprang from the harness in front of the engine. In an instant he was caught, his legs and arms crushed and ground, his head horribly mashed and mutilated, and his body cut in two pieces. The man was not destined for money, as found in pieces of his clothing and flesh, scattered along the track for thirty yards. No letters were found on the remains and his identity is unknown.

SUDDEN DEATH AT ECHO.

Jordan Cooper, Falls to the Floor Dead After Smoking a Pipe.

A man named J. G. Cooper died suddenly at Echo, Oregon, Friday. He arrived at that place in the morning from Weston with his wife, on horseback. They had a pack animal, and their three horses were turned loose in a pasture. They then went to camp in a little cabin across the river from town and Mrs. Cooper prepared dinner. Her husband partook heartily of the meal placed before him and set down to smoke, much against his wife's wishes, as his smoking always produced a violent fit of coughing. A few minutes after he had finished his pipe he began to cough, and blood issued from his mouth. He arose and went to the door. Just as he reached the threshold he pressed his hands to his chest and exclaimed: "I am gone!" Immediately afterwards falling to the floor. His wife screamed in horror, and her cries were heard by Dr. Morrow of Echo, who crossed the river and arrived just as the unfortunate man breathed his last. His mouth was closed with blood, and it is supposed his death was due to a rupture of an aneurism, causing internal hemorrhage of the lungs. He had complained of pains in his chest for the last two years. His wife is left in destitute circumstances. There are no children. Judge Martin was notified and dispatched Dr. Vincent to Echo to arrange for the burial. The doctor returned on this morning's train. The man whose life ended so suddenly is supposed to be none other than Gordon Cooper, who was arrested at Walla Walla on the charge of murdering a man named Davis and was afterwards released. He had resided at Weston for some years, where he was known as "Jaybird." He formerly lived in the Willamette valley, and is said had the reputation of being a desperado there.

Mr. Cooper, who is well known in Albany, was born and raised in Linn county, and has brothers and sisters here now. His parents are dead.

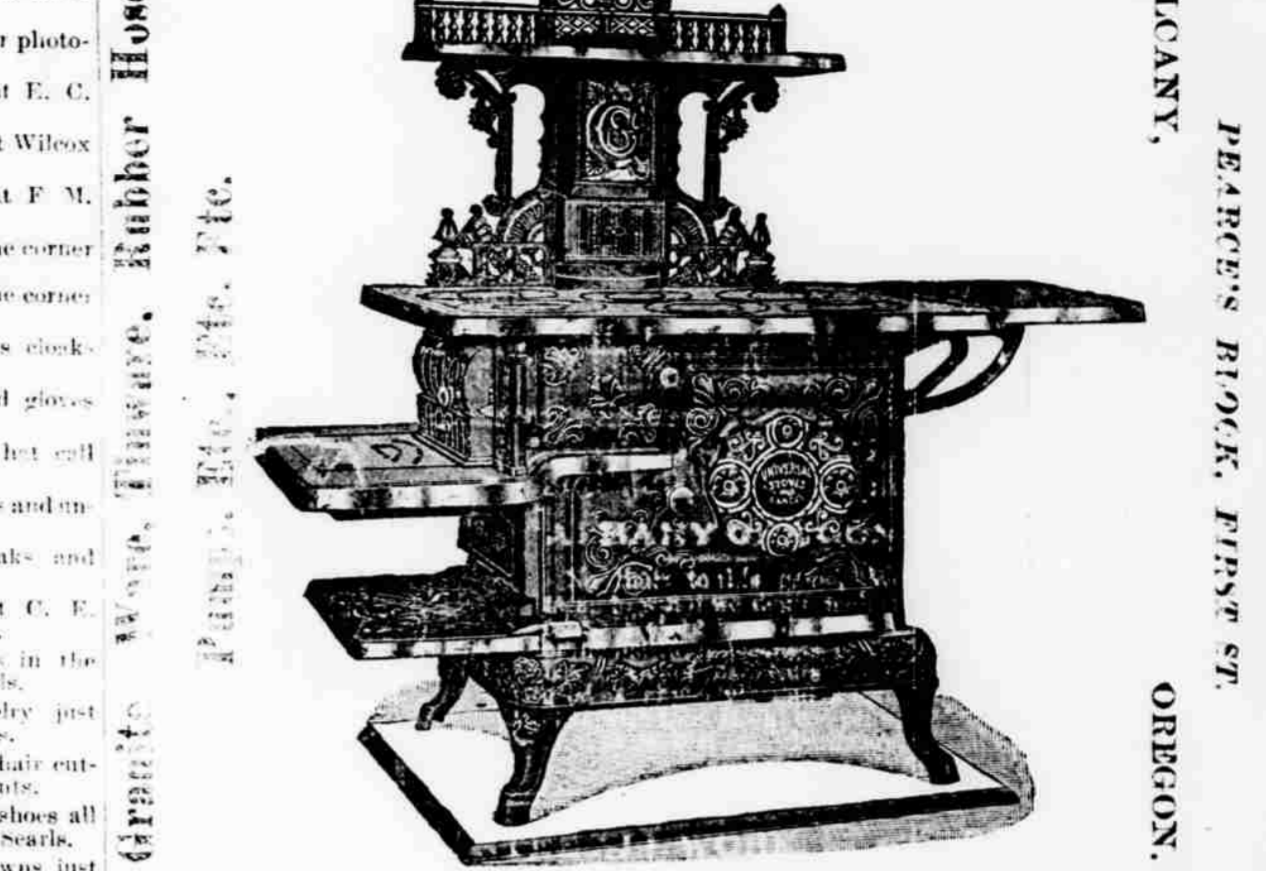

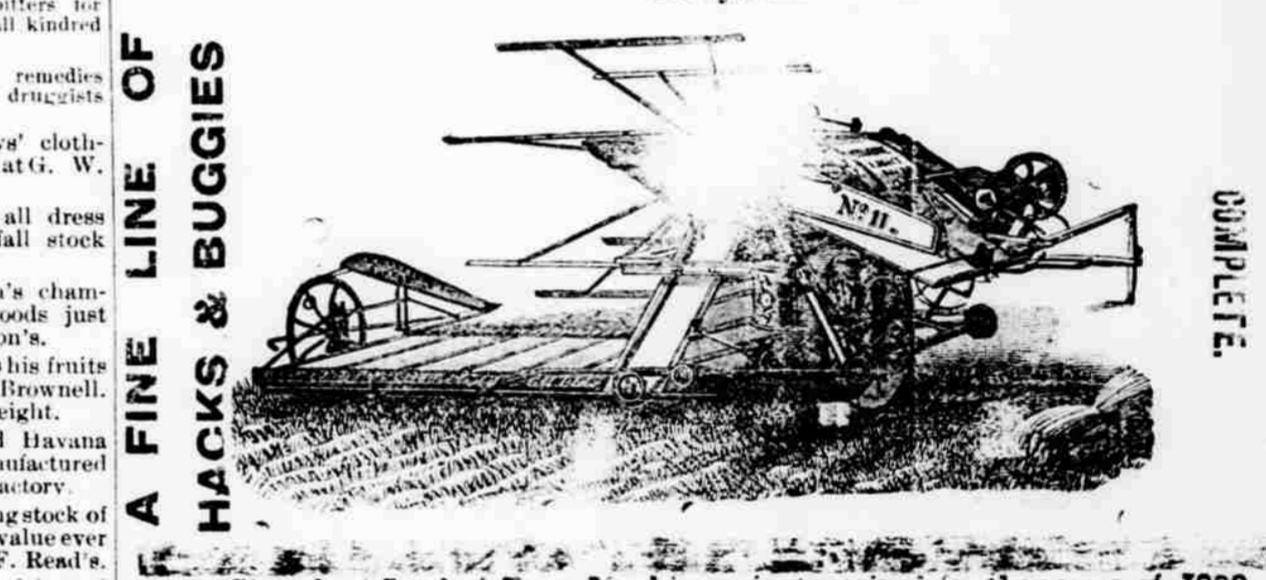
