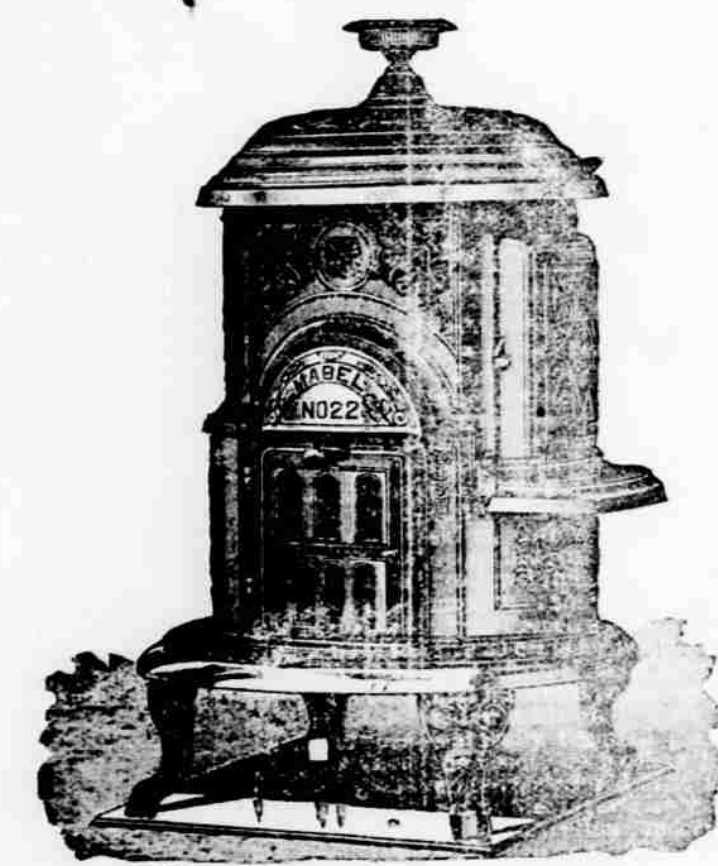

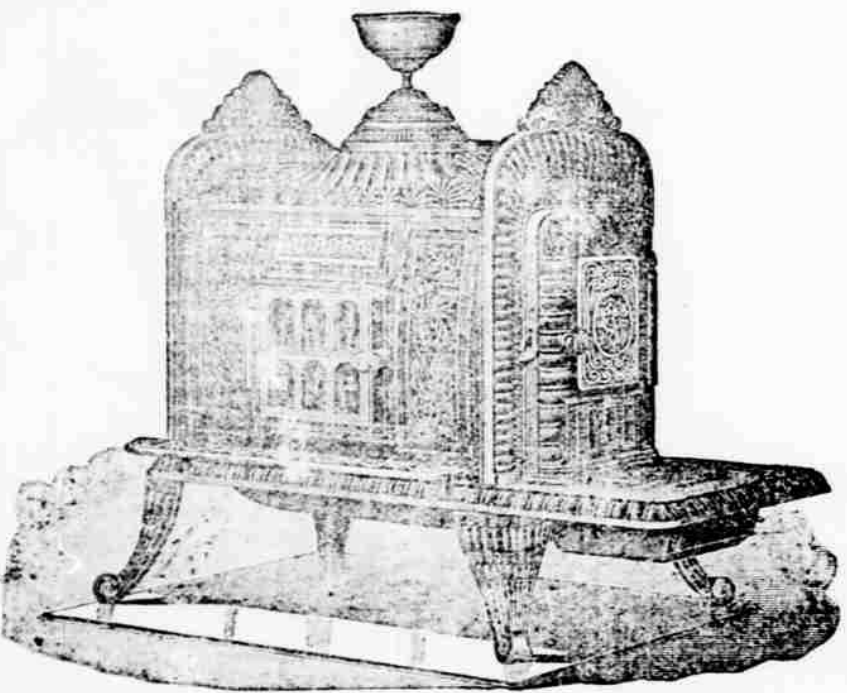

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OREGON'S RECOUNT

Leland Says There Is No Call For It.

THE BIRCHELL TRIAL.

Democratic Representatives Refuse To Vote On Measure On Another Marriage.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—John P. Leland, special agent of the census office, who has been in Portland, Or., looking after the recount of that city and Multnomah county, which was undertaken by the citizens, has returned to the city. He was surprised to learn that positions were coming in from various portions of the state asking for a recount of the entire state. When he left public statements seemed to be satisfied with the recount of Portland and the county where that city is located. The total population is now shown at about 320,000 which will give the state an additional member of congress and this is the main point in the controversy.

Leland says he is opposed to a recount of the state for two reasons:—First: That the figures as now ascertained give the state all the representation that it is entitled to. Second: That the reasons which justified the recount of Portland do not apply to the entire state and a general recount is not warranted by the facts. The secretary of the interior has the matter still under consideration, but it seems highly probable that the conclusion reached will be adverse to ordering a recount of the state.

KILLED HIS SWEETHEART.

Through Muddled Jealousy Stabs Her and Drops Himself.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 23.—A Paris dispatch says: A startling crime has just been brought to light, and heretofore inexplicable disappearances explained. A young girl, who was a favorite of all the students, and often posed as a model. Of the great number of suit as she might have had, she, with the true instinct of the worst one she possibly could have chosen, and to him she pinned her faith. He was Henri Ducazes, and on account of his groundless jealousy, quarrels between the pair were frequent.

Some eight weeks ago Julie spent a joyous evening with a party of lively acquaintances at an open air cafe not far from the Jardins Du Luxembourg. The next day she was seen by a few who knew her, shortly after her breakfast hour, and after that she was missing. Henri, too, was missing, and the associates of the couple speculated as to the probability of their absence, and the chances of their return; but, on the third day, the body of Henri was found floating in the Seine. Then it was found that on the day Julie was last seen, Henri met a friend. The latter noticed blood stains on Henri's clothes and asked him where he got them. With an answering friend, left his friend suddenly. This friend heard no more of Henri till his body was found. Then the police began to search for the missing girl, but their quest did not last long and the affair was forgotten.

Yesterday, however, interest was again revived for in the bushes in the Bois De Verrieres was found the body of Julie with a long slender knife driven through her heart.

A BRUTAL HUSBAND.

Horsewhips His Wife and Threatens to Kill Her.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—A Sunset White Star New York special says that Judge Archer, who has given his wife so much trouble lately, horsewhipped her last night and threatened to shoot her. They live apart, and she is suing for a divorce. Archer climbed through a window of her room at seven o'clock. He then caught his wife by the arm, and pulling a switch from his coat began beating her. At the same time threatening to shoot her. Mrs. Archer's calls for help soon brought neighbors to her assistance. Lawyer Thomas tried to eject the husband, but was warned to keep back. The chief of police tried to coax the judge from his coat, but he refused. He was lodged in jail. He was acquitted only Wednesday last of a charge of assault and battery, preferred against him by his wife.

THE QUEEN COMMANDS.

MONTREAL, Sept. 23.—The case of R. N. O'Brien, arrested on a charge of criminal libel for publishing a story about Prince George having been engaged in a street fight here, which was postponed from Saturday until this morning, was to-day further adjourned until tomorrow morning. It was learned on the best possible authority, that the case will be discontinued.

THE BIRCHELL TRIAL.

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WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—The trial of Birchell was resumed to-day in the presence of large crowds. The prisoner rested well during the night. He rose and dressed with the same care as yesterday. Since last night the suits of the prisoners dock were covered so that the prisoner can be seen from every part of the room. Birchell was calm and pleasant. The first thing at the opening of the court was the presentation of the grand jury findings in the case of Mrs. Birchell, accused of being accessory to the murder of Benwell. The grand jury returned no bill as to her. The first witness was young Pelly, who seemed desirous of telling all he knew of the case. On cross examination Pelly stated that when Birchell and he were practicing signatures in the hotel, Birchell was equally engaged in making sketches in which he is an adept. It was expected that Blackstock would give Pelly a hard time of it on the cross examination, but such was not the case, and all were surprised when the young man was allowed to stand an after fifteen minutes or so of cross examination.

Evidently it is Blackstock's purpose to use the evidence of Pelly as an alibi for the cross examination of the other witnesses. For instance, Pelly was made to state that Birchell wore overalls, which would tend to contradict the evidence of some of the witnesses, who say that his boots were muddy, showing that he had been in the mud who was seen in Benwell's company near the swamp.

Again Pelly admitted that Birchell discussed Benwell's absence quite frequently and showed no more solicitude over the man's luggage than one fellow-ravager would be expected to exhibit at another's belongings. He stated that he (Pelly) himself first suggested the tip to New York in search of Benwell; that they agreed to go there to identify the body and later directed to the original of Pelly going to New York, and Birchell and wife going on a trip to Princeton where the body laid. He stated that Birchell suggested and urged the idea of going to Princeton to identify the body. Pelly stated that Benwell was a short, thick-set and a very dark complexioned man. These points he was made to emphasize, indicating that Blackstock intended to produce testimony to show that neither of the men seen near the swamp answered this description.

Charles Benwell, brother of the murdered man followed Pelly. He identified the false trench and plate pencil case as belonging to his brother, also the keys found on Birchell. He identified his brother's hand writing on the cigar case found near the body and the clothes worn by the murdered man. William Davis, the civil engineer who made a survey of the locality of the murder gave evidence on the distance from East Wood station to the place where the body was found. The defense will doubtless try to prove it impossible to walk that distance in time of Birchell's disappearance.

A Queer Report.

MARTINEZ, Cal., Sept. 23.—Wm. Martindale, who shot and killed John Burke two weeks ago, had an examination before the county judge to-day, and pleaded guilty as charged of murder in the first degree. He asked the judge to hang him and not imprison him for life.

Stabbed In the Side.

NEWPORT, Sept. 23.—This afternoon at one o'clock, Adolph Taylor became involved in a fight with the Ewing brothers, during which John Ewing stabbed Taylor in the left side with a pocket knife. Taylor resting easy tonight and the attending physician thinks he is no dangerously hurt.

PERSONAL GOSSIP.

THE SICK CONGRESSMAN.

Sugar Is The Bone of Contention—Indian's Ideas—Bismarck's Plans.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 23.—Max Goldberg, a dealer in lottery tickets, was shot last night by Millie Panharst, a young woman whom he seduced under a promise of marriage. The girl's father is a well-known captain of deep water vessels and kept a house for his daughter in the western part of the city. His mother was dead, and being alone most of the time she fell a victim to Goldberg's charms. After accomplishing his purpose, Goldberg laughed at her proposition of marriage. He visited her house last night at her request and again refused to marry her. She took a pistol from her pocket and shot him in the stomach. His wound is serious and will probably prove fatal.

Congressman Scott's Condition.

ERIE, Pa., Sept. 23.—William L. Scott's condition is unchanged. Dr. William Pepper, of the Philadelphia University, and Dr. Brandes held a consultation and pronounced the ailment to be acute gastritis. Brandes is hopeful of the recovery of his patient, provided he has sufficient strength to rally after the fever is checked. Scott is not able to speak above a whisper and he is too much debilitated to help himself at all. Unless a speedy change takes place his chances of recovery are considered very doubtful.

A Remarkable Claim.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 23.—Alex Stewart, a resident of Woodstock, a retired schoolmaster, is about prosecuting a somewhat queer claim against the United States government. The amount of the claim is \$277,500, and services in return for which it is made are for promoting good feeling between the United States and England for a period of eight years. The time is set down with pedagogic exactness. Stewart claims \$30,000 for the administration of the late President Garfield. He has already communicated with the executives at Washington and has received a reply.

Irish Speakers Coming.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 23.—Council No. 7, of the American branch of the Irish National Land League, will meet here this afternoon. The session is secret, but the president, John Fitzgerald, states that the object is to appoint committees to meet and to care for the coming speakers to arrive from Ireland. Notwithstanding the arrest of O'Brien and Dillon Fitzgerald names them as the coming speakers, along with O'Connor and O'Reilly. He does not think that their arrest will interfere with their trip to the United States.

Bismarck May Appear.

BEHLIN, Sept. 23.—Bismarck, in an interview, referred to the prospect of his return to public life, said a seat in the reichstag entailed regular attendance and the discomfort of hotel life, but in the upper house of the diet he might appear when he chose and he did not intend, like a bear, to sleep and lick his paws during the winter.

Body Found in an Old Well.

LODI, Cal., Sept. 23.—G. W. Holmes, a farmer, 23 years of age, disappeared about six weeks ago, and to-day his body was found in an old well. Examination showed he had been shot and killed. J. W. Smalling, a brother of Mrs. Holmes, has been arrested and charged with the murder. The cause of the shooting is unknown.

Superstitious Indians.

PIERRE, S. D., Dec. 23.—Indians on the Sioux reservations are expecting the coming of Christ. He is, they suppose, to cover the earth with a stratum of soil thirty feet deep, covering up everybody but good Indians, who will get through to the sacrifice and find veritable happiness in a hunting ground on earth.

Sugar in the Way.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—The republican conferees on the tariff bill were in session again this morning for two hours. After they separated they said there was no further progress to report. The sugar schedule is the chief block in the way of an agreement.

Recalcitrant Democrats.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—It is reported that so one of the democratic representatives say that the republicans shall be compelled to pass the tariff bill without the aid of the democratic votes in the house.
