COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A Busy Session Last Evening—The Board met at 7 o'clock in the City Hall.

The city council met in regular session at the chambers last evening. Mayor Cowan being absent Councilman Tabler presided.

The committee on streets and public property recommended that the extension of the outlet of Railroad street sewer be laid with thirty-inch sewer pipe, according to plans, and the report was adopted.

The street commissioner made the following recommendations: Grave 7th street between Railroad and Jackson streets, adjoining blocks 16 and 17, and a new sidewalk on the south side of 1st street, adjoining lots 3 and 4, in block 110, a new sidewalk on the north side of 4th street, adjoining lots 2 and 3, block 12, and a new sidewalk on the east side of Maple street, adjoining block 44, adopted.

The city marshal reported \$10,340 collected. The note of the city of Hillsboro for balance on hand engine was paid in full to the hands of the city attorney for collection.

A number of petitions for alterations were referred to the committee on streets and public property with authority to inquire into the matter and to report thereon.

The committee on streets and public property reported on a petition for a new sidewalk on the north side of Second street, between Morgan and Jackson streets, was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

A. W. Carey was granted a license. Mr. Carey made a proposition to the council to make a survey, established grades, specify size of pipes for a sewer system for \$9,000, which was referred to a committee on the whole.

Wm. Miller, engineer of engine No. 1, was allowed \$25 for the cost of repairing the engine. Night Police Wm. Miller was granted a leave of absence of ten days.

N. J. Henton was granted \$19.45. J. M. Maxwell was granted \$27.50. J. W. Reeks was granted \$48.23. John Clellan was granted \$2.00. Geo. W. Hughes was granted \$3.00. B. W. Cundiff was granted \$2.50. J. C. Myers was granted \$2.00. E. S. Levitt was granted \$2.35. Ben Johnson was granted \$2.75. W. A. McClain was granted \$3.00. John Hoffman was granted \$17.20. Wm. Miller was granted \$70.00. John Jones was granted \$70.00.

The council adjourned to meet next Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock. About The State Fair. The Salem salesman says since the state fair is over and those who attended it have had time to compare notes the success of the occasion seems great. It really was a prosperous meeting, this is shown in the increased receipts in every department.

The total receipts of the fair this year from all sources was \$18,300, 83, and is a considerable increase over the receipts of previous years. They were very much larger at the wagon race, showing the increased attendance to have been generally from the country. The number of persons attending the races was about the same as last year, although the number of people at the fair exceeded that of the year before. This would argue in favor of better races next year.

There must be fast horses here, and to bring them there must be some good sized purses. This would result in fetching the horses and they would attract the people. The movement to arrange ample purses is on foot and it may be taken for granted the next speed trials on the race course of the state agricultural society will be above the ordinary.

Hop Culture. Hop culture is certainly becoming one of our sure and profitable industries. Oregon is admirably adapted to the growth and cultivation of hops, and while the price may be low this year, the crop surely advances again. Hops are now quoted at a good figure, and the estimated crop of Oregon and Washington at 14,000,000 pounds will yield to the two states the sum of at least \$3,000,000 at present prices. Hops not only provide remunerative to the individual producer, but are a source of revenue to the country at large. In the year of 1887 this country imported 18,277,328 pounds of hops more than it exported. In the year of 1888 this was changed and 1,297,014 pounds were exported over and above the imports. In the year of 1889, 10,286,262 pounds were exported, and only 3,976,158 were imported the past two years, changing the balance of trade in our favor, thus adding to our national wealth.

An Unfounded Rumor. A report has been circulated about the city for several days that Harry Putman, well known in this city, who has been in San Francisco for several years, working at the jewelry business, had been found guilty of stealing valuable diamonds and sent to the penitentiary or twenty years. A dispatch received in this city yesterday explains the matter. A man by the name of Putman was arrested and found guilty, as above stated, but it was not Harry Putman.

Sudden Death. Mandel Peterson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Peterson, aged 11 years, died yesterday at twelve o'clock, of intestinal obstruction of the bowels, after a very short illness, having taken sick at one o'clock a. m. Monday. The funeral will occur today at ten o'clock from the residence of John A. Hall, corner First and Main streets.

Drunk and Disorderly. A young fellow about 18 or 20 years of age was arrested yesterday morning for being drunk and disorderly, and will answer to the charge in Recorder Kento's court today. He was too drunk to give his name.

AN AMUSING INCIDENT.

The Mistake of a Newly Married Couple at the Depot Yesterday. Five trains leaving the depot almost simultaneously is too much for one who has not traveled a great deal, and hardly a day passes that some one does not chase a train a quarter of a mile or so.

Those who were at the Southern Pacific depot yesterday witnessed an amusing scene. A couple from the rural districts, more than likely newly-married, that is judging from appearances, were on their way to Yafina, and the husband put his wife on what he thought was the Oregon Pacific train for the latter place, but in reality was the north-bound train for Portland. He went into the baggage room to get his trunk checked, and just then the train pulled out. He mistook that as having made a mistake and excitedly exclaimed: "Where's that train going?" and on being informed that it was bound for Portland, he started after it at a 100 paces, overtaking the train when it stopped at the switch, he leaped aboard and did not stop until he had secured his own trunk by the hand, dragged her out on the platform, and jumped off with her in his arms. They walked back to the depot hand in hand, smiling, and congratulating themselves on their lucky escape, and after locking their baggage got on the Oregon Pacific train together.
