The city council met last evening in special session. Petition of Frank Wood and others for lateral sewer was referred to committee on streets and public property.

The contract for building the north extension of Railroad street sewer a distance of about 35 feet to its outlet was awarded to Mason & Straug, of Salem, for 20-inch terra cotta pipe at \$2.37 per foot, after a spirited discussion, the work to be finished within 60 days. The bond was fixed at \$600.

A Pioneer. Mrs. Mahala McCallister, who died near Silver Creek Falls Sept. 29, was a pioneer woman of Oregon, having crossed the plains to Oregon in 1835, coming to the city of Astoria in Linn county. She was a distant relative of Daniel Boone, of Kentucky. She was 88 years of age.

EXPOSITION NOTES. PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 3. This being childrens day at the fair and a very rainy day too, the attendance was large in the afternoon. A good downpouring wet foot rain seems to only turn more people toward the Exposition buildings.

Some fine furniture and other woods, but only a very limited extent, are there in a section of a maple tree with bark removed and varnished nicely, standing in an out of the way corner, which indicates what a state of beauty there is in the wood awaiting the citizen, and showing of our splendid native woods and manufactures therein is sadly lacking to a loyal Oregonian showing that trade leads decidedly and not manufactures, of course this would perhaps be as it should were this a
