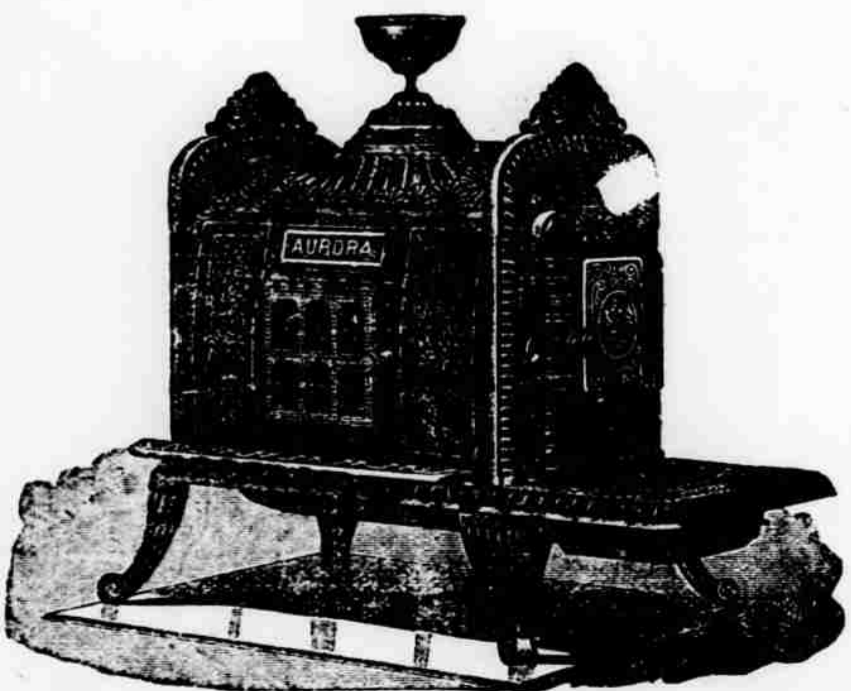

GRAND LODGE K. OF P. It Meets at The Dalles for Its Annual Work.

ROBBERY IN PORTLAND. A Man Stood Up and Deliberately Bobbed Another One of the Eugene Jail Breakers Captured.

THE DALLES, Oct. 14.—The grand lodge of the fraternal order of Knights of Pythias met for the annual consideration of the welfare of the order in this city today. A magnificent procession paraded the streets at 3 p. m. and attracted much attention. Afterwards the competitive drill was entered into with spirit by the different lodges represented.

ROBBERED IN BROAD DAYLIGHT. Stood Up and Believed of His Pocket Book.

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—Elisha Smith, an aged farmer from Split Log, Missouri, was robbed of his pocket book containing money and checks to the amount of \$4,785 this morning. Just as the Southern Pacific train arrived from California, Smith was putting on his overcoat and with the other passengers was preparing to leave the train, when three men seized him, and while two of the men held him the other put his hand into his pocket and took his pocket book. In the confusion of the crowd the robbers escaped.

THE EUGENE JAIL DELIVERY. Another One of the Five Escaped Prisoners Captured.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 14.—On the 18th of February last six prisoners broke out of the county jail at this place and fled to the city of Eugene, one being recaptured. Another one named Beardsfield, under charge of burglary, has just been captured near this city, where he had been working for some time.

Killed by Tramps. CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 14.—Mr. Critchfield, who lives near the Orville switchyards, complained recently to Marshal Porter of the robbery of a gang of tramps who occupied an empty room in his house. On Friday night Deputy Marshal Boydston, of Orville, arrested James Sweeney and started with a rifle across the tracks to the station. Sweeney resisted, and in the struggle the two men were run over by a passenger engine. Boydston was mangled beyond recognition, while Sweeney had his leg crushed at the knee. At the inquest it was brought out that one of Sweeney's friends hit Boydston with a bill and pushed him under the engine, and that Boydston held to his prisoner. One McKee was arrested on suspicion of the murder. Boydston was the coroner of the county and a leading democrat.

Women on the Highway. Chicago, Oct. 14.—During the last two weeks more than fifty men have been held up on the downtown streets by women and robbed of all they had. In most instances the women are big and strong and on even terms with the men. They are dressed in the latest fashion and together can make short work of a man who is bold enough to resist. The majority of the robberies have occurred near the police headquarters. The police officers have issued orders to arrest every known street walker and thief and are making an effort to put a stop to the robberies.

Quality of Manslaughter. SEATTLE, Oct. 14.—Indian Jim, charged with murder in the first degree, withdrew his plea of not guilty in Judge Hume's court today and entered a plea of guilty of manslaughter. He is charged with murdering an Indian woman named Kath, on September 20, with a scythe. Jim is an Alaskan Indian and went to Orilla to pick hops. On returning to his camp at night he became very angry because Kath, his squaw, would cook him no supper, and threatened to kill her. He proceeded to carry out his threat and picked up a broken scythe blade and cut her about the head and body in a horrible manner, from which death resulted a few hours afterwards. Jim tried to kill himself also, but was prevented by the officers who effected his arrest.

Too Young to Wed. A day or so ago a couple came to Salem from an adjoining city for the purpose of taking out a license permitting them to commit twicicide, but the effort was unavailing, as the bride was too young by over a year. She was not yet fifteen and the law provides that even with parental consent not less than sixteen summers and an equal number of winters must have passed over the head of the bride. —Statesman.

NEW YORK CITY CENSUS. A Very Large Increase Over the Government Count. New York, Oct. 14.—The police census completed this afternoon show New York City's population to be 1,810,715, an increase of 197,214 over the government figures.

How People Throw Away Money. It gives one an idea of the stupendous increase of wealth in this country that the Ponce de Leon hotel at St. Augustine, Florida, which cost \$2,500,000, and holds about 1,000 guests, has paid so well that its owners are building the Alcazar, across the street, at a cost of \$2,500,000 more. The Atlanta Constitution describes this hotel as a world-wonder of splendor and luxury, but the paragraph that gives the best idea of its elegance and the wealth of its patrons, is this: "The rates? Five dollars a day upward. Eight out of every ten visitors pay \$5 a day. The other two taking private parlors or extra rooms, pay from \$8 to \$100 a day. The suit of room engaged by Mr. Pulitzer were \$50 a week. The Duke of Newcastle paid \$50 a week, ordered in a sideboard, and kept them while away two weeks in southern Florida. The bridal chambers cost \$40 a day. The price paid for dinner is \$2 because it brings the scores who take dinner to hear the concerts and explore the house from the picture gallery and gardens to the sheltered roof below."

WIRE-CLICKINGS. It is announced that the Spanish states to admit the production of the Spanish possessions of the West Indies, especially tobacco and sugar, without the recently imposed tariff restrictions. In the event of refusal Spain will exclude American products, especially breadstuffs.

THE LIVE-PIGION MATCH between Edward Gibb Murphy, of New York, and James Robert Elliott, of Kansas City, for \$5,000 a side, 100 birds each, automatic traps, was won by Elliott, he having killed 93 to Murphy's 88 birds. The time was one hour and forty-two minutes, the best time ever made in a 100-bird shoot.

THE ROBBERY of Frank Hoffa's jewelry store in Washington has developed into an extensive case the values taken being estimated at \$15,000.

MISS INEZ COULTRIE, who recently furnished large office officials with considerable information about the Mormons and the most of her life in Utah, has gone to Salt Lake City. Though the fact was not made public, Miss Coultre is returning to Utah as a detective, under instructions to secure such evidence as she can against the Mormons.

THE UNITED STATES dynamite cruiser Vesuvius completed her trial of Newport, R. I. She went outside and performed the turning maneuvers at a speed of 12 and 14 knots, and at full speed with natural and forced draughts. The result was not computed. Her draught diameter is probably greater than some other cruisers.

THE GALE SUIT ENDED. TACOMA, Oct. 14.—The long-pending contest over the Gale homestead claim has been decided by the secretary of the interior in favor of John P. Gale. The tract in dispute embraced fifty acres lying between the Puyallup reservation and the property of the Tacoma Land Company, running down on the tide flats. It was claimed by the Northern Pacific railroad company as coming within their land grant, and the contest has been going on since 73. Very naturally Mr. Gale feels highly pleased over the final decision in his favor. The property was purchased yesterday by W. B. Blackwell for the sum of \$106,250.

AN AMERICAN HUMILIATED IN ITALY. From the Philadelphia local. While Charles Dougherty, a son of the silver-tongued orator, was Secretary of Legation in Rome during Cleveland's administration, an American citizen was compelled to put up with an imposition from the Italian government which has never until now been recorded in print. An American gentleman purchased a house in the Eternal City from an English resident who was moving to a villa in the outskirts. Not long after the American had become owner he discovered buried in the garden a couple of statues, evidently antique, and rather the worse for wear. As he knew little and cared less about such things, he resolved to sell them accordingly made his discovery known. To his surprise the Italian government sent to him for the marbles. He explained that he had bought the property. The government told him he might keep the property, but he must give up the statues. He consulted the Englishman from whom he had bought the property, and the Englishman had told him that he had made a similar discovery and had sold his "treasure trove" with lot opposition from the authorities. "Go and see your Minister," said the Englishman. The American accordingly went and laid his case before that gentleman. "You'll have to give up the statues," said he. "But the English owner sold his." "Ah, but he was an Englishman, you, as an American, have here no redress; nor influence enough here to protect you. You'd better comply with the demand of the government or you may have serious trouble." "But if my case were reported to Washington?" "It would be quite useless. The American flag commands no respect here." The Italian government got the statues.

INDIANS WHO ARE CANNIBALS AND FIENDS INCARNATE. HE WAS KILLED IN A DUEL. Negotiating With the Cheyennes—They Are to Be Asked to Modify Their Treaty.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 14.—Mrs. Lait, who has returned from work among the Indians of British Columbia, says: "Among the heathen Indians of the province they have a cannibal feast, in which cannibals bite the dead body, also bite living children. The devil's dance, which is prohibited by legislation, goes on about the same here, with four 'religious' biter, or dog eaters. These men hide in caves, where they fast for days, and then come out in a frenzied state. They bite raw flesh out of human bodies, when they cannot get human flesh they will seize a living dog, tear it up and devour the flesh. This is to appease the devil. There is a whisky feast, for the purposes of which the tribe get whisky from Victoria sufficient to fill a canteen, men, women and children become mad drunk and stab each other. The friends of those who have been murdered, when they become sober, slash their own bodies with knives. Deformed or puny children are killed and buried. Girls are married at 8 or 9 years. When she becomes useless they take her out on a little sled and leave her to die there."

MORMON CHURCH. It Professes To Be Determined To Live To The Law, POLYGAMY FOREVER GONE.

The Gentiles Believe the Saints Are Bitter in Their Feelings—The Restated Saints May Rise Again.

New York, Oct. 14.—The Independent will publish to-morrow an article received by telegraph from President Woodruff, of the Mormon church, and Gov. Thomas, of Utah, concerning the action of the Mormon conference, October 6th, forbidding polygamy. Pres. Woodruff says the action of congress is conclusive and the church has no disposition to violate the laws or defy the government. The revelation of God requires us to obey the constitutional laws of the land.
