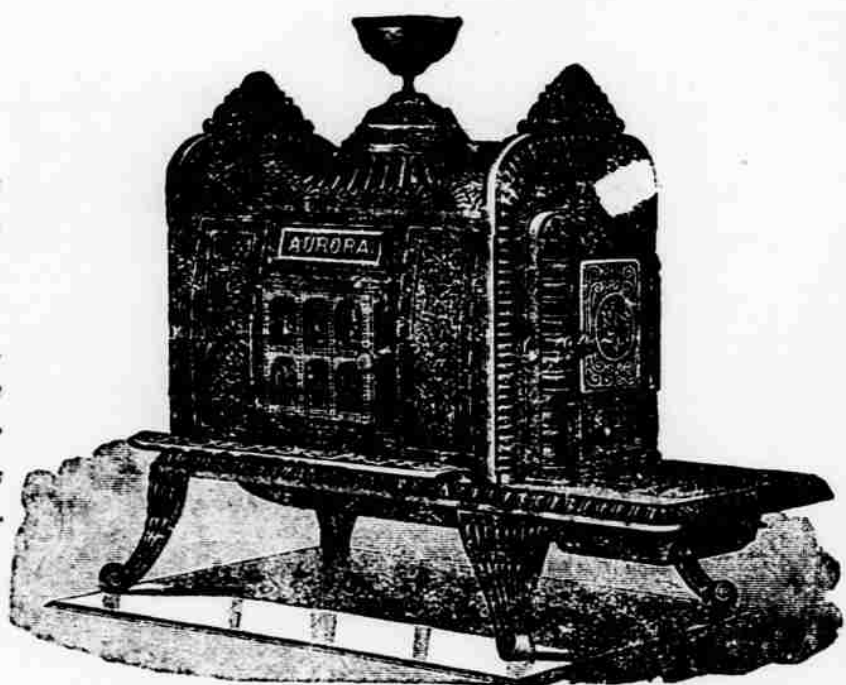

THE MAXWELL HANGING.

Treasury Operates in Silver—Original

Package Business a Failure

Judge Adams Dead.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—The

treasury department has issued a

bulletin to customs officers on the

subject of the importation of meat

cattle in pursuance with the most

inspiration act. It suspends de-

signations of customs ports and

districts named as quarantined

stations by the secretary of agri-

culture, by virtue of section 20 of

the tariff bill. It suspends the

prohibition of importation of meat

cattle arriving in the United

States, by virtue of the same

authority. The prohibition of im-

portation of hides of meat cattle

from North, Central and South

America is suspended, meat cattle

from those countries being at

present free from contagious

diseases.

KILLED TWO MEN.

It's Wife's Passion and An Elder

Brother.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 17.—

News of a double murder in Al-

legany county was received here.

John Dixon, a prosperous young

farmer, discovered that intima-

relation was existing between his

young wife and Marshall Halsey,

Dixon, on his return home, saw

his wife leaving the house, and

getting his rifle, followed her.

She went into the woods and met

Halsey, when Dixon shot the latter

and he fled. Halsey was the

brother of the dead man hunted

by Dixon. He found him at the

house of a friend. Halsey pulled

a revolver but persons interfered,

saying he would have the fight

fair. Ten paces were stepped off

and the men fired. Halsey was

in a few seconds dead, while Dixon

was not touched and is not yet ar-

rested.

A RUFFIAN TO THE END.

He Drops the Religious Mask and

Engages in Curbing.

MOREY, Ill., Oct. 17.—Last

night when the sheriff showed

no signs of disinclination at the

trial before him, Maxwell said:

"Break up this case. I see you

are much more troubled about this

thing than I am." This morning

when a newspaper representative

began to question him as to his

spiritual welfare, Maxwell threw

off the religious mask which he

had heretofore worn, and drove

the visitor from him with a string

of curses.

When the sheriff began to read

the death warrant in a trembling

voice, Maxwell interrupted him

with, "Stop that gab, Schroeder,

and let us get through this thing

as soon as possible." Just before

leaving he told Maxwell handed

the sheriff a big knife, saying he

might have killed himself half a

dozen times if he had wanted to.

The Original Package Business.

TOPEKA, Oct. 17.—A decision

was rendered in the United States

circuit court in this city this

morning that created consterna-

tion among the friends of prohibi-

tion and in effect declares the Wil-

son bill, enacted by congress, does

not restore the power of the Kansas

prohibitory law as against the

original package saloons.

Shipwrecked and Crew Lost.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 17.—The

ship Lizzie C. Troop, whose offi-

cers narrowly escaped being

poisoned on the high seas by the

steward on the voyage from Phil-

adelphia to Japan, as heretofore

reported, is now learned to have

been wrecked on the island of

Loe Choo and nearly all of the

crew lost. Captain Benjamin

Founer, her master, was accom-

panied by his wife and child.

These, with the officers and mem-

bers of the crew, made the total

number on board, 22.

Amount of Silver Offered.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—The

amount of silver offered for sale to

the treasury today was 424,000

ounces; amount purchased 148,000

ounces; \$11,049.

Those Terrible Freemasons.

ROME, Oct. 17.—A papal ency-

clical to the Italian bishops

strongly protests against the gov-

ernment violating the liberty and

rights of the papacy and Catholi-

cism, and accuses the Freemasons

of reversing modern society and

asks the prayers of the faithful.

TERRIBLE CRIME.

Man Attacks his Wife and

Five Children with a Hatchet.

BELLINGHAM, Oct. 17.—A terrible

tragedy occurred at Bellingham

last night. A man named Schmitt,

at one time wealthy but who

was heavily in debt, attacked his

wife and five children with a hatchet,

hacking their heads in a terrible

manner. Three of the children

died from their injuries. Frau

Schmitt and the two remaining

children are unconscious and dy-

ing. The murderer fled and thus

has eluded all efforts made to

capture him.

FOR SEDUCTION.

All the Way From England to See

a Married Man.

SEATTLE, Oct. 17.—Miss Leslie

Bushnell, a young English woman

about 27 years of age, has brought

a suit for damages in the superior

court at Seattle, against William C.

Williams, a British subject, who

lives in this city. The plaintiff in

her complaint alleges seduction and

asks for twenty-five thousand dol-

lars damages.

Miss Bushnell claims that while

in England a year ago Williams

promised to marry her.

Williams was divorced from his

wife, but on his return from Eng-

land they were married a second

time, and when Miss Bushnell

heard of the marriage she came

here from England and brought

suit.

A Difference of Opinion.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17.—The

senator cutter, Richard Rush,

brought to this port seals valued

at \$40,000, which are claimed by

the Alaska Commercial Com-

pany and North American Trading

company. The seals were taken

on the Fribyoff Islands, and the

Alaska Co., claims they were

taken by the natives before its con-

tract expired last May. The North

American Co., claims they were

taken later.

He Shot the Sheriff.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 17.—Tom

Duffy a cousin of the prize fighter,

who has been the habit of going

to parish prison to see a "red"

incarcerated there for a mid-

meadow, went there today and

asked to see Anthonia Headfield,

one of the assassins of Chief of

Police Hennessy, ostensibly for

the purpose of identifying him.

Headfield refused to see a "red"

and Duffy pulled out a pistol and

shot him. He was killed and shot

himself, inflicting a fatal wound.

An Ex-Supreme Judge Died.

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 17.—Judge

Austin Adams, chief justice of the

supreme court of Iowa, died

today.

LIKE A FAIRY TALE.

Senator Hearst's Biz Schemes in

the Newspaper World.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 17.—

Senator Hearst is creating a big-

ger sensation than anything he has

ever published in his newspaper.

He is a very rich man. It is es-

timated that his income averages \$7,

000 a day. It is said that he spent

\$1,000,000 in paying the Examiner

on a paying basis, a sum only a

little less than half of his income

for a year. Recently rumors have

been current in New York of in-

vention of establishing his son in

a newspaper in that city.

The gossip says that he offered
