MATTERS THAT SHOULD BE LOOKED AFTER.

One of the essential things for the future prosperity of our growing city of Albany, is the transportation rates. The facilities in transportation lines we already have, with the prospects of further and important extensions. But the rates are not regulated with fairness to our city, in fact a discrimination that is going to effect our manufacturing interests very materially unless it is remedied.

For instance if our manufacturers wish to reach E. Wascoville, Coburg or any point on the Oregonian railroad, or from the Lebanon branch of the Southern Pacific, there is a double local rate to pay. That is on articles shipped from Albany to Brownsville there would be more weight to pay than there would be on a like article shipped from Portland to Brownsville. Anyone can see from that statement of facts that a fatal discrimination exists against the Albany manufacturing interests.

The same difficulty also exists in regard to all points on the West side North of Corvallis, perhaps in a more pronounced manner, as opposing lines have to be used in that case.

The question is how to remedy these defects. There is but one method for immediate relief and that is for our business men to consult together, formulate some plan, and by petition, or better than that by special committee appeal to the railroad officials to correct the freight rates, and establish a standard rate of so much per mile irrespective of the different lines over which the freight may be carried. There is no question but what the railroad men would accede to the request, providing the representative business men went to them in a manner to show from whom and to what purpose the appeal was made.

The Southern Pacific and the Oregon Pacific would find no difficulty in making a reciprocal shipping agreement on local freight, providing they were shown—as it can easily be shown—that the arrangement redounds to the benefit of both. It only requires, as before stated, that the representative business men reach them in a concerted and well considered business manner upon the subject. The question is will the business men of Albany move in the matter.

Again it is a well conceded fact that by a proper improvement of the Willamette river it could be kept open for navigation during the entire summer months. In other words the boats could be run without interruption the year around, thus giving us another competing freight line, and the best and cheapest freight transportation in the world, during the entire twelve months. It only requires a systematic and continuous watchfulness against the obstructions to accomplish that desired end. But to do it there must be appropriations on the government adequate to the work, as those appropriations must not be allowed to be frittered away by simply procuring a plant which is allowed to rot and become useless before any work is done. Here again it needs the voice of the business men to emphasize our wants and see that the appropriations are rightly applied so well as to secure further and more adequate appropriations.

Minnesota has the proud distinction of furnishing a brand new and decidedly interesting sensation. A man lately died in that state leaving a fortune estimated

at \$4,000,000 which he willed to his wife and four of his five children. The remaining child, who is said to have been uncommonly "wayward," was left nothing, his father evidently intending the zero to express his appreciation of the boy's character and achievements. Well, a telegram from St. Paul states that the widow has declined to probate the will, and with the consent of the other heirs will burn it. Of course, if this philanthropic purpose is carried out, the wayward boy will get his share of the \$4,000,000, and the Minnesota lawyers who were expecting to attack or to defend the will will doubtless be more or less prostrated with grief. A good many people hold that the worst use that you can put a man to is to hang him. But the course of human events goes far to prove that the best use a will can be put to is to treat it as the Minnesota one is to be served.

The plea of the young stage-robber, who held up a coach on the famous Robbers' ridge in Menoceno county, is certainly novel. He claims he wanted money to carry on his education, so he took to the road as the speediest and surest way of filling his purse. He had fed his mind on flash detective stories and such fiction as "The Cleaneau Case" and "The Kreutzer Sonata." He will furnish a good illustration to the moralist who believes that the end justifies the means, but it is to be feared that he will have liberal time in San Quentin to perfect his education.

In spite of our high tariff our foreign commerce has continued to increase in a ratio greater than that of any other country. In 1870 our exports and imports aggregated \$28,000,000,000; in 1880-90 they had more than doubled, reaching the sum of \$1,617,000,000. It is perfectly safe prediction to make that the next twenty years will witness an equally great increase; although the nature of both imports and exports will be considerably changed. Only free traders and fools contend that protection prevents the expansion of trade.

To-morrow that will be indulged in throughout the country over the departure of Herr Most, the anarchist agitator, from this country to take up his residence in London, will not be very extensive. Indeed if the whole tribe of that description of individuals could be induced to take their departure it would lighten the hearts and increase the sense of safety one feels when peaceful people are our neighbors. Bomb throwers are not good nor pleasant neighbors and the further off they are the better.
