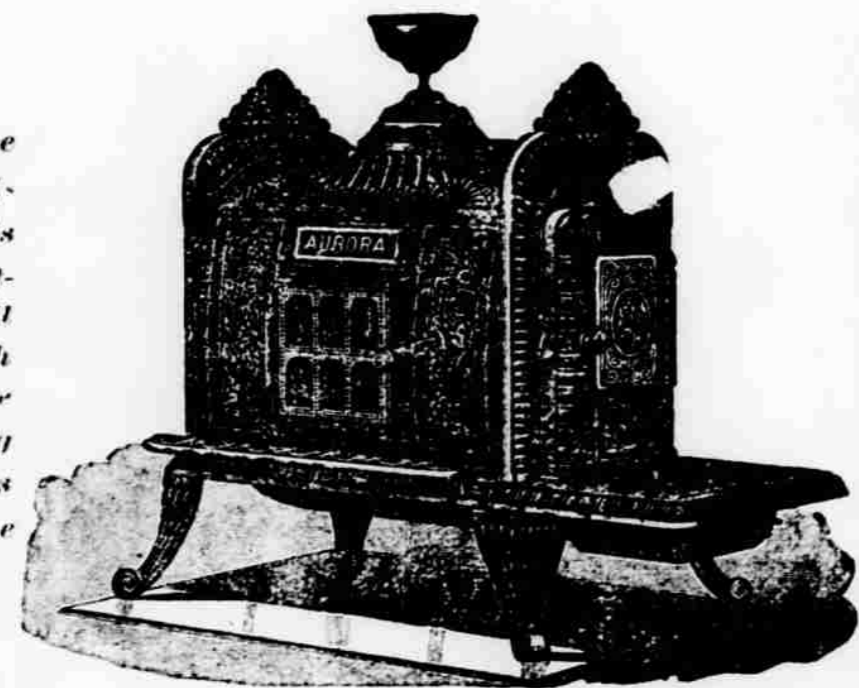

### MCKINLEY ELECTED

#### He Will Have a Good Majority.

#### FRISCO GOES REPUBLICAN.

World's Fair Subsidy Will Reach \$10,500,000.

#### WASHINGTON REPUBLICAN.

Wilder, for Congressman. Will Have Five Thousand Majority—Meagre Returns.

**SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.**—Returns received at 9 o'clock this morning show that the weather is a decided factor in the vote. A few days earlier, and all indications point to a heavy vote. A day after the Lakota party was thought to be every voter will be brought to the polls on account of the bitter fog for superior judges. At Frisco, the proportion of voters reported strong. Very warm weather is reported at Los Angeles. Everybody is out, and money, it is said, is being freely used.

The interest manifested in the election in this city was clearly demonstrated by the fact that from 50 to 80 per cent. of the local vote had been polled by noon. Up to that hour there had been no disturbances whatever. O'Donnell, independent candidate for mayor, is known to be holding a strong vote. The side issue tickets are receiving little support and will not figure in the fight. The democrats claim the city by 4000 majority.

The republicans claim E. F. Lord has undoubtedly been elected in the Fifth congressional district, defeating Clonnie.

The total vote in this state, it is thought, will reach 250,000.

At 9:30 p. m. 22,381 votes had been counted in 92 precincts out of a total of 311 precincts in the city of San Francisco. The total number of republican votes in this preliminary count is 13,003, and democratic votes is 9,278, showing a republican majority of 3,725.

Indications at this hour, I do not care that they have gone republican by 1750 majority.

**OAKLAND, Nov. 4.**—A novel feature this morning is the presence of women at the polls as ticket peddlers and table tenders for the prohibitionists. Irish, the democratic candidate for congress, is being scratched both on and off in a lively manner. Republicans express great confidence, and are offering bets with no takers.

#### MONTANA.

**HELENA, Nov. 4.**—The democracy has put forth a great effort for the election of Nixon to congress, and supremacy in state senate. Chairman Deane of the democratic committee claims a large vote for Dixon in Deer Lodge and Silver Bow counties. Ex-Gov. White, chairman of the republican state committee, at the close of the polls expressed confidence in the reelection of Carter and a majority of the republican state ticket and senators.

Returns so far received for the state indicate democratic gains throughout the state. They are coming in very slowly however, and it is not likely to decide before tomorrow.

Carter, rep., carries this city by a majority of 20. The state is very close, and it may take the vote of the outlying districts to determine the result. Both parties claim the election of congressman and the state ticket by a majority of 200 to 500. The democrats are most confident.

#### COLORADO.

**DENVER, Nov. 4.**—An unusually heavy vote is cast here and throughout the state. Returns have been late, as the polls close at 7 o'clock. At the democratic headquarters every one is jubilant, and Chairman Arbuttle claims the election of the entire ticket by 5,000.

#### UTAH.

**SALT LAKE, Nov. 4.**—The delegate election passed off quietly. Gaine, Mormon, is elected over Goodman, liberal, by 3,000 to 5,000 majority.

#### NEW YORK.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 4.**—The polls opened at 6 o'clock this morning, and the work of voting under the new ballot law commenced. An unusually large number of workers were about the polls. Politicians of every party made unusual efforts to get an early vote. In consequence of the new law, the vote proceeded more slowly than usual, but with great steadiness.

Many arrests were made during the day for illegally registering and voting and rejecting ballots. At Mayor Grant's headquarters it is said voting is proceeding in an intelligent manner with little delay. At Mr. Goff's headquarters, on the contrary, it is said voting is very backward in many down town districts. It is estimated there a full vote could not be cast. Reports are received also that the

republicans are voting the straight fusion ticket.

O'Brien, Dillon and other Irish leaders visited several polling places.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 4.**—Grant's majority will certainly be 22,000 Gorman for sheriff 19,000; Nichols, district attorney, 22,000. At 11 o'clock the returns from Massachusetts City and Perry township complete, Warwick's home, gives McKinley 1361; Warwick, 1534.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 4.**—A press bulletin says that ex-governor Foster of Ohio is elected to congress.

#### MISSOURI.

**KANSAS CITY, Nov. 4.**—Nearly full returns from the Jackson county show a majority for the democratic ticket. Farness, democratic candidate for congress, will run ahead of his ticket. The republican committee has conceded Farness's election by 3000 majority. Advice from many points in Kansas point to a heavier farmers alliance vote than anticipated. They claim 125,000 votes for the state ticket. The republicans concede that the farmers alliance has made heavy inroads into their ranks. The republicans claim only 150,000 majority.

For their state tickets, the democrats think Willis, of the farmers alliance may be elected governor. The democrats also claim three congressmen and the democratic ticket, the ticket on a Farness, rep., and Kelly, rep., conceded. The returns from 19 counties have been received by the Associated Press, and of these eight have gone republican, six democratic and five for the alliance. The returns from the 11th Missouri congressional district show the certain re-election of Bland over Jervis, rep. Bland's majority is over 3000.

#### WISCONSIN.

**MILWAUKEE, Nov. 4.**—Sixty-three voting precincts in the state of Wisconsin, including 36 precincts in the city of Milwaukee, show a net gain for the democrats of 3480. John L. Mitchell, democrat, is unambiguously elected to congress from the 4th congressional district.

Democrats claim the election of Pock and the entire democratic state ticket, but the returns are too meagre to dispute the claim, and the republicans think Hoard is re-elected. The legislature is republican and Spooner will be re-elected.

#### SOUTH CAROLINA.

**CHARLESTON, Nov. 4.**—The total vote in the state will not exceed 150,000. Tillman (dem) is elected by not less than 25,000 majority. The election is absolutely devoid of incident or excitement. The negroes, having no regular ticket in the field, for the most part declined to choose between the democrats. The vote in Charleston was lighter than ever known, the total being about 1500 out of a total registered vote of about 10,000.

#### IOWA.

**BURLINGTON, Nov. 4.**—Incomplete returns show great democratic gains in the first Iowa district. Surley, democrat, is probably elected by five hundred majority over Clear, republican. Returns from all parts of the state will be late.

The gubernatorial candidates are making a close run with chances in favor of the republican nominee, though he is running behind the rest of the ticket.

#### ARKANSAS.

**LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 4.**—The election is without incident. Ferry (dem) for congress, is running 1,185 to 1,118 for Harris, (rep).

#### MINNESOTA.

**ST. PAUL, Nov. 4.**—Returns are very slow and meagre. Merrim (rep) is losing about 500 over the state, but the loss does not yet seem large enough to defeat him. Two years ago he had a plurality of 24,104.

#### KENTUCKY.

**LEXINGTON, Nov. 4.**—Congressman W. C. P. Breckridge, was re-elected to-day by 8000 majority.

#### WEST VIRGINIA.

**CHARLESTON, Nov. 4.**—Indications point to a democratic victory in the congressional and senatorial districts. The democrats make large gains in this city and county, but the result will not be definitely known until to-morrow.

#### LOUISIANA.

**NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 4.**—Latest returns indicate that Moyer (dem) has defeated Warmouth, (rep) for congress in the 1st district by 2000 majority, and Logan, (dem) defeated Coleman, (rep) 2nd district by 2000. In other districts there was no organized opposition to the democrats.

#### KANSAS.

**KANSAS CITY, Nov. 4.**—Returns from Kansas on the state ticket indicate the election of Governor Humphrey, (rep) by 10,000 to 15,000 plurality. Robinson, (dem) running behind Willitt, (farmers alliance).

### AD FREIGHT WRECK.

**Two Trains Collide and Take Fire at Oakland, Cal.**

**OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 4.**—West Oakland was the scene of another railroad disaster this morning. A few minutes before 3 o'clock the incoming Oregon freight, containing thirty cars and an engine, ran into the rear of the incoming Central Pacific freight, which but a few minutes before had pulled into sixteen street, two hours late. Thirteen freight cars and the engine of the Oregon train are smashed and piled up in wild confusion. Fortunately no one was killed, but Engineer Kelliber and the trainmen were somewhat bruised. When the engine plunged into the caboose of the Oregon train, the cars caught fire, and the caboose and two cars of ice were burned. Other cars were badly wrecked and telegraphed. Just who is to blame for the disaster is not known. Whether the San Francisco signal was not set or whether the rear end of the Central Pacific freight was not protected with lights, will never be known. No other train was delayed by the accident, as they passed the wreck on the Berkeley track.

### A FATAL ACCIDENT.

**George Whitley Run Over and Killed.**

**PORTLAND, Nov. 4.**—A fatal accident occurred on the steel railway bridge at 7:15 o'clock this morning.

George Whitley, aged 17, had driven across the bridge from the East side, with a wagon loaded with brick. He was accompanied by another teamster by the name of Gray, whose wagon was also heavily laden.

At the turn in the west end of the bridge Whitley, who was ahead of Gray, leaned over to put on his break, owing to the very steep grade. In some way he lost his balance, and in an instant he fell from his seat, and was run over by both wheels of the wagon, which was moving quite rapidly, and killed.
