THE SCENE OF THE WRECK

Investigating the Cause—Setting the Claims of the Injured

SALEM, Nov. 17.—To-day and Sunday a party of railroad officials, including Manager Koehler have been in the city. During their stay here they succeeded in obtaining settlements in full from a large number of injured, the prices for receipts in full to cover all damage ranging from \$100 upwards. Schenke, the man whose foot was amputated is offering a quit claim for \$250. The clearing of the wreck is slow work, although two forces are engaged in it. One body of men are rebuilding the fallen bents, and another squad are getting the engine and baggage cars out, and getting ready to remove the engine. There was absolutely nothing left of the trestle and a temporary track has been built on the east side of the trestle and over this the engine will be drawn. The trestle will be finished Wednesday and ready for the passage of mechanical equipment. The fallen timbers are evidently considered sound, for the railroad company are using them in the new trestle. Passenger traffic is almost interrupted, local trains transferring at the trestle and over the running by the Corvallis route and trains are expected to be running regularly Wednesday. The Oregon state railroad commissioners, G. W. Colvig, Robert Clow and J. E. Faull to-day began their examination of witnesses in connection with the Lake Labish of last Wednesday night. The commission has made an investigation taken to secure experts to examine the wreck and has under examination the mechanical engineer of Albany, and W. B. Barr, of Albany, civil engineer, R. A. Habersham, Portland; Lee Hoffman, Robert Wakefield, E. J. Jeffrey and C. E. Swigert of Portland, are also called. There will be several engineers and employes who cannot now be named whom the railroad company has desired to have testify.

A SPECIAL MEETING.

The City Council Considers the Matter of Letting Contracts.

At the meeting last night Mayor Cowan was in the chair, Recorder Henton in place and all the councilmen present except Councilman Smith. The committee on streets and public property reported in favor of letting the contract for the lateral sewer across Railroad street midway between First and Water streets, and that the rest of the bids be laid upon the table until such time as Railroad street sewer is completed. On motion the contract for laying said sewer was let to James Laurent at 68 cents per foot, the work to be completed in ten days. On motion it was decided that hereafter all contracts shall be drawn with a forfeiture for each and every day the said work remains uncompleted after the expiration of the agreed time for such an amount per day as the council may fix.

Working on the Message.

Governor Penoyer is spending what spare time he has in preparing his message, which will be given to the legislature about the third or fourth of the session—after the appointment of committees, etc., has been announced. Of course anything that might be said now regarding the probable contents of this important state document, or even to anticipate more than one or two of the points it will cover, would be a matter of speculation merely. Of course he will touch on the question of railroad taxation, as also the railroad commissioner and the non-taxable bonds—water or otherwise. The governor is thinking a good deal now over the forthcoming message, but it is only within a few days that it has commenced to be written out. Before that time it was in the form of ideas and a few brief notes.—Salem Statesman.

OREGON'S RAILROAD PROBLEM.

The Probable Outcome of the Approaching Legislative Session.

Hon. T. T. Ger, representative from Marion county, was in Portland a few days ago and talked freely to a reporter concerning the probable results of the coming session of the legislature. "The railroad problem," said he, "is one that will require careful consideration. Public sentiment is in favor of giving the railroad commission sufficient power to make itself felt. If not, the commission will be abolished, as it ought to be. I am in favor of vesting the commission with power to fix freight and passenger rates, but not in preference to a maximum rate law, which I think would be more just. THE COMING CITY ELECTION.

The Official Who Will Retire—There Are Plenty of Candidates.

As the time of the city election in December approaches, the candidates for office are being manifested in it. There promises to be more of a contest over the office of city treasurer than any other. The officers to be elected are marshal, treasurer and one councilman from each ward. For the first time several candidates are already mentioned. The office of treasurer is now more desirable from the fact that the salary is increased and in view of the fact that the citizens have already voted in favor of bonding the city for \$75,000 to be expended in a system of public improvements which will increase business of that office. The officers who retire are marshal John Hoffman, Treasurer Wm. Humphrey, councilman F. M. French from the first ward, councilman C. G. Burkhardt from the second, and L. W. Dwyer from the third. It is probable that some of these will succeed themselves, although there are plenty of new candidates in the field. The present city clerk, Ed. Hill, has perhaps made some mistake, has looked after the city's interests in a wise and careful manner; and have inaugurated a system of public improvements, which if carried through to completion by the council of next year will promote the city's prosperity and prove eminently satisfactory to the people of Albany.
