RAILROAD MATTERS.

Will Huntington Build on the Albany & Astoria Survey?

C. W. Fulton will return from Portland this morning, where he went to complete arrangements for the purchase of the Astoria & South Coast securities to be sold on the 25th to satisfy the claim of J. H. Smith & Co. It was reported on the street last night that Mr. Fulton would bring back some good railroad news with him, but what the nature of it is no one seems to know.

There is a great diversity of opinion as to which railroad will be in Astoria first. No one doubts for a moment but that the matter will all be settled up within a few months and active work will be commenced in the spring, but what line will be in a position that interested property owners cannot agree upon. Some say Huntington will build immediately on the Albany & Astoria survey; others that he will get hold of the Astoria & South Coast, while there is one opinion that William Reid will complete that road himself. There are those who think the Union Pacific will come down the river immediately, while a few have pinned their faith on Jim Hill and the Great Northern.

It is said that Huntington will not be very active in the railroad warfare of the northwest next year on account of his waning influence with those who elevated him to the position of the Southern Pacific. It is declared that Crocker and his associates called a halt on Huntington when he commenced knocking off useless heads and cutting down the company's payroll, and that they are ready to reelect Stanford to the position.

This argument against the probability of Huntington building to Astoria is combated by the statement that the extension will be for the benefit of the Oregonian railway, and not the Southern Pacific. At best there exists a beautiful tangle of railroad possibilities and probabilities as far as Astoria is concerned.

FOR AN OREGON EXHIBIT.

The State Should be Properly Represented at the World's Exposition.

The Oregon State Board of Commerce met at Portland last week for the purpose of arranging the work of Oregon's exhibit at the World's Columbian Exposition in 1893. Also the special committee of the Oregon Press Association met at the same time, having about the same object in view. Both organizations passed resolutions asking the support of the enterprising and progressive citizens of this great commonwealth to render such aid as will give Oregon a creditable display and place her in her proper rank among the progressive Pacific states. To make such a display, will require a considerable amount of money and the above organizations agreed to ask the legislature to appropriate \$250,000 for this purpose. This amount may look large, but the levy requisite to raise this amount would be so small that it would make any progressive man ashamed to speak of it in any way bearing the nature of criticism.

The State Board of Commerce and the Press Association committee will ask the coming legislature to take the matter in hand, because the legislature is the only proper body to take the matter in hand. By having the legislature to manage the work, we can reasonably expect to have the funds legitimately and economically used; the commissioners will be so appointed as not to favor any particular locality, but represent the state as a whole; make it a state affair, managed by the legitimate officers of the state.

A bill looking to this end has been prepared and will be submitted at the session of the legislature which convenes in January and petitions will be presented to the people in the meantime for the purpose of having a liberal appropriation, which ought to be done without hesitation.
