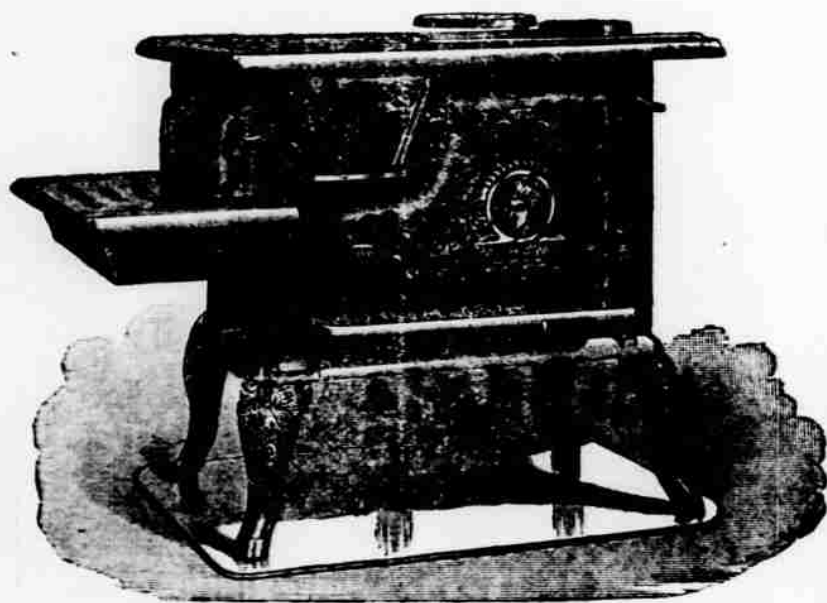

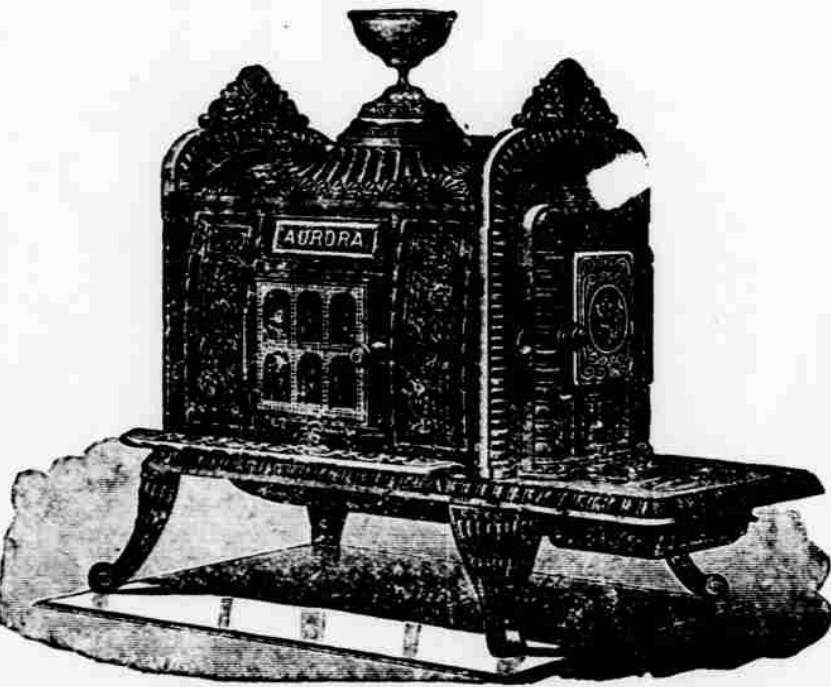

#### BLOODLESS WAR.

No Outbreak Yet and a Peaceful Solution Likely.

#### GERMAN CONSUMPTION CURE.

Asking for Premiums for Live Stock—Foot Ball in Yale and Harvard—Saris Fire.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—The war department has authorized the number of Indian scouts in the division of Dakota to be increased by five hundred men, which will be selected from the Indian police force. Major Schofield, this afternoon, said every hour that passed without an outbreak brightened the prospects of a peaceful settlement of the pending trouble. Secretaries Proctor and Noble were in consultation with the president this afternoon, who manifested much interest in the subject and decided that two regiments of cavalry should be sent to Pine Ridge from Arizona and New Mexico. Dispatches from General Miles state that the separation of the friendly and unfriendly Indians is proceeding rapidly at Pine Ridge. General Brooke anticipates no immediate trouble and thinks the separation will make it an easier task of restraining the turbulent Indians from over acts. Telegrams were received this afternoon by the report that the Messiah craze is rapidly extending north across the Canadian line under the operations of Sitting Bull's emissaries.

#### THE KOCH DISCOVERY.

The German Emperor Decorates Koch With a Title.

BERLIN, Nov. 22.—The bestowal by Emperor William of the grand crosses of the order of the Red Eagle upon Prof. Koch was gazetted tonight. This is the first time this decoration has been bestowed upon any one who did possess the preceding classes of the order. Enough confidence in the ultimate value of Koch's discovery has not elapsed, the public are disappointed over the immediate results. The treatment it grows daily. The opinion expressed by others are varied but nearly all advise conversation until further experiments make more positive the effect of the remedy.

#### A MANIAC'S DEED.

Wound Unto Death an Unsuspecting Lady.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The pretty creature of the Mariner's Temple, at the corner of Catherine and Madison streets, is lying in the Chambers street hospital with a 32-caliber bullet wound through her body. Her chance of recovery is exceedingly slim, although the doctors who watched her last night were optimistic.

The young woman was shot as she left the church last night at 8:30 o'clock, when the services were over, and the man who fired the bullet was simply a "remover" of the Donnelly order.

Clayde Price is her name. She is 24 years old and a tall handsome brunette of irreprouchable character. John T. Davie, the murderer, is 25 years old. No one appears to know just who or what he is, but that he is crazy there is no doubt. Here is the statement he made when questioned as to the motive for his act:

"This woman is my wife, my lawful wife, and she refuses to live with me. Gray Cleveland follows my wife about continuously and only this afternoon I challenged him in a lodging-house, to fight a duel. This is a clear case of premeditated murder, and I meant to kill her. Cleveland was a church to night, and sat on her right hand while she played the organ. My second shot was reserved for him, and I would have killed him too, for I know where he lives."

#### WORLD'S FAIR COMMISSION.

Live Stock Men Apposed an Offer of \$200,000 Premiums.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—The national commission to-day adopted a number of committee reports, including that of the judiciary committee, and later suffered from a fatal attack of death and unduly was temporarily deputed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22.—The Raymond and Whitcomb excursion train ran into a burning bridge here on the San Francisco today. The engine got across the bridge safe, but the baggage car and one sleeper were wrecked. One car was burned but no one was killed.

#### Knocked Out in Three Rounds.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 22.—Tommy Warren of California, and Tommy Miller of Indianapolis, fought here for the Audubon athletic club tonight for \$1,000. Miller clubbed the Yankee at all and was knocked out in the third round.

#### Beats the Record.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 22.—Elihu Kitching broke all previous equine records for high jumping. A man of less than thirty feet, he jumped over bars seven feet, two and a half inches high, without scratching.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Patrick J. Walsh of Augusta, Ga., was appointed a member of the Warm Springs Indian commission, vice Bill, of Pennsylvania, declined.

#### HORRIBLE SUICIDE.

A Lady Jumps From the Sixth Story Room.

AN UNFOUNDED SCARF.

An Excursion Train Runs into a Burning Bridge—Bishop Beckwith Dying Big Fire.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Mrs. Charles Combs of Brooklyn, daughter-in-law of the newly elected congressman of the third district, committed suicide in a horrible manner this afternoon. She went to the Piermont hotel and asked for a room on the top floor, saying she was troubled with palpitation of the heart and wanted to be away from all excitement. The manager conducted her to a room on the sixth floor, and soon after she sent for a bottle of wine and later rang for the chambermaid. When the latter entered the room she was standing with her arms outstretched in front of the window and she dashed the glass to the floor and rushing to the window, jumped out. She turned over and over, struck with her feet on the roof of the extension, bounded off and landed on a large floor mat standing in front of the hotel, and then she fell to the sidewalk, dead, when picked up.

Her mother is in a critical condition from the shock. The suicide has been married seven years, and lately suffered from ill health and unduly was temporarily deputed.

#### A RECREANT WIFE.

She is Found After a Long Search.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 22.—Dr. A. G. Lawson of Salt Lake City, after hunting over the country since last August, found his recreant wife in this city today in the company of a printer named Walker. It will be remembered that Mrs. Lawson went from Salt Lake to San Francisco early last August; sold some real estate belonging to her and the doctor for \$18,000 and then started East, telegraphing him to meet her in Chicago. He came, but couldn't find her and has since been hunting for her.

She claims to have married Walker in Denver. She would not leave him until Dr. Lawson threatened prosecution for bigamy, when she agreed to leave him, but she said that she would return to him when she could.

She asserts that Lawson had always been unkind to her, and that she abandoned him to escape his persecutions. Lawson says that she eloped with Walker once before, but he got her back.

There appears to be something missing in the stories of both. Lawson asserts that his wife and Walker have made away with the \$18,000 she got in San Francisco. The woman claims to be a niece of a marriage of General Lew Wallace.

#### A BARN BURNED.

#### A Monster Petion.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—A meeting of the bureau of the Siberian exile petition association was held this afternoon. George K. Kennan advocated the publication of a periodical for circulation in this country and Russia as means of bringing to public notice the condition of the Siberian exiles. It is announced that 100,000 names were obtained to the petition to be forwarded to the czar with the view to induce him to set some of Siberian exiles at liberty.

STOCKTON, Cal., Nov. 22.—Chief Thorn, a two year old pacer owned by L. U. Shippe made a mile in the time of 2:20 1/2. The judges announced that it was fastest record ever made by a two-year-old pacer on the coast, and fastest but one in the world.
