RAILROAD CONSOLIDATION

Jay Gould, who speaks as one having not only authority but a very thorough mastery of the subject is a warm advocate of railroad consolidation among the great transportation agencies of the United States.

That he is profoundly interested in the contributors to such dividends needs not even assertion.

Mr. Vanderbilt is reported to have been, but his concern for the people is probably no greater than that of the man who summarized the railroad side of the question with "the public be damned."

Mr. Gould favors the consolidation of railroads because it would cut off competition, reduce the expenses of superintendence and prevent rate cutting, all of which would inure to the benefit of the holders of railroad stocks.

In a business point of view much may be said for Mr. Gould's views. There is a great waste of force in our present system of carrying on railroads. Under proper arrangements one man could do the work of five and do it better and more satisfactorily.

But the corollary of this proposition, the San Francisco Chronicle boldly asserts, cannot be overlooked or misunderstood. If it be a desirable thing that the great railroads should consolidate, it follows that it would be still more desirable, so far as the people are concerned, that all railroads should pass under one control and that the control of the government of the United States.

If consolidation can secure dividends for stockholders, governmental control would insure better and cheaper service for the people, since the government would have no object in making profit out of the railroads which it managed.

Mr. Gould's gigantic consolidation may succeed, but if it does it will certainly be a long step toward the railroads of the United States passing into the hands and under the direct control of the federal government.

CONGRESS AGAIN IN SESSION

Our dispatches this morning furnish the news of the opening of the second session of the 51st congress, and also a summary of the presidents message. It is an able document, it shows a sound policy upon the questions before the country, and contains some recommendations that will result in much beneficial legislation if acted upon by congress.

This necessity of amending the senate rules so as to give the majority the power to end debate will be pressed upon that body as soon as the session is fairly open. There is no convincing reason why the senate should hesitate to take what seems to many of the older members so radical a step.

The republican majority is considerably reduced, and the change will be more vigorously resisted, while at the same time harder to accomplish. Just what the democratic majority in the house will do is a matter of as much anxiety to democrats as to republicans. If they make as good a record as did the republicans at the last session the people will be content.

WHILE the ex-Emperor of Brazil Dom Pedro, was attending the scientific lecture meetings at Paris the furniture in his former palace of Pon Vista was being sold at auction. Here are the prices paid at the auction for some pieces of the furniture: An armchair, having been used as a throne, 720 milreis; a bouquet of artificial flowers kept under a glass globe, 100 milreis; a writing-desk belonging to the ex-Emperor, 3,000 milreis; a prie Dieu, or praying-chair, 130 milreis; nine pieces, composing the whole furniture of the ex-Emperor's room, 4,400 milreis; a cloth piano-cover, 410 milreis; a Chickering square piano, 2,000 milreis. The Brazilian milreis is worth a little more than 50 cents; thus the imperial throne was sold for about \$370, or about one-third the price obtained for the American piano.

PLAINLY Secretary Proctor has felt the insinuating touch of the spirit of the age. His latest step is said to have caused "quite a stir" in the war department, but undoubtedly the secretary knows that he is right, and means to go ahead. He has caused the sale of the government horse used by one of the department messengers, and with the proceeds has purchased a bicycle for the messenger to ride hereafter.

The intolerable Mr. Porter has issued another "corrected bulletin" of the total population. Mr. Porter should be informed that the public will hail with pleasure a bulletin announcing that he has gone back to England to stay. But the census takers of the country would like for him first to pay for their work in the leafy month of June last.

The city election yesterday was very quiet and was attended by no violence and not enough strife to create an interest. That good men were elected goes without saying. The vote cast, however, does not by any means represent Albany's voting population, in fact hardly half of it.
