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ALLIANCE DEMANDS.

It Wants Very Much and Wants It Very Long.

DO NOT WANT TO ANNEX.

Will Contest—Rebate on Tobacco—National Board of Trade—For Seed Potatoes.

OCEANO, Dec. 8.—Early in the forenoon session of the farmers' alliance, a financial policy of order came up for discussion under the report of the committee on legislation. It contained the following:

First—Addition of national banks, establishment of sub-treasuries in several states to loan money direct to the people at a rate of interest not to exceed two per cent., a program on non-perishable farm products and real estate, with proper limitations upon the quantity of land and amount of money; that the amount of circulating medium be speedily increased to not less than \$50 per capita.

Second—Congress shall pass laws to effectively prevent dealing in futures on all agricultural production.

Third—Condemns the silver bill, recently passed, and demands free unlimited coinage of silver.

Fourth—Demands the passage of laws prohibiting alien ownership of land, and that the government should take prompt action to devise some plan to obtain all lands now owned by aliens and foreign syndicates, and that all lands held by railroads and other corporations in excess of what is actually needed and needed by them be returned and held for actual settlers only.

Fifth—We demand the removal of the existing heavy tariff tax from the necessities of life. We further demand a just and equitable system of a graduate tax on incomes. We believe all national and state revenues should be limited to the necessary expenses of the government, economically and honestly administered.

Sixth—We demand the most rapid and honest and just state and national control and supervision of the means of public communication and transportation, and in this control do not remove the abuse now existing, we demand government ownership of such means of communication and transportation.

A spirited debate followed the introduction of this report.

At the night session a resolution was passed, urging the establishment of postal savings banks, just before adjournment Buchanan of Tennessee, took occasion to warmly denounce the members who had furnished information to the press representatives as "scoundrels, liars, knaves and traitors." After passing the customary resolutions of thanks, the National Alliance, at 1 o'clock Tuesday morning, adjourned.

HE DENIES THE STORY.

And Says There is No Plan of Annexation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Carter, minister from Hawaii left the city tonight for San Francisco to consult with King Kalakaua. To a reporter he expressed the belief that the story from San Francisco, that the king is here on the mission of annexation is an absurd invention. He said "the king, I am free to say is anxious for the extension of reciprocity plan to all products of the island, and it is no doubt to that subject that he was to talk to me."

Appropriations for Seed Potatoes.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8.—In the house of commons, Balfour's Irish relief bill, asking appropriation for fifty thousand pounds for the purpose of supplying seed potatoes to the distressed farmers, passed its third reading. McCarthy gave notice that upon the re-assembly of the house would call attention to the circumstances in connection with Dillon and O'Brien.

Will Contest the Election.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—Judge Blanchard, of Placer county, late republican nominee for congress in the second district, is in the city in consultation with his attorney for the purpose of contesting the election.

They Surrender Their Property.

MEADVILLE, Pa., Dec. 8.—The assignees of Delaney & Co., made a statement this afternoon showing the assets to be \$473,000 and the liabilities \$545,000. All the members of the firm have surrendered their personal property.

Twenty Million.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 8.—John A. Blair, secretary of the Chevreton strike stock association, said today that the association is about to offer the Mayes twenty million dollars for the strike.

He Declines.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Parnell has sent a dispatch to Milwaukee, Wis., declining an offer of \$15,000 for one hundred lectures.

Rebate on Tobacco.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The house passed the McKinley bill, providing for a rebate on tobacco.

CHURCH TOLERANCE.

It Retains Its Membership a Prison Felon.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Forger Albert H. Smith, although clad in the striped suit of a convict and serving a seventy-two years' sentence for forgery, will obtain some little comfort in his cell in Sing Sing when he is informed that he is a member in good standing of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn. In his name is to remain on the roll of membership, and when he returns from Sing Sing he may resume his place among the other brethren. At the monthly meeting of the church, a letter from Smith setting forth his repentance and asking advice.

After a short talk on the matter the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, That this church, fully recognizing the sin of Albert H. Smith in the act for which he is now suffering the legal penalty, retain his name upon the rolls, in the faith that no man more needs the watch and care of a Christian church than one who has fallen into sin, but his sincere repentance of his sin and desires to return to the way of righteousness and life."

Our message to our brother is that God is merciful and aboveseth all those that truly repent and unfeignedly believe His holy gospel, and we commend him to the prayers of the members of our church, and to such special offices of spiritual aid as it may be possible for the pastors and members of this church to render to him."

W. B. Boorman and Thomas G. Shearman seconded the resolution. No other remarks were made. Deacon Blair put the question, and without a dissenting voice the resolution was carried. After the meeting there was much quiet talk among the members, but no open expression was made against the retention of the name of Smith in the roll.

DAY IN CONGRESS.

GORMAN OPPOSES THE ELECTION BILL.

Heur Tells Gorman To Bring Out the Important Measures They Are Not Forthcoming.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The argument on the election bill was continued in the senate today. Gorman spoke at length in opposition to the bill. He appealed to the senate to lay aside the election bill and consider a measure to relieve the stringency of the money market. He replied that for four days the senate had been listening to democratic speeches, etc., and for merely a measure which he thought would ally the panic or menace to the commercial prosperity of the country, which had begun when the elections were declared in favor of the democratic party, the country having been before that in a position of unequaled prosperity. We should be not for a fair and proper statement of reasons for voting against the election bill. Let the senate vote upon it.

CHAIRMAN WALKER.

Expresses His Idea of Solving Railroad Difficulties.

EXPLOSION IN CHINA.

Parnell and Anti-Parnell He Was a Methodist But His Sin Was Not the Fault of the Church.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The journal of finance to-day made public for the first time, a lengthy letter, recently written by Chairman Walker of the interstate commerce association, to various railroad presidents, on the general condition of railway affairs and a plan for reform in the present methods. He says the present legislative attitude of congress and the state is injurious, but railroad difficulties are not wholly due to that cause. Competition as it now exists among carriers is ruinous, he says, is simply war. This situation, he says, pleases the unreflecting public, and the necessary inference is that railroads are playing their adversaries game. Such wild and reckless methods are not in the interest of the public, and are ruinous to railway systems. He calls on the presidents to recognize the essential unity of the railway interests, and make a new treaty based on disarmament. The fundamental principle of the association should be concentration of authority and unification of interests. Joint agencies should replace innumerable separate agencies now in existence. The work of the traffic division also might be very properly embrace the clearing house idea, under which it would receive copies of all billing, and adjust accounts between the companies.

THE IDAHO LEGISLATURE.

They Will Commence Balloting for United Senator Wednesday.

BOISE CITY, Dec. 8.—The first state legislative of Idaho convened at noon to-day. Every member, 10 democrats, 14 republicans was in attendance. The senate was called to order by Lieut. Governor Wiley and the members sworn in by Chief Justice Sullivan. No further business was transacted and the senate adjourned until 11 o'clock to-morrow.

The house was called to order by Hon. H. Z. Buckhart of Haley, speaker of the last territorial house of representatives, and immediately proceeded to the election of a speaker, which resulted in the choice of Frank Fenn, of Idaho county. Charles Ree, of Ada county, was elected chief clerk and Miss Carrie Sweet assistant. John Hunter was made administrative officers filled. The house then adjourned till 10 o'clock to-morrow. Balloting for United States senators will probably begin Wednesday.

THREE HUNDRED LIVES LOST.

That Is What the Powder Explosion Caused.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—The Chinese advised say the details of the blowing up, on Nov. 2nd, of the government powder mill at that place, are meagre, but agree in stating that three hundred lives were lost and all the houses in the vicinity are wrecked.

SUNDAY CLOSING BUSINESS.

They Will Not Pay Subscriptions Until the Question Is Settled.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—It is reported that a number of the prominent Germans have protested against paying their subscriptions until such time as they are given positive information as to whether the exposition is to be closed Sundays or not. They are decidedly opposed to Sunday closing.

The Two Parnell Factions.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8.—The anti-Parnellite section of the Irish party met to-day and appointed a committee to assist McCarthy in determining the future action of the party. During the coming week Parnell will make addresses at the various places in Ireland.

They Make an Assignment.

SALEM, Dec. 8.—Cox & Boggs, grocers, this morning made an assignment to W. H. Conrad, in favor of their creditors. Liabilities, \$8000; assets, unknown. Most of the creditors are Portland firms.

Too Late Parnell Says.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Wm. O'Brien sent a cable dispatch to Parnell to-day, appealing to him to suggest some way by which Ireland might be saved from destruction. Parnell replied: "It is now too late to rescue sufferers from their false position."

Heavy Failure.

BIRMINGHAM, Conn., Dec. 8.—A postcard contractor, A. L. Daggett, was to-day declared bankrupt on a petition of creditors. The amount of the claims is unknown. His debts in this state, will probably exceed \$50,000.

SHE WAS TIRED OF LIFE.

A Variety Actress Commits Suicide by Shooting Herself.

SEATTLE, Dec. 8.—A variety actress named Edith Valentine committed suicide in her room in a lodging house this morning by shooting herself. She left a note addressed to "My darling husband Joe Vogler," in which she said she was tired of life and wanted to die at once. Vogler says he never married the woman and that her death causes him no concern. She was under treatment for brain trouble and it is thought she was insane.

JUDGMENT REVERSED.

And Ordered to This County for a Rerhearing.

SALEM, Dec. 8.—In the supreme court to-day a decision was rendered in the case of Emil Schneider, respondent vs. the O. P. railway company, appellant, on an appeal from Linn county. Judgment of the lower court was reversed and the case was remanded for further proceedings.

Federation of Labor.

DETROIT, Dec. 8.—The delegates to the American federation of labor assembled this morning. President Gompers delivered the annual address.

Gompers, in his annual address, advised the convention to avoid any controversial questions and concentrate their efforts upon such issues as the members were most agreed. During the year the federation established 274 local branches and national trades union, 913 existing branches added 5 to 35 per cent. in membership. The address declares in favor of the system of national union of individual trades. During the year 1165 strikes were authorized and had taken place, 850 succeeded, 70 failed, 18 compromises. Gompers refers, in commendation, to the project of an international labor congress in '95, coincident with the world's fair, and demands the enforcement of the eight hour law in government. He asks for a suitable federal, alien, contract labor law, and suggests the extended observation on labor day, as a annual holiday.

A Swindling Game.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 8.—For the past three weeks, two men and a woman have been carrying on a swindling game in this city. Their names are not known, but they operate under the name of The Darling Portrait Company. They procured to-day a portrait painting and enlargement of photographs. For this ten dollar was charged. A great many poor laboring girls and young women were victimized. This morning it was discovered that the trio had left the city, leaving a number of unpaid bills.

The National Board of Trade.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 8.—The national board of trade met this afternoon. There were 75 present representing the leading boards of trade, including that of Portland, Oregon. Mayor Shakespeare welcomed the delegates. Fred F. Raley was re-elected president. A number of vice-presidents were elected.

Coming to America.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Parnell will send a mission to the United States to place before the American people his side of the controversy.

His peculiarity in this respect might have escaped notice, but that the weapon was discharged and seriously wounded a brakeman who was handling the trunk.
