Another clause provides that the Jews shall be dispossessed of any real estate they may hold.

BURNED TO DEATH.

A BURNING LOG ROLLS ON A WOMAN. Her Husband Witnessed the Accident, but Was Powerless to Save Her—Flesh Terribly Cooked.

PORTLAND, Dec. 10.—One of the most horrible accidents which has occurred in these parts for a long time is reported from Pleasant Home, a little country village about six miles from here. A farmer named Eckeron was engaged in clearing some land and was burning up the heavy logs and a few days ago. While he was thus employed his wife came out from the house to see him for some purpose. She stepped on a log which was nearly buried in two. As she did so her weight caused the log to part. The log was on a side hill and when it broke the pieces rolled down the incline. The woman fell on the lower side and one of the heavy pieces rolled on her and buried her. She was lying on her back and her upturned face was under the end of the log which was still ablaze, the coals and hot ashes dropping down on her face. Her husband for a moment was paralyzed with terror and unable to act. The burning and flaming log was unable to remove the log from the form of his wife, he ran half a mile for help. When he and another man came back it was found they could do nothing with an ax, and so Eckeron had to go half a mile back for one. Finally the log was removed and the mangled and now lifeless form of the unfortunate woman was taken to her home.

CANNOT ADMINISTER OATHS.

A Decision that Will Affect the Title to Many Acres of Land.

SEATTLE, Dec. 10.—A decision affecting the validity of title to many thousand acres of coal and timber lands entered in this state was rendered in the United States district court today. Three men who had entered coal lands in this state made affidavits before a notary public that they had made the requisite amount of improvements on claims. The men were, however, indicted by the United States grand jury for perjury. Their attorney demurred on the ground that a notary public is not authorized by the United States statutes to administer oaths, and hence his acts would not be recognized. The court sustained the demurrer and held that notary public is not a competent officer to administer oaths, and that the United States do not recognize a notary.

DAY IN CONGRESS.

A Busy Day in Both Houses—A Postmaster Appointed.

BILLS PASSED IN THE SENATE.

The House Committee on Rivers and Harbors Decides Not to Prepare an Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—In the senate, the house bill to authorize the payment of a drawback or rebate on tobacco to correct the imbalance in the tariff bill, was passed. The senate then resumed the consideration of the election bill. Senator Hawley today introduced a bill to derive a line of authority and increase its efficiency. The bill provides for the same number of regulars in the infantry, cavalry and engineers as at present, but increases the artillery to two regulars. Each regiment, infantry, cavalry and artillery will have one colonel, one lieutenant-colonel, three majors and the usual number of junior officers with twelve companies. The number of enlisted men of all grades is not to exceed 30,000, five thousand of whom may be Indians at the discretion of the president. The regulars of the artillery will be offered by promotion and the assignment and transfer of officers now in that branch. Senator Farwell today introduced a bill to amend section 1 of the present silver law so as to direct the secretary of the treasury to purchase all the silver bullion offered at market price, not exceeding \$1 for 37.125 grains of pure silver, and issue in payment United States treasury notes. Senator Wolcott introduced a bill to make applicable certain sections of the revised statutes, so that hereafter coinage of gold and silver may be carried on at the branch mint at Denver.

THE HOUSE.

The representatives composing the house contingent of the joint congressional committee on immigration, agreed upon a bill to regulate immigration. Chairman Owen will report the bill as soon as possible. In explanation of the general features of the measure, Owen today said: "It is a new contract of labor law, very different from the old law, so completely inefficient that, according to the testimony of the labor inspectors employed, twenty per cent. of the immigration now coming to this country is in violation of the contract labor law. The state of things that existed at the time the law was passed, employers have now changed their methods and the law is unable to reach them. It is practically useless, so we have framed a new law. We have also very largely enlarged the prohibited classes of immigrants. Polygamists are added to the list of classes defined in the Owen bill as not entitled to be admitted into the United States. Tax upon aliens, which in Owen's bill was fixed at 50 cents, was increased by the committee to \$1. In the house a bill was passed authorizing the Corpus Christi and Padre Island Harbor Company to construct a harbor off the shore of Padre Island, coast of Texas. Hatway was elected postmaster of the house. Cletcher today introduced a bill to authorize the president to prescribe a system for the examination of enlisted men in the army to determine their fitness for promotion to the grade of second lieutenant with the army.

RIVERS TO BE IMPROVED.

\$20,000 Will Be Spent on Nook Creek, Skagit, Sushumish Rivers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Assistant Secretary of War Grant has sent to congress the report of Captain Thomas W. Symans, of the engineer corps, giving the results of the preliminary examinations of Nook Creek, Skagit and Sushumish rivers, Washington. The opinion of Captain Symans, concurred in by Colonel Mendell, is that the three rivers are worthy of improvement, and with an appropriation of \$20,000 everything necessary for their improvement for the present can be done. Improvements have been going on in these rivers since 1882, and \$67,000 have been spent, including \$20,000 for a snagboat.

Villard is All Right.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 10.—In an interview today Henry Villard said the flurry in Wall street had not affected his interest and that his relations with the Northern Pacific and with the North American and other companies were the same as they had been and would remain the same.

Switchman Killed.

PORTLAND, Dec. 10.—D. H. Cope, a young switchman, aged 23 years, died at St. Vincent hospital at 7:30 o'clock this morning, from injuries received in an accident at The Dalles last night.

Charged With Smuggling Opium. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—Geo. Dickson, assistant engineer on the steamer City of Sydney, which plies between this port and Panama, was arrested by the United States marshal today, on a warrant from Seattle, charging him with smuggling twelve pounds of opium into that port. Dickson was formerly employed on the steamer Alki, which runs along the Northern coast. Women Cannot Hold Office. SPRINGFIELD, Wash., Dec. 10.—Superior Judge Mouton today decided that Mrs. C. H. Pryor, who was elected superintendent of public schools in November is ineligible to office under the constitution and statutes of the state. Mrs. Pryor held the office under territorial government. Slavia and McAnulty Released. LONDON, Dec. 10.—In the case of the government against Slavia and McAnulty, charged with prize fighting, a verdict of "not guilty" was today returned by consent of the prosecution. The prisoners were released. An Important Step. CROP REPORT.

AN ADVANCE IN THE PRICE OF CEREALS.

The Average Farm Value of the Wheat Crop is Estimated at Eighty-Four Cents Per Bushel. WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Statistical returns from the department of agriculture for December gave the average farm prices of agricultural products from estimates made both by the government and state. The present corn crop is worth more than the last, and farmers will receive more for it. The average price by the present returns is 60.1 per bushel, against 58.3 for '89. It is the highest December price of a decade except '81, when the average rose to 63.6 cents. The average farm value of the wheat crop is estimated at 84 cents per bushel, against 83.8 for '89. The value of wheat is affected by the harvest of other countries, and therefore the prices are not entirely governed by the size of the home grown crop. The price of oats has responded sharply to the pressure of a small crop, and increased demand because of a short corn crop. The average is 42.2 cents against 23 cents last year. It is the highest report since '81. Rye, like oats, at 62.9 cents is higher than since '81, and the same is true of barley at 64.8. The deficiency in the potato crop has caused an advance in values in all sections of the country. The average 77.7 cents, increase of more than 90 per cent over the prices of the past two years. Hay alone of all the farm products records a decline from last year. The present prices are 77.4 per ton and falling off, due to increased product.

THEY KNOW ITS VALUE.

Cherokee Indians Not Anxious to Sell Their Land.

TABLEAU, I. T., Dec. 10.—The report that the Cherokee Nation has received an offer of \$10,000,000 from one syndicate and \$20,000,000 from another for its land, was received here this morning. Chief Mayo being asked what would be done about the offer, answered, that they would have consideration from the council. He said the offer had changed the nation entirely, and added: "If the land belongs to the Cherokee nation, which the supreme court will undoubtedly decide, you can rest assured that we will not sell it for any \$10,000,000 or \$20,000,000. We are wealthy, and shall wait for ten or twenty years or more, if necessary, before disposing of the land. The government's offer of \$7,000,000 for the strip will not be accepted. We want all it is worth, and can tell better what will be done after the title is settled."

Before the South Omaha Club.
