A Southern View of the Pending Election Bill.

STANFORD'S MONEY SCHEME.

INDIANS EXECUTED.

One of the Biggest Hangings Known in the Northwest.

COLD-BLOODED MURDERERS.

A Sheriff Under Excitement Dies from Heart Disease, but the Hanging Goes On—Eastern News.

MISSOULA, Mont., Dec. 19.—The greatest hanging which ever took place in the Northwest occurred here this morning, when L. A. See, Pierre Paul, Antley and Pascale, four Indian murderers, were hanged at the court house.

WON ON A FOUL

The Killen-Sheehy Fight Was a Knock Down and Drag Out.

ST. PAUL, Dec. 19.—The prize fight between Pat Killen, of this city, and Joe Sheehy, of Ashland, Wisconsin, Queenbury rules, for the Northwestern heavyweight championship, which occurred to-night, lasted about five minutes. Sheehy rushed at the start, but fouled by striking below the belt while he clinched. Killen got in a good blow, however, and would not claim a foul. In a second Killen fell both ash Sheehy, who proceeded to pound him while sitting on him. The men were separated and another clinch followed. The referee stepped in and separated them and received punishment from Sheehy that nearly knocked him out. The police intervened and the fight, which was decided in Killen's favor on a foul.

STATE AND COAST

A Receiver Wanted for the North West Insurance Company.

ITS BUSINESS IS ILLY MANAGED.

An Upward Tendency in the Wheat Market—The Outlook of the Arterio and South Coast Railroad.

RECEIVED

Portland, Dec. 19.—On the 8th of this month, Charles R. Burnett, of New York, filed a petition in the United States circuit court of his district, for the appointment of a receiver to take charge of the Northwest Fire & Marine Insurance Company of this city, to wind up its business affairs as soon as possible. The petitioner alleges that he is the holder of 110 shares of stock in the company, and that the value of said shares has been greatly diminished by reason of the manner in which the directors and other officers of the company have conducted its business. He claims that, although the company was earning no money whatever, a dividend of 7 per cent was declared on the 31st of December, 1887, and that on the 1st of December following another dividend of 7 per cent was declared, and that to pay this dividend an assessment was levied upon the stock during the month of October last, another assessment of 50 per cent, as authorized, by the collection of which the entire capital stock could be wholly paid up. This as made necessary by the fact that the former capital stock had suffered losses aggregating over \$90,000 by reason of the great res last year in Washington. The petition was taken before Judge Deady this afternoon for argument. Judge J. H. Woodward prepared for the petitioner and Mr. W. B. Gilbert represented the company. Mr. Woodward claimed that the total amount paid upon the company's bonds was \$53,000, while the various statements made by the secretary showed the assets to be \$234,822.50. The difference, he claimed, was represented by premiums, balance due on assessments, unsecured personal notes and unpaid stock, which was defective and illegal. The stock of the company has suffered greatly and if a settlement were to be made, nothing would be left for the shareholders, but if a receiver is appointed and one but go to work is allowed, the finances of the company can be put in a shape so as to work can be closed with loss to none.

THE PARNELL FIASCO

IT WAS MUD, NOT LIME, THROWN INTO HIS FACE.

His Injuries Said to Have Been Inflicted by Women Who Tossed Him with Flour and Mud.

BERLIN, Dec. 19.—The Freeman's Journal, commenting upon the present political campaign says Parnell will carry Kilkenny in the approaching election, provided the priests held aloof from the contest.

A SEALER SEIZED.

For Raiding and Making False Entries at the Custom House.

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 19.—Collector Milne at 10 o'clock this morning seized the German schooner Adele for infraction of the customs laws. She cleared here last September for Yokohama, but instead of going to that port went to Behring sea where she raided Pribyloff islands, killing and taking 400 seal. She returned to this port on Sunday, did not enter at 10 o'clock, but was seized on Tuesday. She was then seized on two charges, one of false declaration outwardly, the other not entering and giving a report of the voyage. The penalty is \$300. The sealers here are pleased that Collector Milne has taken action, as piracy and raiding seal islands is not contemplated here.

500 DEAD CHINESE.

The Explosion of a Powder Mill Kill Many Mongolians.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—The steamer Belgic arrived this morning, bringing Chinese advices to the effect that 500 Chinese, all of whom started for Bad Lands, Morris says Sitting Bull's Indians are well armed and determined to avenge his death.

A FAITHFUL INDIAN WOMAN

She Walks Eighty Miles to Reach Her Dying Husband.

FORT YATES, Dec. 19.—Bulla Head's body was buried to-day with military honors. His squaw, who was upon Cannon all river when she heard of the fight, started at once for Fort Yates and walked eighty miles without rest. She reached her husband just before his death, and fell in a faint.

THE GROWTH OF BRAINS.

There is Still Hope for Some of the Older Fools.

In the inferior race the head ceases to grow after twenty years of age. In the superior race the head of the intelligent and educated man increases in volume until thirty-five, forty and fifty years. The skull has reached its maximum development when the bones composing it are welded together, and it is rendered the sutures invisible. Once the sutures are solidified, the further growth of the brain is impossible which is said to explain the insurmountable stupidity experienced in trying to teach illiterate adults. The solidification varies according to the investigating activity of the brain. It takes place between the ages of twenty-two and twenty-five years in the task-worker, between twenty-eight and thirty-five in the middle-class manual professions, and after thirty-five in educated persons who practice intellectual professions. Recent experiments in the female colleges of Russia prove that woman's head,

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
