THE BANKING BUSINESS.
One of the most essential questions before the American people is the one of the legal banking business of the future.

But a banking system that shall extend beyond the limits of our own country is also a desirable acquisition. The American banker says on his subject that "among the judicious commercial expedients which congress is invited to consider is the international bank, respecting which the president transmitted a favorable report to congress from the international convention. There is a growing belief among the mercantile and banking interests that Mr. Blaine's plan for establishing an international bank is not only well adapted to benefit our southern neighbors, but is easily capable of receiving such amendments as would make it a valuable work to our financial system, as well as an active aid to that commercial independence and sound expansion which is becoming necessary every year to our foreign commerce, and to other functions of our national life.

ONE OF THE essentially American projects that is now being evolved is the canal across the isthmus. An eastern exchange remarks that the rapidity with which work on the Nicaragua Canal is being conducted, as shown by the report of the company engaged in the construction, will give pleasure to the country. This is an American enterprise to the extent that the corporation at the head of it has an American charter, receives its chief support from American capital, and when finished, will furnish important aid to American commerce. The original engineer's estimate of the cost of construction was \$64,000,000, and the time required to do the work was put at between five and six years. Experience with other enterprises of the kind suggests the likelihood that in neither particular will expectation be completely realized. But even with a moderate advance in each case, the canal must ultimately be a paying investment.

PERHAPS the most absurd thing that has come up, upon the tariff business, is the recent position taken by the Hawaiian government upon the sugar phase of the question. Hawaii has had a reciprocity treaty that has admitted sugar free into this country. Now that the McKinley bill admits sugar free from all countries, that little kingdom is kicking out of the traces and complaining at what it claims as injustice in thus giving it a fair show with every other country, and wants this government to give it a bounty of 2 cents per pound on sugar. The incongruous absurdity of this request cannot but be apparent to every one who thinks upon the subject and appreciates the situation.

The grave and reverend signiors who occupy the position of the United States senators, were recently made the victims of a humming that was both successful and funny. Each one was addressed with neat little note saying that a baby had been named after them, and a christening gift would be acceptable. Nearly every one so addressed it is said responded, and the swindlers reaped quite a harvest of a reward for their care dishonesty. The result is not very complimentary for the amount of vanity possessed by the senators.

GEN. MILLS, in the conduct of the military affairs against the Indians in the recent ghost dance difficulties, has made a decided improvement upon former Indian war campaigns. The prompt suppression of Sitting Bull and his followers has quickly terminated the trouble, without much bloodshed. It has taken a long time to accurately learn just what the Indian needs and requires, but apparently we have at last arrived at that knowledge.

The religious craze of the Indians which has resulted in the hostilities of the present season, and led to the death of the wily old Sitting Bull, is no new departure in Indian lore, or for that matter in the conduct of any uncivilized people. The more barbarous a tribe may be the more apt they are to harbor superstitious notions and imagine that they are fit subjects for special divine aid.

A GENERAL strike of switchmen and railway operatives on lines verging in Pittsburg is threatened, the object being to secure less hours of labor and an increase of pay. The usual object of the reinstatement of some individual member that has been discharged is lacking in this instance. They wish the hours of labor reduced from 12 to 8.
