

STILL NO MONEY.

DESTITUTE RAILROAD MEN ATTACK THE OFFICE.

A Crowd of the Men While Drunk Storm the Contractors Office in Portland—A Spry Situation.

Portland, Dec. 31.—Mr. J. H. Smith, the Union Pacific contractor, received the following dispatch this morning:

Omaha, Dec. 31, 1891. To J. H. Smith & Co., Portland, Or.: There is nothing new or important transpiring to-day, but I think that by the 2d of January I will be able to wire you something that will be interesting.

J. D. Kilpatrick. About 11 o'clock this morning a crowd of laborers, mostly Swedes and Italians, blocked the hallway leading to Smith & Co's office.

In the front office Mr. Robert Brook, Mr. Smith's nephew and partner, marking time, checks O. K. While he was engaged in that work, a party of six Swedes, all of them being more or less intoxicated, rushed in and demanded their money.

Mr. Brook assured them that everything possible had been done to get the money for them, but that in consequence of a failure to secure the cash the men would have to wait a little while longer.

The men grew boisterous and began cursing Mr. Brook and called him all the vile names they could bring to tongue.

All this Mr. Brook stood with heroic patience, till the men allowed their frenzy to go into a fury, and rushing into the private office essayed to make an assault on Mr. Brook.

The latter then doubled up his fists and went in for self-protection. He laid one of the men named Fred Anderson out upon the floor and the others retreated. Anderson was taken from the office and they then proceeded to cause Mr. Brook's arrest for committing an assault with a dangerous weapon.

That the Union Pacific has money enough on deposit in the banks here to pay the men is a fact well known by many leading citizens. And it is further known that every day the company send money from Portland to the Eastern office to furnish sufficient aid to the men now hungry and homeless.

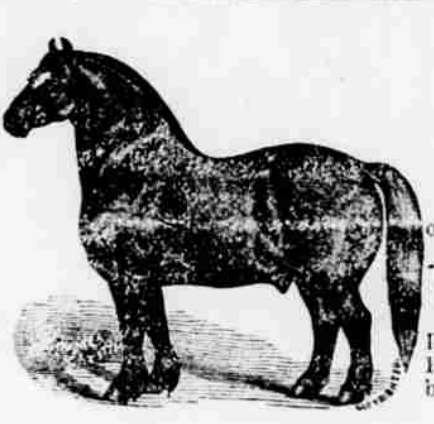
