THE INDIANS

It is perhaps cheerful news to hear that the troops have been able to "bring in" a portion of the hostile Indians that have been creating such a disturbance, but it would give greater satisfaction to the public to hear that the whole lot of them were buried right where they are. The United States has spent years and millions of dollars in the effort to render the Indians self-sustaining and comfortable. They have been given land, provisions and protection, and still they want the white men's scalps and plunder.

It is quite common to hear it said that all the present trouble has grown out of the bad faith of the United States government toward the Indians, but there is no evidence of anything of the sort. As Secretary Noble says, the government has been feeling the Sioux in idleness for years in fulfillment of its treaty obligations, and this very generosity has bred in them a spirit of discontent and fault-finding which has come to a head in open revolt.

Treaties with the nomadic Indians are very one-sided affairs. The United States considers itself bound by its contracts, and carries out its obligations to the fullest extent, while the Indians observe the treaty only so long and in so far as they like or as seems to their advantage. They are a wild and untamable race, possessed of a certain amount of shrewdness and cunning, but with no sense of the binding force of an obligation such as marks intercourse among civilized nations. It may sound cruel to say so, but the only solution of the problem of the nomadic Indians is their extermination, since they will not become amenable to the laws and regulations of the dominant race nor will they keep faith with that race unless it appears distinctly to their advantage so to do, and not always then. The inferior must give way to the superior always, and the case of the Indians of the prairies and plains is no exception to the rule.

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, reports that a harvester trust has saved \$10,000,000 in expenses over the old competitive system without increasing prices to buyers. This it is said, is done by decreasing competitive advertising, commissions to agents and middlemen, and by the closing up of small factories that could not be economically carried on. This sounds very fishy, for everyone knows that when men get control of monopoly they are under very strong temptations to work it for all it is worth, to the disadvantage of consumers and their own ultimatum.

The sinking of the steamer Champion in the Willamette near Salem, by striking a stump in the river, is but more evidence of the need of a little government work in improving the upper Willamette. A moderate amount expended at the right time would keep the river open for steamboats as far up as Albany the year round and this important work ought not to be neglected.

DIVERSIFIED crops is one of the great demands on the part of the Oregon farmer just now. Wheat at 60 cents does not compare, as a profitable crop, to oats at 50 cents, hops at 30 or 40 cents, or even potatoes at half a dollar, while good fruit always brings good prices.

The orphan's home and hospital of Albany should receive a liberal appropriation at the hands of the legislature.

There is every reason to believe that the immigration to Oregon this year will be very large.

OVERSPOILING THE EARTH.

At a recent meeting of the British Association an elaborate set of statistics was produced to show that the world will, in the ordinary course of things, be fully inhabited in about 182 years, which estimate considerably extends the period at which some learned men believe humanity will be crowded to excess. Having previously swept away the arctic and antarctic regions as not being essential for his argument, he parceled out the remainder of the earth into: Cultivable land, 28,569,000 square miles; steppe, scrub, poor grass, etc., 13,901,000 square miles; barren deserts, 4,180,000 square miles; a total of 46,550,000 square miles. The population living upon this he reckons at a little over 1,467,000,000, divided thus: Europe, 360,200,000; Asia, 650,000,000; Africa, 127,000,000 (a much lower estimate than most people compute); Australia, 4,750,000; North America, 87,250,000; South America, 38,500,000.

Mr. Ravenstein showed how, supposing the standard of life among the various people to remain the same, supposing the population increases at the rate of 8 per cent. in every decade, and supposing there are no extraordinary improvement in agriculture, the population that these areas would bear (mentioning 270 individuals to the square mile as a fair average), he suggests that the productivity of the earth might be better utilized when people understood economy.
