THE BODAVILLE SPRINGS.

Senator Myers' Bill for Their Improvement Should Become a Law. The bill introduced in the senate at the opening of the present session of the legislature is a measure deserving the support of the members from every portion of the state. The site of the springs has been dedicated to the public, and there should be no hesitancy in appropriating the small amount of \$300,000 for the improvement of these springs. There ought to be no objection raised in the legislature for this expenditure. The bill as introduced by Myers is to appropriate \$300,000 for the establishment of Soda Springs, in Soda Valley, Oregon, and that all money not so spent shall be retained to keep such improvements in good order. The Herald hopes to see the bill pass. It has already gone to its second reading in the senate.

Salem's New Bridge.

The new bridge at Salem, which spans the river between Marion and Polk counties, was completed Tuesday, and accepted by the courts of the two counties, meeting in joint session. The cost of the structure complete, including all changes, is \$33,339.99. The grand total is made up from the following: Bridge and approach, \$10,000; contract price, \$20,000; sidewalk, extra grillage, pile-pier protection, etc., \$3,000; concrete in the original piers, and changes, \$3,000; extra cement in McCoy pier, \$1,402.50; removing McCoy pier, \$829.55; cylinder pier, \$874.40; support foundation and pile of logs, \$2,134.49. This amount is offset by the following credits: Deductions for pier protection, not required after changes, etc., \$1,033; Polk county warrants, \$11,668.40; Marion county warrants, (including Salem), \$30,000; total, \$45,701.40, which leaves a balance of \$10,000, to be paid by Marion county or Polk county, as shall be determined.

The very flattering article in my favor which appeared in the New York World was sent to me before publication for examination. I returned it with the urgent request that it should not be printed. And I would add here that I not only do not desire the advocacy of the Oregonian or any other paper however honestly given, while I do most strongly appreciate any hypothetical support from any source, I despise a hypocrite. And now in regard to ex-President Cleveland. Now that the fact is out that I do not favor his nomination, I will say that besides his complicity with the Rock Springs fraud, I object to his acquisition of the substitution of bayonet rule for civil law at Seattle about five years ago, his opposition to the free coinage of silver; his favoritism of the national banks; the loud silence he has maintained in all his public utterances in regard to the exactions of corporate power, and his leading the democratic party into the support of a protective tariff measure so far as woollen manufacturers were concerned. This is all I have said or will say, in regard to either or both of these topics for publication.
