ONE BAD HABIT.

The downfall of many a noble, worthy and influential man, can be traced to the American habit of treating, a custom that has gained such a foothold that it seems absolutely impossible to dislodge or reform it. Well and truthfully does a recent writer say that the custom of treating is one of the most pernicious and foolish that ever cursed society, and its abolition, if it were practical, would be one of the greatest of public boons. The custom is said to have originated in the primitive days of the nation, when the settlers had to resort to the mutual help plan, and when the neighbors gathered for barn-raising or a log-rolling the host set 'em up for the boys, and upon similar occasions the compliment was returned. But, whatever its origin, it is distinctly an American custom. In no other country do men stand up to a bar and buy drinks alternately for each other until both become "tired." Two-thirds of the drinking done, two-thirds of the money spent for drink, two-thirds of the resulting wretchedness, are due to the treating system. Men take drink after drink that they do not want, and spend money to pay for drinks for other people, oftentimes men they hardly know or perhaps dislike. Furthermore, the custom, looked at in the proper way, is degrading and unmanly. It assists in forming bad associations, habits of "loafing around," and precludes a person from his most sacred privilege—that of choosing his own associates. People who join in the social drink should be those who are on the closest and most intimate relations. There is no hospitality or generosity in the American treating that there is in the giving of an Indian who takes his present back. Every man keeps a mean little tab in his head on his fellows, and the score is kept even all around. There is comparatively little solitary drinking among our people. The number of men who go to drinking places and buy a drink for themselves alone is comparatively few. Abolish treating and the saloon would be shorn of three-fourths of their revenue, and their number would be diminished in the same ratio. It was upon these facts and principles that some years ago a club was formed in Brooklyn with the object of making it discreditable for any gentleman to give or accept a treat. But it accomplished nothing, and was short-lived. The custom—expensive, absurd, and mischievous as it is—has taken too strong a hold to be easily uprooted, and will probably last as long as the saloon.

It is a singular fact that a large percentage of criminals of the most vicious classes in all countries are possessed with a mania for tattooing emblems upon various portions of the body. Scientists find in this tendency an indication of primitive savagery, centuries of civilization having failed to eradicate the inclination. It is this same unshaded savagery which leads the criminals of this class to war against society. This tendency to tattoo the body is noticed in childhood, and Bertillon, the famous French inventor of a system of prison measurements, includes tattooing in his list of personal peculiarities of criminals.—Chicago Graphic.

The apportionment bill has been passed by both houses of congress, and signed by the president. It gives to Oregon two representatives and also to Washington two representatives.

The death of Secretary Windom was so sudden and unexpected, that it is simply appalling to the entire country. Just at present, the special measures of finance that

are being agitated have so much bearing upon the treasury, that the secretary becomes one of the most prominent persons in the land, which in addition to the great ability and personal popularity of Mr. Windom, made him about the most widely known and highly respected man in the entire nation. It will be hard to fill his place, and his death is an irreparable loss to President Harrison.

The Idaho legislature is contemplating the enactment of a law that will seriously cripple the finances of the ministers and justices who live along the line. It is a marriage license law. Heretofore runaway couples found a veritable Gretna Green in the domain of Idaho, and those qualified to perform the marriage ceremony reaped a rich harvest from that source. If the legislature passes the license law their occupation will be seriously interfered with.

There is a proposed reduction of wages for iron-workers in Chattanooga, Tenn., which it is said will be resisted by a strike on the part of the laborers, and that they will produce evidence that they are contract laborers brought illegally into this country. The quarrel will probably be compromised but the threat of the laborers bears out the charge so frequently made that many of these Southern factories evade the contract labor law.

The elections bill has virtually met its defeat in congress, and in all probability the vast majority of the people of the country will be glad that such is the case. It never was a measure that met any extended approbation at the hands of the people.

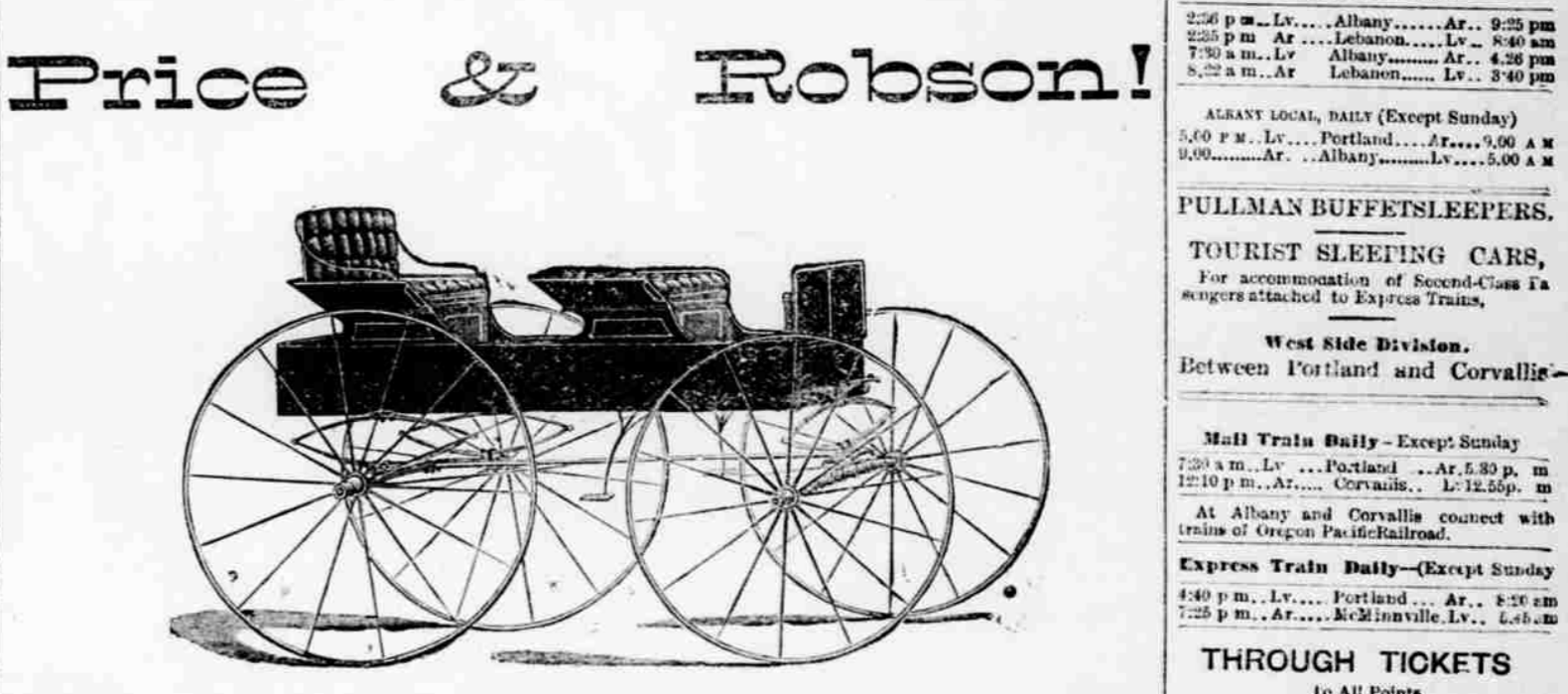
