THE LEGISLATURE

The Linn County Division Bill
Introduced in the House.

PASSED TO SECOND READING.

The House Goes into the Committee of the
Whole on the Tax Bill--The Aus-
tralian Ballot Law.

SALEM, Feb. 3.--The senate in its
action upon the Australian ballot
law, exhibited the controlling
hand of its president. It refused
to accept the law without the
amendments, but a conference
was agreed to. The general
opinion is that only some amend-
ments will be insisted upon that
the house will accept and that the
law will finally be passed.

Messrs. W. R. Kirk, Peter
Hume, N. Standish, G. W. Dyson
and others from Brownville, are
in attendance at the legislature
asking a reconsideration of the
bill for the road to the Blue River
mines, which the committee re-
ported adversely upon. There is
just as much or more merit in this
bill as there is in any of the wagon
road bills, and if any of them are
allowed this one should be.

The formation of Santiam
county, out of Linn county, came
up in the house late in the after-
noon, in the shape of a bill pre-
pared by the committee on coun-
ties, and passed its first and second
reading, and pending a motion to
consider it engrossed and on its
third reading, the house adjourned.
The general opinion was prevalent
that the bill will pass.

IN THE SENATE.

After roll call the senate opened
with prayer by Rev. T. L. Elliott,
of Portland. The reading of the
journal was dispensed with.

The senate concurred in the me-
morial resolutions in relation to
the death of Secretary Windom.

House bill No. 122, by Hall, the
Australian ballot bill, was returned
from the house. Fullerton motioned
that the senate adhere to its
amendments. Yeats moved to
recede from its former action. The
senate refused to recede. Those
voting to adhere were Blackman,
Carson, Cogswell, Fullerton, Hatch,
Hilton, Hirsch, Mackey, Metcalf,
Norval, Raley, Sinclair, Wait and
Simon. 15. Nays, Cameron, Croson,
Crow, Dodson, Eakin, Fulton,
Gates, Looney, Moore, Tongue,
Veatch, Watkins, Weatherford
and Willis, 14.

Fulton moved that a conference
committee be appointed. The
president appointed as such com-
mittee, Senators Fulton and
Raley.

House bill No. 3, by Richey, to
create the county of Wilber; read
first time; indefinitely postponed
upon motion of Raley.

The president announced that
he had signed:

House joint resolution No. 6, by
Gambie, urging the speedy com-
pletion of the portage railway.

House joint memorial No. 1, by
Jennings, for the election of
United States senators by a direct
vote of the people.

House bill No. 63, by Durham,
for legislative expenses.

House bill No. 191, by Myers, in-
corporating independence.

Hatch, chairman of the special
committee to visit the Agricultural
college at Corvallis, reported favor-
ably upon the management of the
college; adopted.

THE ALBANY BRIDGE BILL PASSED.

At the afternoon session the
senate passed Mackay's bill for
the appointment of a commission
for superintending the construc-
tion of the new city hall at Port-
land; also a resolution that the
superintendent of public instruc-
tion give information regarding
school text books; also a bill
authorizing the construction of a
bridge at Albany.

Speaker Geer was appointed as
house member of the conference
committee on the Australian bal-
lot law. There is not much likeli-
hood of an agreement between the
two parts of the conference com-
mittee. The senate will insist on
the amendments.

IN THE HOUSE.

After prayer by Rev. Brown,
house took up regular order.

Third reading of bills:

By Moore, to amend the law fix-
ing fees of sheriffs in certain
cases; passed.

By Garfield, to submit to the
people the relocation of the county
seat of Coos. Fixes 2nd Tuesday
of next September as time for
vote; passed.

By McCoy, relating to the salar-
ies of county judge and treasurer;
passed.

By Jennings, relating to the pub-
lishing of county finances; lost,
ayes 19, noes 26.

By Durham, to establish a librar-
y in the state penitentiary;
passed.

By Coleman, to protect the dried
fruit industry; lost.

By Jennings, to amend sections
3817 and 3818, Hill's code, relating
to grist mills; referred back to
committee on agriculture.

Representative Moore introduced

a resolution limiting debate. Made

special order for Friday.

Portland charter bill to 3d read-
ing; to Malheur delegation.

The house received the senate
message, announcing that by vote
of 15 to 14 the senate had declined
to recede from its amendments to
No. 122, the Australian ballot law,
and insisted upon the Simon
amendments, and asked a confer-
ence. Upon motion a committee
of three was ordered appointed.

This was considered and the
chair was ordered to appoint a
committee of two to confer with
the senate.

At the afternoon session the
speaker announced as members of
the conference committee on the
Australian ballot law, Hall of Mul-
tnomah, and Reed of Douglas.

The house then resolved itself
into a committee of the whole to
consider as special the substitute
tax bill, reported by the house
committee on assessments and
taxation.

After considering the first sec-
tions of the bill until 4:30, the
committee arose and reported pro-
gress to the house and further con-
sideration was continued until
Wednesday morning at 10.

The committee on counties, to
whom was referred the petition of
the Linn county people, reported
a bill to create Santiam county,
with Scio as the county seat.

Fatal Accident at Oregon City.

OREGON CITY, Feb. 3.--This af-
ternoon E. F. Maple fell from a
sidewalk 20 feet to the rocks be-
low, crushing his skull. Maple is
still unconscious and bleeding in-
ternally.

LOST AT SEA.

SAILORES CARRIED OUT INTO
SAGINAW BAY.

A Report That Two Hundred Sail-
ors Were Lost--Many of Them
Rescued--A Storm Raging.

BAY CITY, Mich., Feb. 3.--Much
excitement prevails here concern-
ing a report that many fishermen
have drifted into Lake Huron on
the ice and were carried out into
Saginaw bay by a strong south-
west wind to-day. The first reports
were that about 200 men were
lost. Towards evening several
of the fishermen reached
Essexville, a suburb of this city,
and reported that most of the
others reached land in safety. The
best authorities place the number
of crewmen from 20 to 30. Those
knowing the situation think they
will reach the shore before the ice
passes out of Saginaw bay, if not,
there is no hope of their being
rescued.

Later to-night it is learned that
six of the crew managed to get
ashore east of the river. One of
them says 200 more got ashore on
the other bay, and that the others
will escape if the storm which is
raging does not break up the ice.

COLLISION AT SEA.

The Criminal Negligence of the
Captain of a Seattle Steamer.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.--The
schooner Electra, Captain Knud-
sen, returned to port this morning
in a damaged condition. The
Electra was on her way to Hume-
boldt, from this city, and on the
night of the 1st inst., the steamer
Jeanie, Captain Porter, came along
on her way to this city from Sea-
ttle, loaded with coal. Without
any warning the steamer collided
with the schooner, striking her on
the port bow, and carrying away
her bowsprit, jib-boom, cathead
and top-gallant mast. The steamer,
according to Captain Knudsen's
statement, never offered any assist-
ance whatever.

WITH HALF A MILLION.

A New Steamer and Rail Line From
Portland to Seattle.

PORTLAND, Feb. 3.--The Colum-
bia River & Puget Sound Naviga-
tion company filed articles of in-
corporation to-day with the county
clerk. Among the incorporators
are John Leary of Seattle, U. B.
Scott of Portland, L. B. Seely of
Ohio, and E. W. O'Connell of Owe-
go, Oregon. The capital stock is
half a million. The company, in
addition to the usual functions of
steamboat lines, has in view the
construction and maintenance of a
railroad between Portland and
Seattle.

Public Debt Statement.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 3.--The
aggregate interest bearing public
debt, exclusive of United States
bonds issued to the Pacific rail-
roads, is \$617,145,750; aggregate
of debt including certificates and
notes January 31, 1891, \$1,544,
677,354; total cash in treasury,
\$608,082,309; net decrease of debt
during the month, \$11,835,496.

A Verdict of Guilty.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3.--The
jury in the case of C. F. Stone and
E. J. Hyde, charged with author-
ization of perjury, returned a ver-
dict of guilty in the United States
court to-day.

A Sharp Chinaman.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.--A
scheme has just come to light
whereby a sharp Chinaman has
swindled the United States gov-
ernment out of some \$30,000 re-
venue.

HIS HEAD IN A BASKET

The Notorious French Murderer
Guillotined at Early Dawn.

A WILD RUSH BY THE MOB.

Eyraud Momentarily Eludes His Execu-
tioners but Is Caught and Sheaded
While Shooting to the Crowd.

PARIS, Feb. 3.--Michael Eyraud,
the murderer of Notary B. Gouffé,
was guillotined this morning. He
refused to the last to have any re-
ligious rites performed in his be-
half.

As early as 2 o'clock this morn-
ing the customary barriers were
erected upon the place La Ron-
quette. Shortly afterwards two
divisions of police and a detach-
ment of garde republicaine took
possession of the place.

The night was most bitter cold.
The cafes near the place de Ron-
quette were full of carousers, male
and female, singing merrily to
a disgusting song, having for its
refrain "It is Eyraud whom we
must have."

During this part of the prepara-
tion for the guillotine Eyraud
turned to the governor and said:
"Might I request that my body
should not be given to the sur-
geons." Passing from the cell to
the scaffold, Eyraud scanned ev-
erything right and left, and then
read his eyes upon the guillotine.
Arriving at the foot of the guil-
lotine and within a few feet of
the block, Eyraud eluded the execu-
tioners for a moment and loudly
and angrily shouted to the assem-
bled crowd:

"Constance is a murderer, he is
more of a murderer than I am.
Constance is."

Before he could complete the
sentence the executioners seized
the murderer and threw him upon
the inclined plane of the guillotine.
Deblair pressed the fatal knob and
the flashing blade fell with a sharp,
sliding sound, and the head of
Gouffé's assassin rolled into a bas-
ket below.

Eyraud's body was then lifted
into a wagon and driven off at full
gallop to the cemetery, escorted
by a detachment of gendarmes.
Abbe Fayre followed the body in a
cab, and after reading the burial
service over the remains at the
cemetery, they were turned over
to the dead man's relatives.

Immediately after the execution
the mob made a wild rush towards
the guillotine and were with dif-
ficulty repulsed by a strong force of
mounted garde republicaines,
which had been left in charge of
that instrument of execution.

CALIFORNIA'S EXHIBIT.

The State Will Appropriate \$300,-
000 for the World's Fair.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.--When
the bill providing for an appropri-
ation of \$300,000 for California's
exhibit at the world's fair came
up in the assembly to-day, an
amendment was offered cutting
the appropriation down to \$100,-
000. This was promptly rejected,
but an amendment restricting the
expenses of California's commis-
sioners to \$2000 each was adopted
and the bill passed to its third
reading.

A CONDUCTOR ARRESTED.

Railroads Must Learn that Even a
Passenger Has Rights.

PORTLAND, Feb. 3.--Charles
Darling, a Northern Pacific con-
ductor, and Chas. Whalen, an em-
ploye of the Northern Pacific, were
arrested to-day on complaint of
Louis Davis, who accuses them of
larceny by bailer. Davis alleges
that he bought a ticket over the
Northern Pacific from Portland to
St. Paul. On presentation of the
ticket to the conductor he took it
up and refused to return it to
Davis, saying it did not comply
with the requirements of the com-
pany.

WINDOM'S SUCCESSOR.

The Republicans of Ohio Want
Governor Foster for Secretary.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 3.--The
republican members of the legis-
lature have signed a communica-
tion to President Harrison, sug-
gesting ex-Governor Foster, of
Ohio, as a proper person to be ap-
pointed secretary of the treasury,
to fill the vacancy caused by the
death of Secretary Windom.

A TEXAS PLEASANTRY.

A Doctor Waylaid and Murdered
by Two Unknown Assassins.

LAREDO, Texas, Feb. 3.--Dr.
Ignacio Martinez, while making
his rounds among the patients this
morning was waylaid by two un-
known men and killed. The as-
sassin escaped. Dr. Martinez
at one time was a general in the
Mexican army. He was a politi-
cal exile from his native country.

WASHINGTON'S LEGISLATURE

The Legislature Rushing Its Busi-
ness Forward.

OLYMPIA, Feb. 3.--Hard work
was done to-day in both branches,
many bills being passed. Among
them were the following:

By the house to provide for dis-
posal of money in certain cases,

such as Metcalf's \$500, by plac-

ing it in the school funds.

To compel railroads to pay for
stock killed by railroads.

Relating to actions for divorce.

A great many new bills were in-
troduced and referred to appropri-
ate committees.

The house spent a large part of
its time this morning discussing
Painter's bill to appropriate one
hundred thousand dollars for a
jute bag factory at the Walla Walla
penitentiary. Previous legisla-
tures have appropriated \$50,000,
but this amount was inadequate.

The senate adopted a strong
memorial by Owens, asking con-
gress to enact speedy legislation
for the survey and reservation
of land belonging to the state.

Railroad bills, which were
to be a very lively fight, were
made a special order in the house
for Friday.

Snow in New Mexico.

ALBUQUERQUE, Feb. 3.--Snow
has been falling all day in the
mountains east of the city, and
ranchmen state it is the heaviest
experienced for years. On the
mountain division of the Santa Fe
road an immense snow storm is
prevailing and passenger trains
are delayed many hours.

A Cold Wave.

ST. PAUL, Feb. 3.--Last night
in the northwest arm in this city
the mercury fell from 15 to 20 de-
grees below zero, and this morn-
ing it was about 7 below.

Tacoma Will Issue Bonds.

TACOMA, Feb. 3.--The bond elec-
tion to-day resulted in favor of the
issuance of bonds.

RED-HANDED RIOT.

THE INSURGENTS INTENDED
TO KILL ALL THE OFFICIALS.

Fifty Were Killed and Two Hun-
dred Wounded in the Fight--
The Uprising in Chili.

OPORTO, Feb. 3.--It is now
stated that fifty persons were
killed and 200 wounded in the
fight following the recent revolt
here. An effort was made to in-
volve the Portuguese navy in the
revolution, two sergeants of the
marine endeavoring to incite the
crew of the government Corvette
lying outside of Oporto to seize
the ship. One of the insurgents
declared it was their intention to
sack and shoot all the officials.

THE CHILIAN UPRISING.

PARIS, Feb. 3.--Advises received
by the Gauliers from a correspond-
ent in Buenos Ayres, says the
Chilian insurgents have been
obliged to abandon Lazarena and
Cochimbo, and the harbor of
Liquique is reopened. Reports
also say the government will raise
the blockade at Valparaiso in three
days unless the insurgents make
another attack in the meantime.

Accident to a Wood-Chopper.

SEATTLE, Feb. 3.--Otto Hogen-
sen, while chopping trees this
afternoon, was struck on the head
by a small limb which fell 150 feet
from the top of the tree. He is
still unconscious.

Opposed to Free Coinage.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.--Among
the petitions presented in the
senate to-day is one from the banks
of New Orleans, deprecating any
further discussion of the free sil-
ver coinage scheme at present.

A Big Fire.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.--The Hecla
Bronze and Iron Works of Brook-
lyn were almost completely burned
out to-night; loss, \$300,000.

Favoring Indian Land Allotment.

BOISE CITY, Feb. 3.--The sen-
ate to-day passed a memorial pray-
ing for the allotment to Indians in
severalty of land on Fort Hall and
Coeur d'Alene reservations.

A Jacksonville Murderer Sen-
tenced.

JACKSONVILLE, Ore., Feb. 3.--J.
J. Stacy, who killed J. M. Roberts,
was sentenced to-day to five years'
imprisonment in the penitentiary.

Right of Way Granted.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.--The sen-
ate to-day passed the bill granting
the Umatilla Irrigation Company
a right of way through the Umatilla
Indian reservation.
