ONE of the arguments used against free coinage is pretty well answered, in a comment upon what purports to have been a statement made by director of the mint, Leech. Mr. Leech is credited as saying "that if the Free Coinage bill was passed the effect would be to attract to our mints large quantities of silver from foreign countries, but before it could get here he thought the alarm would be so great that gold would be withdrawn from the treasury and hoarded by the banks, and by the time the silver arrived the treasury would have no gold with which to pay for it. This would stop the shipment, as far as foreign countries were concerned, as they would not ship unless they could get gold in payment for it."
