THE LEGISLATURE

Oregon Has a Candidate for the Vacancy in the Cabinet.

THE ELECTION BILL FIGHT. A Warm Debate Over the Ballot Bill--The Senate Votes in Favor of the Wagon Road Appropriation.

SALEM, Feb. 4.--The senate today settled all doubts as to its attitude toward the wagon road grants.

The house occupied nearly the entire day in considering the assessment bill, as a committee of the whole, and has not yet reached the end of the voluminous measure.

The senate today indulged in a spirited debate on Cogswell's bill to regulate primary elections in cities of over 5000 population.

IN THE SENATE. The senate met at 10 o'clock. The roll was called, and no clergyman being present, no prayer was made.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC BUILDINGS reported that they had visited the state university, and a glowing report was given; report adopted.

President Harrison's Message on this Subject.

IT WILL BE PUBLISHED. The Olympia Legislature Refuses to Pass the Eight Hour System--No Special Session Will Be Held.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.--The senate in executive session today authorized the publication of the message sent to the senate by the president last week relative to the African slave trade and liquor traffic.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.

Interesting Experiments Being Made With the Koch Lymph.
