POLITICAL SURMISES

The future political aspect of affairs in this country, is a matter of considerable interest, and the opinions of the leading men on the subject will be watched closely.

Speaking of the Farmers' Alliance movement, the senator said 'some people are trying to persuade the farmers that laws have been made which operate unjustly upon them and that laws have not been made that would furnish them with more rapid and steady prosperity.'

The financial situation of the country, while it will not form a partisan element, still will render itself into a controlling influence.

There was two aspects of the liquor question, the economic and the moral. There are at present in the liquor traffic throughout the country some 200,000 persons—163,000 in the retail and the rest wholesale.
