There is now nothing to prevent the company from going ahead with the proposed extension of the Oregonian line. The bridge is the longest wooden structure railway span in America, being 250 feet.

It tipped over, pinning down Engineer McMullen, Fireman Moore and brakeman Sepp. All were terribly scalded. Moore is dead, and the others are not expected to live.

WHEAT IS RISING.

IT HAS A STEADILY ADVANCING TENDENCY.

Dealers Who Bought Some Time Ago Will Reap a Handsome Profit.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 9.—The steadily-advancing tendency of the wheat market is at present the chief topic discussed on exchange. Indications are that local exporters, or those who had the foresight to buy heavily some time ago, will not have handsome returns. Probably not a few of the producers who sold earlier in the season are regretting their decision, though in each season there are those who hold on too long for a raise, and finally have to accept much lower prices than might have been obtained at other times.

THE CHICAGO ELECTION.

The Result Will Not Be Known Until the Official Canvass.

CHICAGO, April 9.—The board of election commissioners have commenced to canvass the vote given at the municipal election of yesterday, and the result will be known as early as the result of several days. It is asserted by the republicans to-day that an error was discovered in the returns from one precinct giving Hempstead Washington an additional fifty votes. The democrats also make a claim that Creger's total is augmented by 100 votes, a mistake having been found which will also away that many from an opponent.

A SAD AFFAIR.

A Nebraska Woman Kills Her Two Children and Then Suicide.

HENNING, Neb., April 9.—Mrs. Andrew had killed her two children to-day and then suicided. A year ago she planned the same crime, but it was frustrated and the unfortunate woman sent to the insane asylum. A short time ago she was released as cured. This morning before the children, a girl and a boy aged 7 and 9, were dressed, she took them to the kitchen and with an axe crushed their skulls. She then replaced their bodies in bed. She took a dose of concentrated lye and died in great agony.

Dave said he and his brother were at the farmer's house with the intention of robbing. While there he fired a pistol, with the intention of scaring the inmates, but said he did not shoot the farmer. While he did not say as much, it is thought he intended to convey the idea that Joe, his brother, committed the murder. It will be remembered both men died on the gallows protesting their innocence.

THE WIDOW PROVIDED FOR.

Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen. Mrs. John McFadden \$3000.

PORTLAND, April 9.—The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers to-day paid Mrs. McFadden, widow of Engineer John McFadden, who was killed in the accident at Lake Labish some months since, the sum of \$3000.

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CANADA WILL DO NOTHING.

OTTAWA, April 9.—It is understood that a request recently reached the customs department from Washington that steps be taken to prevent the emigration of Chinese from Canada to the United States. The department answered that it had no power to take action of the kind suggested. Once the Chinese pay poll tax, they are at liberty to come and go the same as any other person in Canada.

A CRAZY MAN'S FREAK.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., April 9.—This morning James Ferguson deliberately fired two shots from a double-barreled shotgun into a group of children playing in the yard of St. Mary's parochial school, and then fled. Several children were hurt, but no one was seriously injured. The shot was fortunately small bird shot. Ferguson was arrested. He has been acting strangely for some time.

Blaze at Colton.

SPOKANE FALLS, April 9.—Fire yesterday afternoon at Colton destroyed the Duff, one grocery store and a dwelling. The loss is \$12,000. The hotel was insured for \$5000 and the drug store for \$1700. The latter was owned by A. B. Hackman. The hotel was crowded at the time of the fire, several immigrants having just arrived from the East.

They Will Be Frozen Out.

NEW YORK, April 9.—The Chicago and Alton now stands alone, boycotted by the various railroad associations for its determination to pay commissions to agents, the Burlington having to-day notified the board of rulings of its intention to conform to the decision. The Alton boycott will go into effect next Wednesday unless that road repents.

Strike at Burlington Switchmen.

OMAHA, April 9.—The strike of the Burlington switchmen is assuming a serious nature. The yards are guarded by a strong detail of police. The strikers are quiet at present, but threaten to injure non-union men at work.

Non-Editor Succides.

SEATTLE, April 9.—Captain R. M. Hathaway a well-known printer and editor, recently of Portland, is supposed to have committed suicide early this morning by leaping from the steamer Fairhaven into the Seattle harbor.
