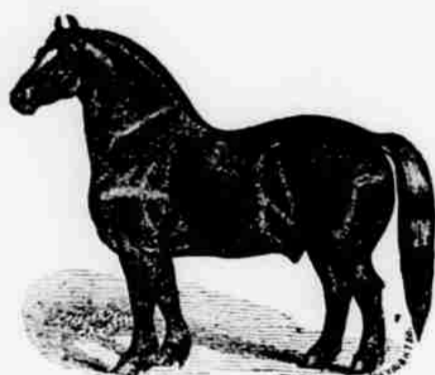

### WHOLESALE MURDER

Troops Fire on an Assemblage of 900 Persons.

### MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN

They Follow Them Up and Murder All the Men—Their Only Crime Was They Had Demanded Food.

PANAMA, April 24.—Interesting mail advices have been received by steamer from several coast points relative to the Chilian revolution. A letter from Tarapaca gives an account of a horrible affair at Paso Almonte early in February. Upwards of 3000 men were collected at Paso Almonte to proceed to Iquique, and make formal representation respecting the scarcity of provisions. Shortly after they reached the works, the manager gave them a lot of provisions. The strikers remained there that night, and the following day sent some of their leaders on to Negreiros to collect more men. Suddenly a train approached loaded with government troops, under Martin Larraín. Without parleying these troops opened fire on the defenseless workmen, women and children. Shortly after the forces marched forward and killed all the men. Meanwhile the men from the Negreiros works with the commissioners from Ramirez, returned to their homes otherwise they might also have been slaughtered. Some who escaped from the massacre took refuge in the nitrate fields, but were subsequently followed up and killed. After these deeds were committed a large number of the men were arrested, of whom 18 were murdered.

Lima here says it is stated that when the government forces retired from Paso Almonte, they shot all the prisoners and destroyed all the nitrate establishments. The fight between the government troops and the revolutionists at Paso Almonte on March 7, was a sanguinary one. Four thousand troops were engaged, and three-fourths were government troops, and more than one thousand killed and wounded was the result. The government forces were routed with the loss of all of their military stores, and the greater part of their artillery. The revolutionary army committed many atrocities. Advice received in Callao March 21st says that the revolutionary squadron was transporting all of the revolutionary land forces and has sailed with the object of attacking Valparaiso. The officers and crews of the revolutionary squadron are said to have signed "Round Robin," binding themselves not to lay down their arms until they hang President Balmaceda in the principle square in Santiago.

The condition of many of the refugees at Iquique is horrible. Provisions were recently so scarce in Iquique owing to the blockade that \$20 were paid for a can of preserved milk and beans sold at \$10 per pound.

### A FIGHTING CROWD

Member of the French Chamber of Deputies Loses His Temper.

PARIS, April 24.—Camille Dreyfus, editor of Le Nation and a member of the deputies, pre- sided to-day over a large meeting of his constituents, called to refute the charges of blackmail, brought against him by M. Blaine, of Monte Carlo. The meeting was one session of quarrels. Finally Dreyfus, jumping from the platform, began to thump one of the speakers who had been most prominent in interrupting him. A free fight followed, and matters were made so lively for Dreyfus that he escaped from the hall by a back window. After this, the meeting passed a resolution asking him to resign.

### STORE BURGLARIZED

Safe Blown Open But Nothing Is Taken.

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., April 24.—Burglars entered the hardware store of Goodman & Dotty last night and drilled through the door of the safe and blew it off with powder. They were frightened away before securing anything.

### FROM LONDON TO NEW YORK

"Jack the Ripper" Seems to Have Changed His Location.

NEW YORK, April 24.—Last night a man and woman registered at a cheap hotel here as man and wife. They immediately retired, and, as nothing was seen of them this morning, the door of the room was broken in. On the bed lay the woman, covered with blood. She had been dead for hours. Her abdomen had been ripped open with a dull, broken table-knife that lay in the blood. The viscera had been cut, and from appear-

### ANCES, THE PART WAS MISSING

The man had escaped. A very imperfect description of him was given the police, and they went to work with the utmost secrecy and speed. They think he is "Jack the Ripper."

The coroner made a hasty examination of the body and found that the woman had been dead a number of hours. He removed the clothes from her face and neck and revealed the ghastly visage. The tongue was out of the mouth and the swollen eyes bulged from their sockets; and the nose was flattened to the face, and about the neck was a circle of congealed blood. The appearance of the face convinced the coroner that the woman had first been strangled and then cut. On turning the body over it was found that the murderer had left his mark. The broken end of the knife had been used to make a large cross on the base of the spine.

### THEY SHOOT THE SHOOTER

The Slayer of Private Miller Gets Sixteen Bullets, Four in the Head—Other Particulars.

WALLA WALLA, April 24.—This evening at 9:15, D. J. Hunt, the slayer of private Miller on Wednesday night, was lynched by soldiers from the garrison and fell on the court house yard riddled with sixteen bullets, four of which entered his head. Early in the evening Sheriff McFarland received intelligence that an attempt would be made to-night to lynch Hunt, and he, in company with Prosecuting Attorney Bamford, repaired to the garrison and told Col. Compton what they feared, and asked him to assist them, which he promised to do by having check rolls called after the lapse of 12 o'clock. The sheriff returned and engaged a number of extra guards, but all of them had not arrived when a mob of sixty or seventy soldiers demanded of the officers to open the doors of the jail, which was refused, and they at once began to work with hammers and chisel to break in. Again they demanded admittance and said they would give those inside half a minute to open when they would blow up the courthouse with dynamite. Further resistance then being useless the doors were opened and thirty or forty cocked revolvers were leveled at the heads of all inside and the keys to the cells demanded, which were given them. Hunt's cell was shown and they quickly took him out into the courthouse yard, and about thirty shots were fired.

### A HORRIBLE DEATH

BOY DEVoured BY DOGS.

Crowd of Men Stand by and Cannot Save the Child. People Mad Too Late.

MARION, April 24.—Two huge and fierce mastiffs, owned by General Pando, escaped from their keepers yesterday, and rushing through the streets attacked the first person they met. The victim chanced to be a boy of 14 named Martinez. He was quickly covered and thrown down by the brutes who then began to lacerate the flesh in a frightful manner. The boy's shrieks attracted a crowd of people who tried to drive the dogs away by assaulting them with sticks and stones, but these efforts proved futile and the boy's flesh was torn and actually devoured in the presence of the spectators. A dozen policemen finally arrived and rescued the boy, who, by this time was in a dying condition. Twenty-seven gaping wounds were found upon his body. The crowd, who had looked on with intelligence and courage to save the youth from his assailants, now became furiously indignant against the owner of the mastiffs. They spread the news of the shocking affair and the impression in some way was constructed that General Pando was responsible for the escape of his animals and for their terrible work, and an angry mob gathered in the vicinity of the general's residence and though the police cleared the streets, it is feared that the threatened attack may yet be carried out.

### A WAR-LIKE MESSAGE

The British Government Will Stand no Nonsense.

LONDON, April 24.—One of the results of the action of the Portuguese officials in firing upon the British steamer Agnes and the seizure of the two cargo boats attached to the expedition, has become public by the action taken by the Portuguese cabinet to-day.

### A FEMALE IN TROUBLE

The "Hailey Terror" Found Guilty of Mailing Obscene Matter.

BOISE CITY, April 24.—Annie Johns, better known as the "Hailey Terror," was indicted upon two counts to-day by the federal grand jury for sending obscene matter through the mails.

### A Gay Old Lothario

BERLIN, April 24.—From Stuttgart comes the news that the veteran lothario, King Charles, who has just turned his 70th year, has recently been seen in the city of Stuttgart in favor of the woman Franz, who has served in an Austrian prison for stealing, and who at the time of her trial, boasted of her intimacy with the ruler of Wurtemberg. Considerable disgust is also shown by the people of Stuttgart at the reappearance of Madame Franz, who was supposed to have been gone forever. The king has two children by Madame Franz, both of whom he is educating in Paris.

### A Mysterious Murder

RED BLUFF, Cal., April 24.—A cold-blooded murder occurred about 1 o'clock this morning in the rear of the saloon on Main street. The victim was Oscar Crandall, a young man born and raised in Red Bluff, well liked by everybody, and not at all inclined to be quarrelsome. He expired at 8 o'clock a. m. What provoked the fatal shot, and who is the assassin, is shrouded in mystery. Two men are under arrest, suspected of the murder.

### Want a Separation

BERLIN, April 24.—The people of Waldeck are conducting an agitation for the separation of their little state from Prussia and the resumption of its autonomy. The state has been virtually a part of Prussia since 1808 but under an arrangement that can be terminated with certain formalities.

### A Death from Apoplexy

WORCESTER, Mass., April 24.—Philip L. Moen, president of the Washburn & Moen Manufacturing company, died this afternoon of apoplexy.

### A LYNCHING PARTY.

Soldiers Take a Hand in Dealing Out Justice.

### THEY SHOOT THE SHOOTER.

The Slayer of Private Miller Gets Sixteen Bullets, Four in the Head—Other Particulars.

### Appealed to the Supreme Court.

SALEM, April 24.—In the circuit court this evening in the case of S. M. Leonard vs. the Southern Pacific Co. for damages sustained in the Lake Labish disaster in November last, the jury brought in a verdict awarding him damages in the sum of \$3750. Leonard's suit was for \$15,300. The company made a motion for a new trial in the Kumli case, decided in its favor, but the motion was denied. An appeal to the supreme court was taken, the company believing that excessive damages had been awarded. Kumli sued for \$10,000 and got \$1500.

### PRESIDENTIAL ROUTE

CALIFORNIA COVERS THE PARTY WITH FLOWERS.

Passadena Loads Them Down and Santa Barbara Piles on More Flowers Without Stint or End.

PASSADENA, April 24.—The president and party were treated to a beautiful floral display this morning during a two hours drive through the principal streets of this "crown of the valley." They had a fine escort composed of local military and civic organizations. The president and Mrs. Harrison and Mayor Luckens occupied a carriage decorated with acacia blossoms and drawn by four horses wearing red and white plumes. The carriage containing Secretary Rusk and Postmaster-General Wanamaker was ornamented with orange blossoms and red, white and yellow roses. All the other carriages displayed flowers.

### HERO OF BATTLES

Germany's Great Warrior, Von Moltke, Is Dead.

HE PASSED QUIETLY AWAY

His Death Caused by Heart Failure—It Was Painless, His Great Age Reached It So.

BERLIN, April 24.—The death of Von Moltke has just been announced. Von Moltke attended the session of the reichstag this afternoon. His death was very sudden, and the physicians who were summoned announced that it was caused by failure of the heart. He passed away at 9:45 p. m. quietly and painlessly.

### ROBBED A SICK MAN WHOM HE WAS ATTENDING.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24.—Saverio Fivre, an Italian laborer, was swindled out of \$800 a few days ago by a countryman named Antonio Vallerti. Fivre had been sick for some time and Vallerti had been very attentive to him. Learning that the sick man had \$800 in the Commercial National Bank in this city, Vallerti persuaded him that the bank was about to fail and that he ought to remove the money to another bank. Fivre consented and two men took the money and deposited it in Ladd's bank. Fivre understood no English so Vallerti transacted the business receiving the certificate of deposit for \$800 made out to Fivre. Vallerti then took Fivre back to the hospital and returned himself to the bank and drew the money. Nothing has been heard of him since.

### REUNITE HIM IN GERMANY.

LONDON, April 24.—Buffalo Bill is at Strasburg exhibiting twenty-six lions and two snakes just arrived via Antwerp as his personal captures in the recent Indian war. He claims to have saved several of them from the gallows by his intervention. The guileless Mr. Cody amuses himself by telling wonderful tales of adventure and incidents which are allowed as gospel truth by the Germans, who now view an Indian for the first time. Cody to-day took his twenty-six lions to Kiel and caused them to take an oath of fidelity to him during his European tour. The United States consul administered the oath.

### WORKINGMEN OF EUROPE.

BERLIN, April 24.—The socialists of Luck, as if to rebuke the recent triumph of the German kaiser, are preparing for an unusual display on May 1. In Dresden the social democracy will parade with banners and music, and will demand, through their speakers, the eight-hour day. On the other hand, in Belgium, England and Spain the working people are far from being unanimous for eight hours, and in England especially there is an apparent majority against the proposition.

### CANNOT SUPPRESS THE DANCES.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Agent McCusick for the Sisseton Indians, in South Dakota, has resigned. He writes that he knows his non action against the Indian dances as forbidden by the department is not approved, but as he is convinced there is no practical way of supervising these social gatherings with dancing and feasting so long as they are conducted in a peaceable and quiet manner.

### ARRESTED FOR AN OLD CRIME.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 24.—Dick Liddell, once a member of the famous James gang, now a wealthy horse owner, was arrested yesterday, charged with the murder of Wood Hite, a cousin of Jesse James. The crime was committed in 1882, and was the outgrowth of a feud existing among members of the gang.

### KILLED BY FALLING ROCK.

LEADVILLE, Colo., April 24.—Yesterday, while several men were working in the Buena Vista tunnel 1100 feet from the entrance, a mass of solid rock weighing several hundred tons fell, instantly killing John Carlson and severely injuring five others.

### THE LIBERAL CANDIDATE ELECTED.

LONDON, April 24.—The conservatives carried Whitehaven, electing Sir James Bain over a liberal candidate by a majority of 235.

### WILL ARBITRATE.

DETROIT, April 24.—This evening the street car company accepted the suggestion of arbitration and the strikers are jubilant.
