Our commercial transactions as far as foreign trade and exchange is concerned, at present has some very peculiar features. They are summed up by the Chronicle in its saying that there is evidently a strong effort being made by foreigners to replenish their stocks of gold.

The tin manufactured in this country, and the product of our mines, has taken tangible shape and form, and has not been ignored, and yet the anathemas against the McKinley bill—which is the cause of the development of the industry in that direction—still continues with unabated vigor.

The most important crop of the country is wheat and its enormous production can hardly be realized. We glean that the total wheat product of the United States for 1884 was 512,565,000 bushels; its value at New York rates was \$830,862,200 but the prices were low on account of the largeness of the crop, which was concurrent with plenteous production in Europe and Asia.

Mercutio has been made and great talk indulged in, over the subject of building coast defenses. Perhaps the summing up of the matter by the Alta in the following is about the truth of the matter in reality: Members of the next congress should not unduly worry about the defenseless condition of our coasts.

The only serious incident of the May day observances in Europe, which had been looked forward to with so much trepidation by nearly all the nations of the continent, occurred at Fourmies, France. Here the troops who were called out to quell the trouble, fired into the crowds of riotous workmen, and men women and children were killed.

The grip is creating sad havoc in England. Advice from that country show that the epidemic of influenza is spreading, and that many manufacturing concerns have been compelled to shut down on account of its prevalence. The physicians are still discussing the visitation, but no one thus far has been able to explain why the disease has been so severe and widespread during the past two years.

The desert places upon the earth are to be made to blossom as does the rose. It is now said that an enormous reservoir of water one hundred and twenty feet below the surface has been discovered at El-Golea, a small caravan station in the midst of the Sahara Desert.

It is a matter worthy of note that the welcome extended to President Harrison has been spontaneous, hearty, without partisan feeling. It is the president that is being welcomed, and the unanimity which it has been established will go far towards establishing that when a president is once elected he is the president for the whole country and for those who happen to vote for him.

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The clerk of the weather is extremely particular to keep up the webfoot reputation of Oregon. The rain commenced to fall upon the presidential party as soon as it had crossed the state line. The rain met the president there even if Governor Pennoyer would not.
