A GRAVE QUESTION.

The Right to Take the Chilean Vessel.

ON THE HIGH SEAS. It is Not Yet Settled, and Involves Some Difficult Points--The Vessel is Not a Pirate.

WASHINGTON, May 8.--The question of the right of the United States to take the Chilean steamer Itata on the high seas is not altogether settled. The state department people are inclined to doubt the right. The whole question arises from a dispute as to the character of the vessel. If she were a pirate or a vessel of American registry engaged in acts of piracy, the case would be a simple one; but she is merely a Chilean vessel engaged in the transportation of a suspected cargo and there is a great risk involved. The dispatches from Chili throw a peculiar side light on the war, being to the effect that President Balmaceda has directed that the payments of the revenue and other duties to the government must be made in silver. A naval officer to-day pointed out the fact that this means a good deal, and might indicate that a certain amount of specie was taken as a precaution on the part of Balmaceda, who is as likely as not preparing for an abdication. Such an act of course end the war in favor of the insurgents.

FEMALE CRIMINAL.

Over Eighty Years Old and Many Years in Prison.

A report from Hartford says that Mrs. Lucy Campbell, Connecticut's most notorious female criminal, was sent to jail again to-day for drunkenness. Mrs. Campbell is 88 years old, and nearly fifty years of her life have been passed in prison.

Her most conspicuous crime was committed in 1874. While employed in a boarding house in this city Lucy sneaked into the room of the landlady at night, chloroformed her and robbed her of her jewelry and a large amount of money. She was captured and spent seven years at Wethersville for the crime. Later she committed a daring theft in Waterbury for which she did time, and then went to Bridgeport, where she robbed a woman of a large sum of money. Her last conspicuous crime was the robbery of the residence of Vice-General Hughes in this city, when she was 76 years old. Since serving her sentence for this she has become too feeble to do much in that line, and has spent most of her time in almshouses and jails for drunkenness. In her prime she was remarkably handsome.

HOW IT FAILED.

The Inside History of a Philadelphia Bank.

She makes a bequest to Yale college of \$150,000 for memorial to her husband. Other charitable bequests are made.

General Butler Attached.

LOWELL, Mass., May 8.--The Prescott National Bank has placed an attachment on the property of General Butler for \$12,000. The money consideration was given about two years ago on a personal note which the bank discounted. When the note fell due it was not paid.

WAR NOTES.

HOW THE CHILEAN WAR VESSELS WERE MANAGED.

Came in Company and the War Ship Awaits the Return of the Transport.

SAN DIEGO, May 8.--The Associated Press reporter to-day secured an interview with the two deserters from the Chilean steamer Itata. They said that the Chilean steamer Esmeralda, which is now in the hands of the insurgents, left Lique early in April to convey the steamer Itata to the nearest American port for the purpose of buying provisions, and to get arms which had already been purchased by the agent of the insurgents in New York, and shipped to San Francisco, to be placed on some coasting vessel and transferred to the Itata as the means of war sailed northward in company with the crew of the Esmeralda to the hold of the Itata, with their cutters and muskets and other arms, and the captain of the war ship had himself gone aboard the Itata the vessels parted, it being understood the Esmeralda would wait off San Lucas for the return of the transport.

LAND CASES AFFIRMED.

Timber Land Entry Held for Cancellation.

The secretary of the interior has affirmed the decision of the commissioner of the general land office in holding for cancellation timber land entries of Morris Frager and Lewis Frager, transferees of Wm. Gates, for tracts of land in the Oregon City district, Oregon. He also affirmed the commissioner's action in the case of Robt. Hayne Crump vs. Timothy Ellsworth, who both sought to purchase as coal land, tracts of land in the San Francisco, California, district, that were found to conflict because of erroneous surveys. The preference right was awarded to Ellsworth without prejudice against the right of Crump to file proof for such of the land as did not enter into the dispute.

SNOW IN THE PALOUSE.

L. Brown, of this city. The company's authorized capital is \$250,000, over \$230,000 of which was paid in. President Wilson said: "Our assets are greater than our liabilities and every dollar will be paid."

SUMMING RESULTS.

What the Cost of the Great Coke Strike Is.

LOSSES ARE UNPARALLELED. Foreigners Flooding in to Supply Places--No Lack of Numbers, but Skilled Workmen Are Scarce.

PITTSBURGH, May 8.--The ruins of Tuesday night's conflagration were looked to-day by a mob of Italian and Hungarian men, women and children.

Foreigners are coming into the coke region in a bulk. An operator said to-day that he can turn 3000 men into the region in 24 hours, but cannot shelter them. The peculiarity about this wholesale importation is that the strikers are as firm and unbroken as ever.

In addition to the inconvenience suffered by the near town furnace, owing to the strike, a general complaint comes to-day from Matroning and Shenango valley furnaces, that are estimated to produce one-eighth of the pig iron in the country. The furnaces in these valleys shut down last January, for two months, but the coke strike came upon them just as they expected to resume, and for five months many blast furnaces in the valleys have been dead. Operators would be glad to resume, but the coke supply is too weak to be depended upon in figuring up the losses. Attention has yet been paid to the railroads that are really the greatest losers. The lines running through the coke regions have missed their \$800 cars of coke per week for three months, while the roads in the Shenango and Matroning valleys for five months have found a falling off in the shipments of a million tons of coal, iron ore and finished articles. All this loss, exclusive of the wages of the men on every side, and the profits of the coke, furnace and mill operators, will present figures of a loss beyond belief.

Instantly Killed.

WALLA WALLA, May 8.--A young man named Sid Evans was accidentally shot and instantly killed Thursday night at Cold Spring near Echo, Umatilla county. Evans was carrying a gun in his hand when the hammer caught. The entire charge struck the unfortunate hunter in the abdomen, inflicting a terrible wound causing instant death. Relatives in Lane county, Oregon, were notified.

A Sudden Flood Engulfs Them.

ROME, May 8.--A terrible disaster occurred to-day at Alleroia in the province of Ambria, while a quarry train, on which were many workmen, was at Alleroia, a sudden flood occurred in the river and the rushing water sweeping over its banks, engulfed the train and all its occupants.

LONDON SCANDAL.

THE CASE OF CAPT. VERNEY STILL GOING ON.

Verney and One Other E-pelled From the Commons Law to Enable Men to Resign.

LONDON, May 8.--The formalities of the expulsion of Captain Verney and Mr. de Cabain from the house of commons will be secret. The recent report of the scandals involves in disgrace seven members of parliament, not including Verney, who escaped exposure, though their cases were widely talked about. No party capital can be made, each section contributing backguards to the list. Talking of recent developments with his friends, Gladstone said it was nothing exceptional in the cases of the public men exposed; that the importance of the cases lay in their being symptomatic of social and moral disease requiring vigorous united Christian action to cure it. Sir Henry James introduced a bill enabling the members of the commons to resign without resorting to the fiction of applying for stewardship of the Chiltern hundred.

Bank Failure.

PHILADELPHIA, May 8.--Spring Garden National Bank closed its doors in the morning, with withdrawals of deposits during the late stringency in the money market causing the suspension. President Kennedy said: "We have been below our reserve fund for some weeks and can see no immediate prospect of increasing it. We still owe a balance to the clearing house committee, for outstanding the loan certificates, payment of which being pressed. These facts coupled with the disturbances of last week, call for increased vigilance on the part of some depositors and weakening our credit with other banks. The Pennsylvania Trust Co., which is now a state institution, but was originally the outgrowth of the Spring Garden bank, made an assignment, capital of trust, \$125,000. The trust company was formed by officers of the bank according to the statement made by the Spring Garden bank in the clearing house. Monday last the assets exceeded liabilities \$1,875,000. Among the items was \$2,427,000 worth of loans and discounts. Much of these were not of a guilt edged character. President Kennedy, his brother, the cashier, and Director Evans are said to be interested in a number of ventures of a speculative character, that have not proven successful. City Treasurer Bardsley has \$144,000 on deposit in this bank."

Italy Still Cavorting.

ROME, May 8.--The Italy says the Italian government is about to address a circular to European powers submitting the conduct of the United States government in the New Orleans affair to their judgment. Italy will thus be the initiator of an international agreement to compel the United States to find means to guarantee the protection of foreign subjects.

A New Cabinet Officer.

WASHINGTON, May 8.--The American Medical Association closed its forty-second annual session to-day. A committee was appointed to-day to memorialize congress for the establishment of a cabinet officer to be called the medical secretary of public health.

GRAVENHURST, Ont., May 8.--Fierce forest fires are raging on both sides of the town. Every effort is being made to check their progress. The lumber yard at Tasker's swith, containing 2,000 feet of lumber and eight loaded cars, is burning.
