THE CARRINGTON OPERA CO.

It is Alleged to Be a Grand Bill—They Refuse to Cancel Engagement Here.

The Salem Statesman yesterday said: "Salem's first 'grand' opera was a 'grand' bill. The company was composed of six people, and they are going to play next at Albany, Eugene and McMinnville, where they should receive a very cordial reception. Their managers should be arrested for obtaining money under false pretenses. They scooped up a lot of money out of Salem people, at \$1.50 a ticket—probably about \$300. The local managers of the company, are not to blame for this outrage on the Salem public. The advance agent represented to them that it was really a grand opera, and, in order to secure such an attraction, they gave a heavy guarantee. The Statesman begs to be excused for advertising such a bill—it would not have done so knowingly. In justice to Miss Abbie Carrington, it should be stated that she has a really fine voice, and so has one of the male support, Mr. G. W. Travener, but the balance of the performers are very 'punk.' When the Statesman advertised a grand opera for Salem again, it will know that it is a grand opera."

Messrs. Warner & Cranor, of this city, not desiring to place before the public a fake show, telegraphed the Carrington Co. to cancel the date here for this evening. This the company declined to do, and replied with the following telegram: "Cannot cancel. The Statesman has been prosecuted for libelous slander. The Salem audience was well pleased. Tell your people that we will give perfect satisfaction or money refunded. The party writing the notice to the Statesman was not at our performance at all. The company will arrive at Albany to-morrow noon."

A. K. CARRINGTON. As the matter stands the company will doubtless try to fill their engagement. Whether the public will attend, however, is a different thing. Those who have promised to take seats at \$1.50 each will not be compelled to take them. The subscription paper containing the names guaranteed is held by Messrs. Warner & Cranor, and they will not insist upon the contract being carried out.

NORTHWEST NOTES. The fifteenth annual meeting of the pioneer society of Southern Oregon will be held in Jacksonville on Thursday June 4.

The bank of Gervais will commence the erection of a large two-story building for its accommodation this summer. The McLeod Fruit Co. has bargained for the entire fruit crop of the leading orchards in Jackson county.

Froemen, a farmer near Scappoose, has been adjudged insane and sent to the asylum at Salem. Mr. Froemen is an old resident and well-to-do farmer.

The boiler of the McLeod sawmill, operated by J. M. Littleton, on Sutton creek, near Baker City, exploded, tearing things up generally, but doing no damage to life or limb.

The interest in fruit growing is increasing all over the state, as is manifested by the large number of fruit trees that have been set out the past season and those that will be set out in the fall.

The Portland syndicate owning the Pride of Pendleton and other mines in Eastern Oregon have sent out an agent who is making arrangements to actively develop the properties this summer.

Richardson Bros. have lost 35 head of hogs within the last few days, at their place below town, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.
