### SLAVIN WINS AGAIN

The Australian Puts Jake to Sleep in Nine Rounds.

**A HAID FOUGHT BATTLE.**  
Kilrain Fought Plucky, But the Better Man Won—Immense Sums of Money Change Hands.

New York, June 16.—The Slavin-Kilrain contest which took place at Hoboken to-night was the greatest contest of the kind that has taken place in this city or environs for many years. Not even in the palmiest days of the old Madison Square Garden, where the only John L. Sullivan met all comers and put them to sleep in his own inimitable style, has a match attracted such wide spread notice. There was a most magnificent money wagered on the result of this battle as on the Suburban handicap. Thousands of dollars have been bet. Slavin had a slight call in betting, but Kilrain's friends were not backward in taking up bets. A majority of bets made were that Slavin would not knock Kilrain out in a stipulated number of rounds.

Slavin won in the ninth round. The contest was a hard one and Kilrain made a game fight. Slavin fought on the aggressive. He has a tremendous forearm and hand and got in his uppercuts with good effect. Kilrain showed himself to be a very clever and game fighter.

The winner's record.

Slavin made his debut in the prize ring at Charters Towers, Queensland, in 1885, defeating Martin Power in thirteen rounds. Then he beat Tom Burke, the champion of Queensland, knocking him out in four rounds. He beat Shamahan, of Gympie, in two rounds; S. Bude, of Rockhampton, in ten seconds; Professor Babs in a round and a half; Bigh, the Sydney heavy-weight, in one round; Tom Taylor, a pupil of Peter Jackson, in two rounds; Fogarty in three rounds; Mike Dwyer in eight rounds.

Then he fought Jack Costello in a battle lasting two hours and a quarter. Afterwards after many unsuccessful efforts to stop Costello in six rounds and failed to do it. Then he was matched to fight Jim Smith, having hurt his wrist in the set-to with Costello, he was forced to lose that honor—and the deposit.

Then he beat Lang, the heavy-weight champion of New Zealand, and Jack Brown, of London, who went from America to Australia in eight rounds. Then he fought London and knocked out Bill Goode in five rounds last October. His "draw" with Jim Smith—when the outrageous conduct of the British Brummagem hoodlums disgraced their favorite forever—was familiar to everybody. The fight lasted fourteen rounds, and was all in Slavin's favor. His last fight was with Joe McAuliffe. Joe was knocked out in the second round.
