DEADLY WORK.

Denver, June 29.—News is just received of a destructive cyclone which passed over the country twenty five miles east of this city Thursday night. Houses were blown away, trees uprooted and carried away and crops for miles around are completely ruined. A dozen persons were injured, but none seriously. C. S. Clark, who has a ranch near Deer Trail, reported that hail fell for twenty minutes and killed about 200 sheep and put out the eyes of many others. Chickens and ducks were also killed. Hail stones, which are not to have been as large as hen's eggs.

KANSAS CITY, June 29.—

The danger of a serious flood from Missouri river becomes greater every hour. At 7 this morning, a river is reported rising at the rate of an inch an hour. In the lower part of Harlem opposite, the water is running through the streets and a number of people are moving to higher ground.

HILLSBORO, Ind., June 29.—

The severest rain and windstorm ever known here occurred yesterday. Trees were uprooted, and the streets were flooded until impassable. Storms of wind, hail and rain passed over the different portions of the state yesterday and Kentucky yesterday afternoon. A great damage was done to wheat.

PLAYED A PART

For Seventy-Two Years in Petticoats Without Discovery.

Paris, June 29.—An exceedingly curious case has just come to light at the hospital of St. Antonio. A few days ago an old woman presented herself at that institution to be treated for some complaint. She was admitted without any delay, and her case was placed under the name of Opportunist Signol, while her age was recorded as 72. As a matter of course she was placed in the woman's ward. Wednesday, when her temperature was being taken by the doctor, he discovered that there was a mistake somewhere, for Signol was not an old woman at all, but a man. Of course, a sensation was produced when the fact became known, and on inquiry it was found that Signol had passed for a female since in infancy, and that this was the first time that the deception had ever been discovered. He had never worn man's clothing but once, and that was on the day he was 17 years old. He passed before a council of judges in London, who stripped for the purpose of medical examination as to his physical fitness for the army. He said that he had been a female servant on a farm at Lion Sur Mer, where he remained for eleven years, as a female servant in the household of a French nobleman, and that he had been discovered in turn as cook and lady's maid in schools, as well as in private families, for a period of forty years. During the past twenty years, however, he had been most of the time a female dechambre, or night dress maker, as to his motive for this peculiar proceeding, Signol replied that it was all the fault of his stepmother, who had forced him into petticoats ever since the time he was short-circuited, and who had only provided him with proper clothes at his sex on the occasion mentioned. The day after the examination, however, she took away his masculine attire and compelled him to resume his petticoats. Signol admitted that from that time till now, during, in fact, the whole 72 years of his life, nobody had even suspected, not to say discovered, his sex.

MURDERER SENTENCED TO DEATH.

COPENHAGEN, June 29.—The court of appeals today confirmed the sentence of death passed upon Philipson, the "lime cask" murderer, refusing to entertain the plea of insanity early in the trial. In 1890 Philipson, who was a soap manufacturer, was arrested for participation in insurance frauds. On an appeal he confessed that he had strangled a clerk named Meyer, who had been missing since January 8, 1890, and had sent his body to New York in a lime cask. The body was found in New York and sent back to this city.

A DANGEROUS LUNATIC.

PHILADELPHIA, June 29.—Henry H. Yard was arraigned in court today to answer to a charge of conspiracy with ex-City Treasurer Barsley to unlawfully use the public funds. At the request of the district attorney, the trial of Yard was postponed until September. The district attorney gave as his reasons for requesting the postponement of Yard's trial a decision is expected in the suit against the accused to compel him to answer an interrogatory of the city council investigating committee, and that Yard was expected to make a statement.

PROPOSED TO SELL THE PRESIDENCY TO MR. CLEVELAND.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 29.—Before the arrival of ex-President Cleveland to attend the dinner of the Commercial Club yesterday, F. M. Purinton was wandering about the streets here announcing that it was his intention to visit Mr. Cleveland and demand \$100,000 as the price of his re-election to the presidency. Purinton, however, made no attempt to go to Narragansett hotel, and his talk was evidently only the result of his delusions.
