ATTEMPTED RAPE.

A Gray Haired Drummer Figures in a Very Unusual Case. H. A. Peoples, a gray haired drummer for sawmill machinery, figured in a very unusual case in the district above Lebanon a few days ago. He was traveling with Mr. C. M. Syfers, this city, near Werts' sawmill, and Peoples stopped at the residence of Mrs. Ilena Thomas, ostensibly to get a drink of water. Mr. Syfers drove on in the buggy. Mr. Thomas was away from home, and the gray haired drummer sought to take advantage of the lady of the house who was entirely alone. He seized her and succeeded in removing a portion of her clothing, but she offered such desperate resistance that he quitted the house without accomplishing his purpose. On the return of the husband a warrant was issued for Peoples' arrest, and he was lodged at the Sheriff Scott and brought to this city and arraigned before Justice Coshow. He pled guilty to a charge of assault and battery and was fined \$20 and costs, amounting to \$20.

Presented the Case.

Salem Statesman: It will be remembered that at the session of the state teachers' association recently held at Newport, Dr. J. B. Bayley, of the city of Newport, presented to E. B. McElroy, superintendent of public instruction, a beautiful gold-headed cane. As Professor McElroy was sick at his residence in Salem, Prof. B. J. Hartorne, president of the association, received the cane for him, and appointed Prof. D. V. S. Reid, J. B. Horner, and F. Rygier, a committee to present it to Mr. McElroy. Yesterday Mr. Reid, chairman of the committee, came to Salem and made the presentation. The cane is one of the finest made. It is engraved thus: Presented by the citizens of Newport to E. B. McElroy, superintendent of public instruction.

Mouth of the Columbia.

Astorian: The steamer Cascades arrived down at 8 o'clock Thursday evening with three barges of stone for the jetty. Work progresses very satisfactorily and the 27 feet depth in the shallowest place between Astoria and the sea will soon be 30 feet. During June over 17,000 tons of rock were dumped in the mole, and the force of men at work under the intelligent direction of Superintendent Hegardt and J. W. Stogeman will soon commence the beginning of the end. During the next sixty days the great work will be far advanced toward completion. A third track will be added to the railway from Fort Stevens seaward, and a cairn will be erected several hundred feet above the water at the end, and a beacon placed thereon.

Oil Tank and Warehouse.

The Standard Oil Company have put themselves in shape to handle oil with a minimum amount of risk in this city. They have erected a warehouse near the southern Pacific line on Ellsworth street, supplied with an immense tank, and yesterday inaugurated the business of supplying the stores with oil from a tank on wheels from the supply house. It makes the risk comparatively none.

COAST NOTES.

Lottie Miller, a 13-year-old girl, stepdaughter of Paul Conger, of Lane county, has been adjudged insane and sent to the asylum. The Eastern Oregon Co-operative Association, which lately embarked in business, have increased their capital stock to \$20,000. Miss Ada Brown, of Spencer creek, Lane county, while out walking the other evening, stepped on a large rattlesnake, which at once seized her by the dress, and would have bitten her had it not been for a powerful blow that tore the rattle from her clothing. Thomas Snyder, of Grant county, while at work in Grant creek a few days ago, unearthed the largest nugget that has been seen since the early mining days. The nugget was six inches in length and would average one-half ounce in thickness weighing 30 1/2 ounces; value, \$6.50. Mr. S. J. Trine and family who live near Drain, came near being poisoned recently from eating custard pie. Mr. Trine had poisoned an egg to kill a skunk and the egg was accidentally taken to the house and eaten. Fortunately it was discovered in time to prevent serious results. Crops in Baker Co. were never more promising, and the range, too, is in fine condition, says the Baker City Democrat. This fall will find cattle in splendid shape for market, and there is a steady city of meat both East and West, the demand made upon the bunch grass hills of Eastern Oregon herd owners will realize handsomely. The Junction City council have a lot of patent clothes lines on their hands, says the Pilot, which they would like to dispose of. The clothes-lines were accepted in payment for a fine from a man who got drunk and disorderly one day last week and was fined \$10. If the council continue to do business in this way they will undoubtedly have any number of criminals who will liquidate their fines in haberdashery, and these officials can soon start a second-hand store. At Albany, last week, G. W. McElroy and his wife, of Cottage Grove, appeared in the county court and adopted the year-old child of Miss Caroline Cauter, father unknown. The infant was left with the adopting parents April 25, 1891, and the mother has since married and makes no claim to it.—Portland Dispatch. 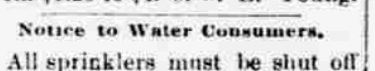
