TRYING TO KILL BLAINE

Certain democratic newspapers

in New York seem to be making

a desperate effort to persuade Mr.

Blaine that he cannot get well.

They picture him as suffering from

gout, dyspepsia, Bright's disease,

incipient paralysis, nervous prostration

and a few other select and mortal

maladies, and the fact that they

are obliged to contradict themselves

the next day does not seem to

trouble them in the least.

It certainly looks as though these

papers were very much afraid that

Mr. Blaine will not die before the

presidential campaign of 1892, and

as though they feared that he would

be the republican nominee.

This is not the first time they or

their partisan associates have

tried to kill Mr. Blaine in advance

of a national campaign. In 1888,

when he was in Europe, before the

convention met the democratic

press had him at death's very door.

According to their stories he then

had softening of the brain and

threatenings of apoplexy, but as

the country and the world knows,

he has since demonstrated that his

intellectual faculties were in

working order, and that his bodily

health was such as to permit him

to fulfill the onerous duties of

secretary of state.

Whatever else may be thought,

there can be but one opinion as to

the taste of such alarmist reports,

and that is that it is execrable.

James G. Blaine is a distinguished

man, a foremost figure in American

public life, and a man whose career

has earned the admiration of the

people of the United States. He is

widely respected for the genuineness

of his Americanism, for his clear

and comprehensive knowledge of

public affairs, for his skill in

dealing with the problems of

statercraft, and for the faithfulness

with which he has performed the

duties of his office. Under such

circumstances he is certainly

entitled to be treated with fairness

and justice, which consists in

stating his condition just as it is,

instead of exaggerating his illness

and depicting him as being at the

point of death. Fortunately

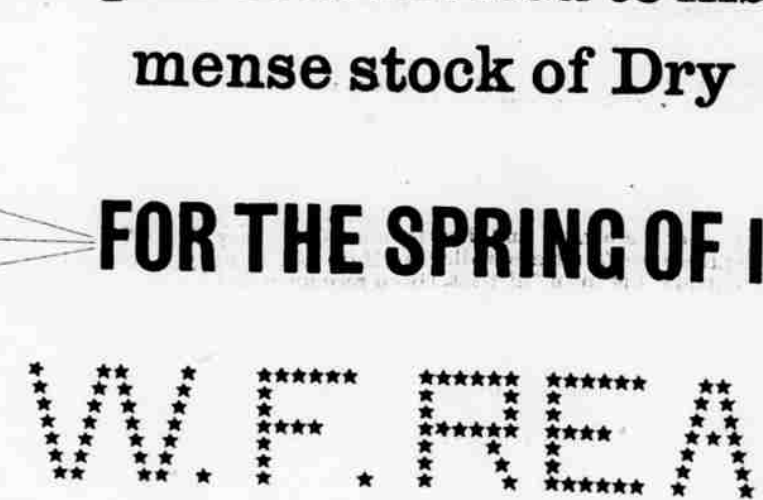
