Mrs. Dr. Gaston, of Tacoma, came up last evening with her three little folks to spend a few weeks at the residence of her father, Rev. S. G. Irvine. Considerable interest is taken in this city in the game of baseball between the Seaside and Salem at the capital city next Wednesday. Several will go down from Albany to witness the game.

The Eugene baseball boys do not seem to be very swift in getting started. They staked out a diamond the first of the week, however, and will organize as soon as possible. It is their intention to play the Albany boys on the home field about the first of next month says the Register. The national game is taking a prominent part elsewhere, and we are glad to see the Eugene boys showing a disposition to be with others.

Drawing Their Pay. The members of F Co. are now receiving the \$1.50 a day due them from the state for services in the encampment at Eugene. Captain Chamberlain brought up the amount, \$292, from Salem Wednesday evening, and Sergeant Wm. A. Humphrey is distributing the several amounts to the members of the company. It makes the boys feel quite like soldiers to draw their pay from Uncle Sam. They receive pay for six days, although they were in camp two days longer, in order to participate in the sham battle on July 4.

State Board Elections. At a meeting of the state board of education, held in Salem Wednesday, says the Statesman, Dr. W. A. Cusick, was elected to the position of physician to the state school for the blind. A vacancy had occurred in this place by reason of the resignation of Dr. Kowland, superintendent-elect of the state asylum. Dr. Cusick was the unanimous choice of the board for the above position. He is a brother of Hon. J. W. Cusick, of this city, and is a good man for the place.

For Harbor Improvement. Senator Mitchell is hopeful of securing a continuation of appropriations for the improvement of the harbor at Coos and Yaquina bays, where good work has already been done. An effort will be made to have something done for the Siuslaw. And for Tillamook an appropriation will be asked. A lineal survey has been made of that harbor, and a permanent one will be included in the report to be made by the engineers.

Shipping Cattle. I. D. Miller, of Miller Station, shipped thirty car loads of fat beef cattle from that place to Portland on Wednesday. Mr. Miller has previously made other large shipments from Millersburg.

FROM UP THE SANTIAM.

An Albany Party Visits the Famous Blowout Bogles—Its Formation. Jason Wheeler and C. J. Stewart returned last evening from the front in which vicinity they have been trout fishing several days. They fished in the Brittenbush, Thimble and French creeks and made a visit to the famous Blowout region. They report a good time and lots of sport and were highly delighted with the pure air and mountain scenery.

They report the blowout worthy of a visit and say that it far exceeds the famous Bad Lands, of Dakota. Old settlers at Gates report the eruption in the Blowout region to have occurred in 1866, and at the time the earth trembled, heavy rumbling was heard and flashes of light from that direction were seen for some minutes.

NEWS OF THE COAST. Interesting Items from Exchanges Throughout the Northwest. Raising gooseberries pays. A Polk county man has netted \$300 from one acre of these berries.

The salmon run at Astoria is some better. It is thought the pack to date in the neighborhood of \$250,000. Superintendent McElroy left Wednesday evening for California, where he will spend a month or more at some health resort in the effort of strengthening himself.

In the county clerk's office in Salem Saturday a marriage permit was granted to a couple whose united age was 149 years. At the same time a license was granted to a couple whose ages aggregated 39 years. These were about the oldest and youngest couples that ever took out permits to contract matrimony in Marion county.

George Whiteaker, who has for so many years made a success of peach growing on Brown's island, near Salem, is again successful this season. He will have not less than 1000 bushels of the early varieties. They are large and luscious, demonstrating that this section of Oregon is well adapted to the production of peaches. The peaches raised are of superb color and their flavor is the finest in the world.

Last winter the dispatches from Washington announced that congress had passed the direct tax bill and that in consequence of its passage Oregon would receive a rebate of about \$25,000—that sum having been paid by this state as a direct tax. Some states refusing to pay, those that did meet the demand were given a rebate, by act of congress—to equalize the matter. The sum is due to Oregon from the general government, but she has as yet not received it, and it is probable she will not until another legislative meets and by enactment says that the sum now appropriated shall be in full payment of all claims Oregon has in the matter. This is the position taken by Secretary McBride and Governor Pennoyer. Senator Mitchell, however, was surprised to learn that the state has not yet received her money in these claims.

By means of these measurements any woman can ascertain for herself how far she differs in proportion from the two famous beauties. There is some comfort in the thought that both were beautiful, although their proportions differ in important particulars and doubtless there are millions of beautiful women who do not come very close to either.

Taking Mrs. Langtry as a type, it appears that the modern runs less to shoulders and more to hips than the women of antiquity. The ancient has also a decided advantage in the length of legs and arms and the size of neck and ankles. 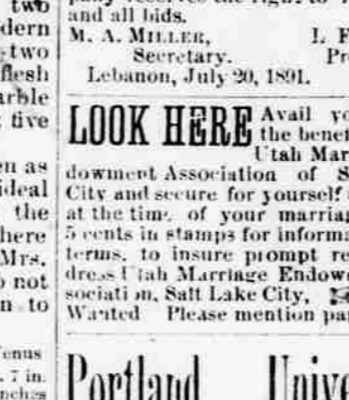
