BROKE JAIL.

A White Man and Chinaman Join Work.

Last evening Sheriff Scott was a few minutes later than the usual nine o'clock in going in to lock up the prisoners, Joseph L. Miller, the stolen goods man of the Cushing outfit, and Chinaman Sam Sing, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses from Sant Wa, and he found the cell empty. The birds had flown. Examination showed that they had saved three of the heavy iron bars of the back grated window completely off, top and bottom, and a fourth one at the bottom and bent it aside, giving them an aperture large enough to emerge from. This placed them in the back enclosed shed, from which they scaled an eight-foot wall in the shadow of a tree and they were free. Mr. Scott thinks they had not been gone fifteen minutes when he discovered their absence. Vigilant search was immediately instituted, but as late as 3 A. M. no trace was found. The cheek of the man Miller was exhibited in the following notes, written on envelopes and found upon a stool in the cell: ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 10th, 1891. Mr. Woods—Dear Sir: Please pay to Mr. Scott, the sheriff, the money due me and oblige. Your humble servant, JOSEPH L. MILLER. "MR. SCOTT—Will you please get this money and keep it until I call for it. It is somewhere near seventy dollars (\$70.00). Be sure to get it for it is coming to me, and I want you to keep it for me. If anything should happen that I did not get time to call for it, then it is yours. J. L. MILLER."

Mr. Scott says the Chinamen had been very solicitous to get Sam Sing out, and had flocked in to see him until he was obliged to put a stop to it and shut them out. There is no doubt that they had assistance from the outside, as the watch at the jail has been persistent and thorough. Just What Linn Should Do. The county court of Marion county is seriously considering the proposition of purchasing a farm of two or four hundred acres, in the vicinity of Turner, to be used as a county poor farm. In connection with this project the court will proceed to Turner on Friday of this week for the purpose of viewing the proposed site. Linn county is badly in need of such a place, as enough money is paid out by the county court each month for keeping paupers to more than pay the running expenses of a good-sized farm and interest on the money invested. A Lake Labish Victim Gets \$10,000. In the case of John B. Rauh, against the Southern Pacific Company, in the United States Circuit court at Portland, the motion for a trial was denied and judgment given to the verdict of the jury for \$10,000 and cost. Rauh was injured in the Lake Labish disaster, and brought suit for damages in the United States Circuit court. The jury awarded him \$10,000 damages and the company moved for a new trial, which has been denied. The circus with its burglars and other thieves has come and gone. Several attempts were made by pennant vendors and ticket salesmen to "hold out" in making change, but we believe they were all unsuccessful. HARRISBURG SCANDAL.

Conduct that Will Probably Cause Criminal Prosecution.

Reports reached here yesterday so well authenticated that they cannot be doubted, that a well-known citizen of Harrisburg, who formerly represented Linn county in the state legislature, was found in company with the wife of another former citizen of Harrisburg, but who now lives across the river from that place in Lane or Benton county, in a compromising situation, by the husband of the woman. The honorable gentleman escaped, but the husband, with shot gun in hand, marched the recalcitrant wife into Harrisburg, for the purpose of taking the proper legal steps in the matter. It is said the affair will be made in the county where the flagrant delicto was committed, probably today. The charge will be adultery. Score of Yesterday's Shoot. Salem's Peculiarities. There must be something in the atmosphere of Salem, this summer that causes a sort of idiosyncrasy to creep over the people. The Statesman came out with an account of a fire, which never occurred but which was so vividly portrayed in the written account that the nerves of readers were shattered almost beyond recovery. We see by the last Journal that some practical joker in almost the same line of conduct has raised another temper destroying if not nerve destroying false report. The Journal says: "A committee of Co. H, without the fear of the law or judge lynch went around Sunday night routed out a lot of the militia boys with a report that the long-shorn were surging up Astoria, and that a special train was awaiting to take them to the scene of carnage at midnight. A great many of the boys saw blood in the moon, made their wills, said a hurried farewell to parents and sweethearts, climbed into their uniforms and hastened to the fray. At the armory there was a congregation of many forms and courageous faces ready to march upon the enemy—when lo! it was all a hoax—and there was some swearing." French Colonists for Mexico. It is reported that Count de Montagu, a French nobleman, has about perfected arrangements to establish two colonies of one hundred families each of French agriculturists in Sonora, Mexico, one near Fronteras and the other at Acacia. Fronteras is about ninety miles southeast of Nogales and Acacia is some thirty-five miles south of Nogales on the line of the Sonora Railroad. The purchase of the Acacia and Cibola ranches, owned by Don Jose Pierson, is now pending, as we understand it, the price and all arrangements having been agreed upon and settled. The Cibola grant is one of the locations for a small colony in the state; plenty of water and very rich soil. Count Montagu was through this section of the country last November seeking locations for his people and has finally decided upon the above-mentioned places. He is now in France, and expecting to leave there for Nogales some day this month.—Nogales Record. Again Insane. Eugene Guard: C. C. Shepherd, who lives on Fifteenth street, was arrested again Sunday afternoon on a complaint charging him with being insane. He was examined this morning on the charge before Judge Scott, Medical Examiners Drs. Gill and Harris and Prosecuting Attorney Condon, and was pronounced insane. Deputy Sheriff Croner took the unfortunate man to the asylum on the local train. He was committed to the asylum about six weeks ago, but the superintendent discharged him after one week's treatment as cured. It appears that he is subject to spells of insanity and treatments at such times to kill his wife. When he gets in the asylum he immediately recovers. At the examination this morning he claimed that he made the treats and attempts merely to scare his wife. Largest L—Story Yet Told. Samuel Lee, a farmer near Fulton, Mo., has a cow which gave birth to thirty-two calves on the morning of the 20th of July. One of the calves is living in good shape; two were of the usual size, thirty are hairless, and vary in size from that of a rat to that of a young cat. Interesting Items from Exchanges Throughout the Northwest.

A small smelter will be erected at the galena mines on Middle fork, Grant county. George Ebell, one of Baker county's most prosperous farmers, states that his grain this year will average sixty bushels to the acre. W. F. Noble has shipped from Baker county since the first of the year between 13,000 and 14,000 head of sheep, leaving something like \$40,000 with the sheepmen. John T. Wilcox, of Ashland, narrates that he raises watermelons of 12 1/2 size that his pigs "nibble holes in the ends of them, eat their way in and spend most of their time inside of the watermelons." In telling this story, it would seem that the colonel misses the principal point—that of noting the intelligence of the pigs in getting inside of the gigantic watermelons instead of getting the watermelons inside of them. Wm. Armstrong, a veteran Old Fellow died at Salem Monday, Aug. 10th at the advanced age of 89 years. N. T.
