A CHAT WITH THE GOVERNOR.

He Was Once a Pretty Good Harvest Hand Himself. Governor Pennoyer, accompanied by his private secretary, was among the visitors who returned yesterday morning from the fashionable summer resort of the Santiam. Melcham. Enroute to this city the train which bore his excellency passed a field of oats, which was being harvested in the primitive way, with a cradle. This relic of pioneer days was evidently wielded by a veteran, as it required two men to follow to tie up the bundles of heavy grain. The sight of this instance of harvesting operations with an old-fashioned "turkey wing" cradle set the governor talking. He said he was raised on a farm until he was 22 years of age, and once knew how to swing a cradle—in fact was a pretty good harvest hand himself. He grew philosophical over the sight, and said he believed that the multiplicity of inventions in harvesting machinery, while it no doubt saves labor, does not put money in the farmer's pocket, that a man on a small farm could make more money to go back to the old way of harvesting by the use of the cradles. A drummer for a Portland agricultural implement house, to whom the remark was addressed, said meekly that he believed so too, but at the same time he silyly winked the other eye to his companion, knowing that the farmers of to-day are too progressive to take any steps backward.

The governor was attired in a dark grey suit. He wore a white slouch hat, black negligee shirt, and a pair of stout boots. He said he had enjoyed a pleasant outing up the roaring Santiam, and feasted on trout to his hearts content.

Young Salmon in Fish Traps. Alexander Sutton, the secretary of the Fishermen's Union, was showing us while in Astoria, a large glass jar, contains some excellent specimens of young salmon which he had taken in a trap in Baker's bay, says the Cathlamet Gazette. The specimens are preserved in alcohol and will be forwarded to the Smithsonian Institution, in Washington, and also to the University of the Pacific, at San Jose, where an effort will be made to determine whether these young salmon will attain the size of the famed Chinook, and to what species of fish they belong. We consider it this question could be satisfactorily solved and proven, that three young salmon, which are at present ruthlessly destroyed, are young Chinook and are only waiting a chance to mature, it would redound to the benefit of the whole country. If these fish are really Chinook salmon, then a most determined effort should be made to have the traps removed in order to perpetuate the run of salmon in the river. We will await with interest the decisions of those famed experts on the fish question.

BASEBALL SLANG. It Nearly Wrecks a Harmonious Boarding-House. The trouble all rose over one breakfast. THE WHEAT FLOURRY.

It Has Visibly Affected the Local Market—Prices Going Up. The wheat boom in the East has had a visible effect upon the local market. The price advanced 3/8 cents yesterday, and it is now quotable at 75 cents. Large lots would bring 80 cents. A considerable amount had been contracted earlier in the season at 75 cents and some has been sold at that figure, but since the flurry in wheat none is being sold. Farmers being inclined to await further developments in the wheat market and to hold for higher prices. Harvesting operations, which are now advanced, reveals the fact that the farmers of the Willamette Valley, and indeed the entire state, have one of the largest crops ever harvested. Merchants are confident of a brisk trade, and farmers are hopeful. The prospect for thriving times this fall are certainly hopeful. This, however, does not depend upon the wheat, which is just now agitating the wheat market, for that is too much the result of warning speculators, the rumour raised by the animals—the bulls and bears. There is beneath this a hopeful, healthy tone in the wheat market, occasioned by the shortage abroad, which promises fair returns to producers for their grain this year, and many will doubtless sell early in the season. Long lines of wagons heavily laden with their piles of wheat sacks on already conveying the crops to the city for which farmers will realize profitable returns. The yield is heavy, and with good prices there can be no complaint of hard times in Oregon.

GREGORY'S BIG CROP. Some Large Yields Reported—Ours a Heavy—Some Big Rigs. Crop-Weather Bulletin, No. 23, for the week ending Saturday, August 15th 1891: A few showers occurred along the coast; in the interior valleys were cloudy, cool and damp from dew, the afternoons were warm; the maximum temperature ranging from 78 to 83 degrees. The nights have been warm causing the daily mean temperature to be above the average from 2 to 4 degrees a day. Threshing of fall wheat has been in full operation. The berry is a full sized, large and plump and it is considered to be extra good milling wheat. Portland price this morning is 87 cents per bushel, which is about 10 cents per bushel more than was paid this year last year. Yields of from 25 to 45 bushels per acre are generally reported. Mr. W. H. Condy of Hubbard, Marion county, threshed out 970 bushels of wheat from a field of 23 acres, this field has been in continual wheat cultivation for 35 years. The cool weather in the mornings retards ripening of spring grain and causes grain to be rather tough for threshing until the sunshine becomes warm. In Curry county crops of alfalfa blades about 22 inches long, have been cut this year up to July 25th without irrigation. Oats are heavy and a good crop. Serious damage is feared from the hop louse. Peaches, corn and melons are fully an average crop. Watermelons are now ripe in Josephine county. In Eastern Oregon no rain is reported to have fallen. The temperature has been about the average; the maximum temperature ranging from 80 to 82 degrees. There has been more than the average amount of clouds, though the afternoons have generally been cloudless. Frost occurred in parts of Klamath county on the 9th. There is a serious lack of harvest hands in most sections. Heading and threshing are in full progress. The wheat is turning out above even the expectation of most farmers. The quality is generally above the average. Prices to growers in Pendleton for wheat are 65 cents for 100 bushels and 61 cents for club, clear of the sack; many farmers in this section sold their wheat last year at from 52 to 55 cents per bushel. In Sherman and Morrow counties the yield is most satisfactory, also in parts of Wasco county. In Union county, some heading was done this past week, but it will be in full operation next week. In Klamath county, which appears to be a natural county for it, it is 8 feet high and volunteer oats that will yield nearly or quite 50 bushels per acre. Though the stock country a large hay crop was secured and stock are generally in prime condition. This year promises the best all around harvest on record in Oregon.
