Sad Accident.

Sinslaw West, Wednesday forenoon of this week, while assisting in clearing ground for the new Methodist church in Glensada, Rev. Thompson met with an accident which will cripple him for life. He was hard at work felling a tree and had just struck the last blow with his ax as the tree began to fall he stepped back to keep from being struck by it, but unfortunately and inadvertently in the direction where Mr. Nelson's ax, which was being brought downward with tremendous force. The blade of the ax struck Mr. Thompson about eight inches from the point of the left shoulder, cutting a deep gash in the flesh about six inches in length and severing the point of the radius-elbow joint-of the left forearm. The ax was a very sharp one and had it not struck his arm it would doubtless have buried itself in his side. The gentleman was at once taken to Mr. Brown's residence in Florence. Dr. Cloyd was called and the wound dressed. The severing of the bone will necessarily stiffen the arm.

THE LOST CABIN CLAIM DISCOVERED

The Gold for Which the Miners Lost Their Lives was Not There, However.

Everybody on this coast who has had anything to do with miners has heard of the Lost Cabin mine. Five men worked there for over a year, so the story goes, and had accumulated a large amount of gold. As they were preparing to leave the claim with their treasure which had been examined from its hiding place they were attacked by Indians. Three of the party who were taking the tools out of a cut they had made were slain, but the other two were saved and hunting the mules to pack out the treasure except. One named Hurlbert was never heard of and is supposed to have perished in the mountains. The other, Tracy by name, escaped to Jacksonville where he told the story of the massacre and abandoned treasure, and where he finally died without having been able to guide a party to the claim, although he tried several times but on account of weakness was forced to turn back. During his sickness he was nursed by a Mrs. Croston and she imparted a detailed description of the appearance of the claim and its surroundings. Hundreds of people have searched for the Lost Cabin claim since the massacre of the original owners on November 3, 1853, but it has never been found till a few days ago.

Mr. W. L. Long, who resides in Portland says the Oregonian, and who left last April to prospect for mines in Southern Oregon, returned home last Saturday. He says that in the mountains with Agent Matthews, of the Klamath Indian reservation, W. Nickerson, his secretary, and W. S. Parrott, artist, he found the Lost Cabin one day last week. They had obtained a description of the place from Mrs. Croston and a man named Barneburg showed them the cut excavated so long ago and now grown up with chaparral. He says they left the agency on the 5th instant and attempted to cross Klamath lake to Ball's bay in two canoes lashed together, but encountered a heavy storm of wind rain and snow and were driven back and then started out with a team and went around the lake to Ball's bay, and about half a mile from there, in a kind of "draw" in the mountains, they found the lost cabin. They found the excavations made by thirty-five years ago, and a Lost Cabin on each side of it. They also found the holes from which the treasure was exhumed ready for removal, and the juniper tree under which the sacks were placed, which may be considered remarkable after so many years. They did not find the gold, which is not so remarkable after so many years.

When the party returned to the agency an Indian finding out where they had been said he was a witness to the massacre which was committed by Rogue river or Molalla Indians and he knew just where these Indians had buried the white men and seven bags of yellow stuff weighing about 100 pounds each, with them. Agent Matthews was to take an Indian, who is a policeman, and a very truthful and trustworthy man, and go out and dig up the gold, while Mr. Long returned home, and is now living in momentary expectations of receiving a dispatch announcing the arrival of the treasure at the Klamath agency.

Changing Geographic Names.

The government has undertaken a much needed task in deciding upon an authoritative method of changing geographical names whenever such alterations shall be deemed advisable. About a year ago the president appointed a board of geographic names, at the head of which is Prof. C. Mendenhall of the Coast and Geodetic survey. The associate members, nine in number, are all gentlemen whose official position and experience have been such as to give accurate knowledge of the requirements of the task imposed upon them. As a result of their work three bulletins have been issued, noting a large number of changes in nomenclature. The third of these has just been sent out, and comprises several hundred decisions rendered at the request of the light-house board. They relate to geographical features upon the sea and lake shores, and upon the navigable rivers of the United States, and concern merely the elision of the possessive form of the name. Only about a dozen of the changes are in names on the Pacific coast. In many cases then names so nearly alike as to cause confusion, besides uncouth names given long ago which should give way to the modern fitness of things. Great care, however, should be exercised as name should not be changed only when absolutely necessary.

AN IMPORTANT BILL.

WHEREAS, Baking Powders manufactured in this state, known as the "ROYAL" alum and other Baking Powders are advertised for sale as absolutely pure; and WHEREAS, Official examination show them to contain ammonia and other injurious ingredients; therefore the people of the state of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1.—Every can or package of baking powder containing Ammonia offered for sale in this state shall have a conspicuous label thereon with the words "Contains Ammonia" printed thereon in plain type, not smaller than great primer and any person who shall sell, or have or offer for sale, or send out, or package of baking powder without such label thereon, shall be guilty of misdemeanor.
