PATRONIZE HOME ENTERPRISES.

Another Citizen Expresses His Views on the Subject.

ALBANY, Sept. 3, 1891.

The communication in this morning's HERALD, signed Albany, strikes the key-note of the situation at Albany and the thing should be kept hot along that line, until the business men of Albany are made to see that it is to their interest to build up and foster industries in and around Albany, instead of sending the money made out of the people of Albany and vicinity off to build up other localities.

It is very poor policy for the people of Albany to give a bonus to outside parties to come here and establish and build up manufacturing interests and then have the capital sent to be invested in other places.

There is nothing that would furnish as much employment for laboring people, and at the same time foster and build up the fruit and garden industries around Albany, to the amount of capital invested, as would a good cannery. It was started up and placed on a good working basis; this could be done on a capital of \$25,000 or \$30,000, and if the business men of Albany would put their heads together there would be no trouble to raise a fruit stock company of either of these amounts, and who would reap more benefit from a thing of this kind, than would the class mentioned.

But it seems that our business men prefer to spend their spare money in the sound cities or in Southern Oregon, to placing it in some good manufacturing industry right here at home—they bring every article they have to sell into the country and are not willing to invest their money in any business that will produce something here at home—they will import canned fruits and vegetables from the East and California when we have the natural ability here to produce all we need of such things, and plenty to spare for export to other places and thus bring money into the country instead of sending it out.

Who will be the first to come out on the side of home and home industries? Come business men, don't be backward, but show your hand on the side of your true interest and the interests of those to whom you must look for support in your business.

Interesting Items in Brief From North-west Exchanges.

A lady by the name of Mrs. Mills, while en route from Jacksonville to Portland, on the Southern Pacific, a few days ago, stopped at Ashland to get a lunch, and while she was out of the car some one made off with her purse. The thief was apprehended, and the purse was recovered. Mrs. Mills will go to Ashland to be present at the trial on the 7th inst.

A somewhat novel outfit with a novel team passed through Prineville one day this week. A horse and a steer were harnessed together and drawing a wagon on which was an extended bed. Inside was an apparently contented family, some dogs, a stove, cooking utensils and bedding. They had the Western fever, and will stop, of course, this side of the Pacific ocean.

MAKE A DIVIDED SKIRT.

This Tells you How and you can Pass Judgment Upon It.

Make your skirts of light crisp silk, some pretty color—scarlet, if you like, or bright blue. Let it come half way between the knee and ankle. Do you know how to make the skirt? Just a pair of scant bloomers either ballooning or holding by elastic about the leg. On each leg sew a ruffle half way above the knee, a full ruffle, or better still a knife-pleating that falls to where the bloomers end. If you want to be very particular you can put another ruffle under this, just above the knee of the leg and falling to the bloomers. Then sew a skirt, this same material, to the band of the bloomers. No matter how high a reach the step up is, the skirt on the hip leg falls in a mass about the leg and down to the other leg, looking as if one's skirt clung kindly. The whole thing goes on at once and does not soil any sooner than would the usual dark petticoat. And it is prettier than the petticoat. You can lift your dress with impunity, and not be afraid of lifting the skirt at the same time.
