THOSE RECRUITING OFFICERS.

They Leave an Unenvy Reputation at Albany and Salem.

One of the dashing, dandies, recruiting officers of the U. S. army, who recently cut a swell in Albany, spent his time in making "masles" upon giddy girls, and finally left without paying a bill or two which he had contracted, has left even a more unenviable reputation at Salem, that of jehandering young girls. The Statesman says of him: "A silly young girl, who does housework not far from the business portion of the city, went to a Salem physician not long since and told him she was in a delicate condition, for which she wished to be treated. She was informed that was not a part of the legitimate profession—in fact a penitentiary offense. She no doubts went elsewhere where she succeeded in her mission. She claimed that she had been too intimate with one of the recruiting officers of the United States regular army stationed here and that he had promised to marry her. The poor, fool girl was, of course, dazzled by the officer's bright uniform and brass buttons. And there are other silly housemaids here who have been dazzled by these bright uniforms and brass buttons. A watch should have been kept upon them by their mistresses—and these officers should be severely punished for their criminal conduct. Such a case should not be sent out at all as recruiting officers. Of course this second had no intention of marrying this weak and foolish girl. He couldn't support himself outside of the lazy and unambitious position he holds." This festive army officer ought to be called in by the government, clad in stripes and put to work with his head shaved behind the bars, where he belongs, and a respectable man sent out in his place.

The Albany College.

The Albany Collegiate Institute will reopen on Monday with flattering prospects for a successful school year. Some material improvements have been made in the building, which will increase the facilities of the school. A new recitation room with appliances for chemistry studies has been finished and new furniture has been added. The most striking improvement is a counting room, where a practical course in book-keeping will be taught. The room is provided with bank counters, business office and exchange desks, where an actual commercial business will be carried on, money notes and accounts being used in actual transactions, which will teach pupils practical business methods as well as book-keeping. The faculty has been increased and every department is complete. The school is in a healthy condition and students will receive advantages of one of the best institutions of learning in Oregon.

Rare Presence of Mias.

Almost a disastrous fire occurred Friday evening at the residence of Mr. L. E. Blain. During their absence a lighted lamp fell from a table, and was shattered in pieces upon the carpet. The hired girl, who was upstairs, heard the crash and hastened down. She found that the burning oil had ignited the lace curtains and burned a hole in the carpet. She hastily seized a sack of salt from the pantry and emptied it into the flame and tore down the blazing curtains. The salt smothered the fire and it was extinguished without great damage. The adjuster of the Northwest Insurance Co., Mr. E. L. Thompson, was on the scene yesterday and paid the loss in full within 24 hours after the fire, which is certainly enough to deserve credit for promptness.

Two Married Couples Arrested.

The Herald's dispatches this morning from Salem contain a rather curious account of the doings of two young photographers, who have been in this city recently. It seems that they were married at the capital city, only to be nipped, along with their brides, on returning to Albany by being placed under arrest for perjury. They will be taken to Salem for trial. LATER.—The father and brother of the girls arrived in this city last evening and the girls will go back to Salem with them today. The newly made husbands were incarcerated in the county jail. They had on their persons four tickets for San Francisco and \$60 in money.

Must Have Their Pay.

A placard has been posted up in the Oregon Pacific office in this city, stating that the company will pay for the month of February on Monday, September 14. This has caused a rattle among the employees, not a smile of satisfaction either, as they do not expect after waiting for seven months to be put off with a single month's pay. They should have all their money, and if the court is any good they will receive it.

Small Fire at Mill City.

Quite an excitement was caused at Mill City on Wednesday and a good many people armed themselves with buckets and other vessels to fight fire which had been started in a few old logs near Bondy's store and which soon spread to the adjacent timber. At night the fire was still burning and running in a northeasterly direction. There were no buildings burnt and the fire extinguished without much damage.

CONGRESSMAN HERMANS.

He Pays his Constituents in Albany a Brief Visit.

Congressman Binger Hermann arrived in this city yesterday morning, and spent a portion of the day among his friends in Albany. He said he was pleased with the growth and progress of this city, and the evidences of prosperity on every hand. Mr. Hermann has just returned from Yaquina bay. The object of his visit there was to look into the government work now in progress on the harbor and to ascertain what additional legislation may be required to carry it on successfully. Mr. Hermann will also visit the Siletz Indian reservation, into the conduct of which he will make a thorough investigation. He will then go over to Tillamook bay and the Nabalem, and also to the mouth of the Columbia to receive suggestions from the officers in charge of the government improvements at those points, as to further needs in the matter of appropriations, etc. Mr. Hermann will leave for Washington about the middle of November.

OREGON AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

The State Board of Commerce will discuss the Matter Next Month. The annual meeting of the Oregon State Board of Commerce will be held at the quarters of the chamber of commerce in Portland on October 7. In the call for the meeting just issued, attention is called to the fact that the constitution of the board provides that when any constituent body shall desire to present a subject for consideration of the board it shall do so in a written paper, to be placed in the hands of the secretary at least twenty days previous to the meeting. In accordance with the provisions of the constitution of the board in the state are invited to forward to Secretary Randolph, before September 17, questions it may wish to have considered at the meeting. Referring to the world's fair the call says: "You are doubtless aware of the fact that a meeting called by the State Board of Agriculture, in June last, for the consideration of the subject of an Oregon exhibit at the World's Columbian Exposition at Chicago in 1893, without any other action referred the whole question to this board. For reasons which will be explained to the meeting it has not been deemed wise to move in this matter until the board shall meet in its regular annual session, when it is hoped the subject will receive that consideration which its importance seems to justify demand; and it would doubtless be desirable that your delegates should in advance become familiar with the feeling in your community, and as far as possible, throughout the state, in respect to the probable success of any effort on the part of the board to secure the means of making a creditable display, on behalf of the state, at the exposition. It certainly is to be hoped that the delegates in their report, and by a comparison of views, may be able to devise some plan which will relieve the state from the discredit of standing aloof from this great enterprise, in which all her sister states seem to be preparing to take a part."

A Gross Injustice.

Mr. H. Kennedy, a boiler maker in the Oregon Pacific machine shops at Yaquina, was discharged the other day by Master Mechanic Hume for some trivial cause. He had no money because the company is behind in their payments of the men. He was not even given free transportation to leave, but bought a ticket to this city. His board at the hotel was paid by a business man here. He is an industrious middle aged man and has a family. He is said also to be a skilled workman. Hume had ought to have been bounced instead of Kennedy.
