Electors of Officers and Delegates to the Northwest Firemen's Association.

Linn Engine Co. No. 2 last evening elected the following officers: President, D. R. N. Blackburn; secretary, Dr. O. C. Awbrey; financial secretary, D. J. Dubrille; treasurer, David Link; foreman, A. L. Lamb; first assistant, P. C. Anderson; second assistant, Chas. Medin. A. L. Lamb and Charles Medin were elected delegates to the Northwestern Firemen's Association. A Valuable Invention.

Messrs. Wilcox, Hollenbeck and Wandell have invented a machine for measuring cloth, which promises to be a big thing for them. Very simple in its operation, it will measure cloth at a width with accuracy and great rapidity, an indicator showing constantly the amount reeled off, together with the total price, at any amount per yard desired or an inch in length. It also has an attachment for measuring goods for an invoice, one that will save a great deal of time. Its capacity for general use is seventy yards, which of course is more than is ordinarily needed. The machine is a remarkably ingenious one, displaying considerable study and investigation in its construction. The owners will go East after awhile and introduce it. As there is nothing in the market or ever invented covering the field there is no reason why there should not be a fortune in it for the owners.

LETTER FROM MR. RADER.

He Explains What the Tolo Orchard Co. Proposes to Do.

To the EDITOR OF THE HERALD. Correspondent in the issues of the 3rd and 4th, inst., signing themselves Albany and Albany No. 2, call out an explanation to discuss the matter otherwise denied us, the purpose of this organization. The company referred to is an improvement one. To take carefully selected locations in the several counties of Jackson, Linn, Lane, Benton and Marion—in each to put out large orchards governed by special advantages in each case (for instance, large apple orchard in Benton county would pay well because the best market for this product is San Francisco, and other competing lines give assurance of dispatch and cheap transportation notes. This advantage is, too, a passage through the narrow minded policy that has characterized Oregon and thwarted her growth. Oregon is one of the greatest states in the Union, and the petty jealousy referred to by your correspondents and their uncharitable and low and contemptible, and has not the semblance of that broad and liberal policy that insures success in all institutions, more especially this of ours. WHAT AND HOW YIELDS.

The Oregon crop-weather bulletin for the week ending Sept 5, gives some figures as to wheat and hop yields in the Willamette Valley as follows: Wheat. Harvesting of cereals is about over, except the late sown oats and barley. Thrashing is finished in many sections. The yield of cereals has been unusually large. The quality is good fully in all sections, or more especially in localities where some mut prevails, to no great extent however in any place. Clackamas county reports wheat yields of 39 bushels per acre and Yamhill county 36 bushels in large fields. Most counties have large yields in only in the hands of the farmer, 35 to 45 bushels per acre. Hop picking is in progress. The hop lice have done considerable damage. In some yards fully 50 per cent of the hops have mould on them, in other yards no mould or lice are reported. The hop crop of Oregon was estimated to be 30000 bales, but since the picking has commenced it has been found that based on above estimate there will not be over 20000 bales, at the most of first grade hops. Fruit of all kinds and in large quantities, plentiful, canneries and fruit dryers are working to their full capacity.

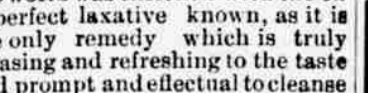
