Push the building through and get ready for its proper use. It is a right thing to do, and every aid should be given to accomplish that end.

Baptist State Convention.

The Baptist state convention will be held in Albany on Oct. 14th. A ministers conference meets the day before the opening of the convention. This is the general missionary organization of the denomination for the state, and all the church interests and enterprises, such as home and foreign missions, educational work, Sunday schools and young peoples work, will be discussed. About one hundred churches are represented in the work of the convention, and a large delegation of laymen, ministers and other workers in the Baptist churches of the state will be present. The sessions will be of great interest and profit to the public.

G. A. H. Reunion.

Eugene Register: All soldiers, sailors and marines of the late war, in Lane county, Oregon, will hold a reunion or picnic the first Wednesday in October, 1891, and continue in camp three days. All soldiers and marines of Lane county and of the surrounding country are cordially invited to meet and have a pleasant social gathering. The camp is located in Fairmount. Entertainment will be provided each evening with music, etc. Probably the most interesting will be camp fires and relating of experiences of the veterans. If the weather is favorable and arms can be secured, a sham battle will be one of the features of the entertainment. The Marine Cadets and local militia company have been invited to participate and will do so if business will permit. A large attendance is expected.

Wheat Shipments.

The wheat is being moved out of Eastern Oregon and Washington without any trouble this year, as none of it is being shipped east. Unusually large quantities of wheat are being loaded at Albion, and they are loaded and unloaded promptly and move with celerity, there being plenty of motive power. From 120 to 150 cars of wheat are being unloaded at Albion every day. The trouble about cars last season was caused principally by shipments east, it taking five times as much equipment to handle eastern shipments as to haul the grain here.

A Woman Dealer.

One of the attractions, if such degradation can be said to possess any attractive feature, of a Salem auction during the week of the state fair was a woman who dealt "stump" poker, says the Statesman. The novelty of the situation brought a good play to the table, which was surrounded during the week by young men and old men anxious to wager their money against that of their fellow men. This is perhaps the first time in Salem that a woman ever performed such a labor and the sight was as good as it was novel.

PORTLAND EXPOSITION.

A Much Larger Success Than Ever Before. -Notes from Thursday's Oregonian.

The first week of the exposition of 1891, came to an end last night, and Superintendent Mitchell is pleased to say that the receipts have been much larger than they were during the corresponding week last year. The attendance has been increasing each day. An amusing feature of the exposition last night was the searchlight performance, conducted by Messrs. George B. Ellison and W. A. Burkholder, of the Thompson-Houston Electric Light Company. The large searchlight in the north gallery of the machinery hall was turned upon the audience in the gallery of the music hall, much to the delight of all who were in the building. This enormous light, which will be used on the new steamer Flyer, is the largest one ever manufactured in the country. The machine was turned upon the audience with all colors of light, and the effect was as beautiful as it was brilliant. One of the most unique exhibits in the large mineral department is the miniature model of a Baker county mining camp, the work of electricity. It is a perfect representation of a mining camp, with the exception that every thing pertaining to an ideal mining camp is there, while in ordinary mining camps everything is not there. The machinery, natural as life, and old gold hunters stop to gaze upon the miniature field of fortune, while memories of the past come up thick and fast. The camp shows the mountains with snow-covered peaks, trees covering their rugged sides, crystal streams running down canyons and crevices, the water-wheel operating the dynamo, the dynamo itself, blacksmith shop, saloon with its frontier barroom, barmaid, and miners engaged in a game of cards, assayer's office, stamp mill, ore chutes and tunnels. In fact it is a perfect reproduction of the Elkhorn mining camp in Baker county.
