RUSSIAN ROYALTY

Mourning For the Death of Princess Alexandra.

SHE WAS PAUL'S YOUNG WIFE.

Favorite Brother of the Czar Her Death Causes Widespread Mourning—Demark Also Sorrowed.

She Would Not Surrender.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The sudden death of the Grand Duchess Alexandra has broken up the family party at Fredensburg and the imperial family at Russia, and the royal houses of Denmark and Greece, which have been united into mourning in reality, and other European royalties who will mourn by courtesy. The death of the grand duchess will probably make a change in the plans of the czar, and may lead to the omission of the proposed interview between the czar and kaiser. Paul is the czar's favorite brother, and the alliance which he suffers in the loss of his young wife, cannot fail to excite the liveliest sympathy of the autocrat. Paul was deeply attached to his wife, who was little more than a child, having been 19 at the time of her marriage, about two years ago. As a rule, the Russian grand dukes do not get along very well with their wives, but Paul was an exception, and the devotion of the pair to each other has excited frequent remarks. Besides the son whose birth was followed by her own death, the grand duchess leaves a daughter about 17 months old. The children will probably be taken charge of by their grand parents, the king and queen of Greece.

FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

A Negro Who Carried a Razor in the Clutches of the Law.

SALISBURY, Oregon, September 25.—Wm. B. Dunnington, colored, waiter at the Willamette hotel, was bound over to-day to await the action of the grand jury on complaint of his wife, who claims he threatened to kill her and carried a razor for that purpose. Dunnington's wife is a white woman.

Fred Gross was brought to the

Asylum to-day from Crook county. He is 29 years old and a German. He believes the officers are after him.

The city council meets this evening

for the purpose of letting the contract for paving the streets. There is much opposition as the people do not approve of the style of paving adopted, it being gravel.

She Will Wed a Japanese Prince.

BINGHAMPTON, N. Y., Sept. 25.—Miss Cora Dunn, a handsome blonde of this city, is soon to become a princess of one of the largest provinces in Japan. Prince Josako Katsunuma is a young Japanese student at Cornell university. He is of medium height and very intellectual, though not considered handsome. Miss Dunn is a niece of G. W. Dunn, a member of the republican state committee and a well-known politician at present in the position of postmaster at Binghampton. The prince, who has been many years at the university preparing himself for a civil engineer, has been called home to Japan by the serious illness of his father. When he returns, however, it will be as a benedict, carrying back with him a young and attractive American bride to the land of flowers.

A Telephone Across the Ocean.

BOSTON, Sept. 25.—A series of successful experiments with long distance telephones in this vicinity, has led to the discussion of the feasibility of trans-oceanic telephones. Gorman Gray, inventor of the wire, and these experiments have been made, said: "It is practicable to telephone across the Atlantic at a cost far less than the present cables and of a tenth of the weight, and consequently breaking the strain on the cables. The use of copper, it has been found, is not necessary, for iron wire, properly shaped, has been proved to be as reliable a conductor and its tensile strength is greater. The plan is under consideration for laying cables to London, and the subject is now being figured upon by capitalists."

Fatal Railroad Collision.

NEW BRIDGTON, Conn., Sept. 25.—Two freight trains on the New England road collided near Havleyville last evening, killing Engineer Day, Fireman Larner and Brakeman Sprague, and badly injuring another brakeman. The accident was due to the carelessness of Conductor Connard and Engineer Henry, who left Havleyville without orders. Both disappeared immediately after the accident, and no trace of them has yet been found.

Removed Changes in the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—It is stated to-day that everything now points to the selection of Judge Bulger, of Indiana, to succeed Judge Schofield on the bench of the court of claims. It is said that the president will probably permit a secretaryship of war to remain vacant until congress meets, General Grant acting as secretary after the retirement of

Secretary Proctor.

When congress meets, Attorney General Miller will be appointed to one of the circuit judgeships, and the two vacancies in the cabinet may be filled at the same time. The appointment of Mr. Clement as interstate commerce commissioner is believed to have been decided upon. Since Mr. McComas has again declined the appointment of civil service commissioner, the president is at a loss to find some one to suit him for the place.

She Would Not Surrender.

An example of persectent refusal to adapt oneself to the progress of events, was recently witnessed in St. Louis. Mrs. Margaret Grunne, an aged German lady, was the central figure of a sensational scene. She owns and lives in a three-story house, directly in the line of the elevated road of the Merchants' Terminal Company. It has been condemned and appraised at \$18,000, the money being paid into court. She refused to take the money and said she would keep her home and not dispose of it at any price. The company gave her notice to move out a month ago, but she said they would have to tear the house down over her head before she would leave. She was told that if she was not out inside of a month that was exactly what would happen, and Contractor Southland, with his men, went around to-day and proceeded to carry out his promise. Sergeant Boyd and a squad of men were on hand to preserve peace. The intruders were inclined to show fight, but the presence of the police quieted them down, and all but Mrs. Grunne made hasty preparations to leave. Mrs. Grunne remained in the house and a great crowd watched the proceedings until the roof was torn up, then she was taken away by her son.

His Story was Quickly Told.

The young woman had secured permission to speak to the good-looking young convict. It was just a feminine fancy, a desire to learn something of his story, says the Chicago Tribune. "You don't look like a criminal," she said, abruptly. He smiled at the rather unexpected compliment. "I never did but one criminal thing in my life," he said. "Only one," she said, in rather a disappointed tone. She had expected to find a man steeped in crime. "Why, your sentence is for ten years, isn't it?" "Yes, and I got it for that one criminal act," he replied. "What was the cause of that one?" she inquired, curiously. "Just a whim, miss—a youthful whim," he replied, rather bitterly. "I thought it mainly to carry a revolver." "And you were attacked some night?" she asked quickly. "And you?" "He shook his head. "Like others, just for that," he returned quietly. "I quarreled with a friend, lost my temper, and—I'm here, miss. That's all." He suddenly turned away and went back to his work.

A Lady at the Throttle.

The Cairo and Kanawha Valley Railroad—a narrow-gauge line connecting with the Baltimore and Ohio at Cairo, in this county—claims the distinction of employing the only female railroad engineer in the United States. The lady's name is Miss Ida Hewitt, and she is the daughter of Colonel Hewitt, one of the principal stockholders of the road. Miss Ida is a very beautiful and accomplished young woman, under 20 years of age, has always had a peculiar fascination for machinery, and has spent a large portion of her time in the shop of the company. She finally became a machinist of no mean ability, when she undertook the task of running an engine on the road, and her success was so great that she is now regularly employed in that capacity, and makes her daily run with as much regularity as the most veteran engineer.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

One of Those Circulars.

An alliance organ with headquarters at St. Paul, has issued a circular, headed: "Facts Worth Money." A glance at the sheet is enough to convince any one that the facts contained therein are not worth a cent. The farmers are urged to hold back their wheat, as better prices await them, within the next few weeks. The assertion is made that wheat will surely bring \$1.50 and possibly \$2 per bushel. The sending of such reading matter as this to the farmers of Oregon and Washington is simply a waste of time and material. They may be a trifle stubborn at times, but they know just when to sell their wheat, without the advice of an alliance organ or a band of speculators.

A Chance for Hunters.

YELLOW JACKET.

It Kicks Up a Racket, Which Was Nearly Fatal.

FOUR PEOPLE WERE INJURED

Professor Spence Nearly Fatally Struck the Horse Which Caused it to Go Off a Bridge.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Professor A. M. Spence, dean of the faculty of Fisk university, Nashville, Tenn., with his wife, daughter and R. C. Edmonston, of the department, had an almost miraculous escape from death yesterday while driving along the Fort Meyer road. Descending the steep military road from Fort Meyer the horse was struck by a yellow jacket. The animal plunged down the road and over a bridge, carrying the vehicle and passengers with him a distance of twenty feet into the water. Professor and Mrs. Spence were pinned under the vehicle until extricated by Miss. Spence and Edmonston, who escaped with slight injuries. The injured parties were brought to the Emergency hospital. The bones of Professor Spence's face were broken, his shoulder-bone crushed, his skull slightly fractured and his right eye almost torn out. Owing to the feeble condition of Professor Spence, his physicians are unable to state whether his injuries will prove fatal. Mrs. Spence's injuries are not fatal but painful.

FAST PARSON.

Wants to Trot Into Heaven on a 2:40 Gait.

FORT DODGE, Ia., Sept. 25.—"If I can't trot down the homestretch to glory at a 2:30 clip, I want to walk," said Rev. J. C. Stires, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Cherokee, before the annual Northwest Methodist Episcopal conference in this city. Rev. Mr. Stires was accused of conduct unbecoming in a minister in owning and driving fast horses. In answer to the charge of racing the accused preacher brought a satchel full of affidavits to prove that he had never taken part in a speed contest nor permitted his horse to go on the track. As to owning fast horses, Mr. Stires pleaded guilty and gloried in it. He asserted that he was not in proper condition to serve the Lord in the most effective way unless he owned the fastest horses in the Northwest. Notwithstanding the preacher's eloquent plea for his horses, the committee appointed to investigate the case decided not to locate Mr. Stires, which is practically suspending him from the conference. The disciplined preacher owns some of the finest horses in the state. A report of the charge at Cherokee made the best showing of successful work of any in the district last year.

CHINESE OFFICIALS.

They Are Looking for an Interference From European Nations.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Advices from Shanghai to the London and China Telegraph state that the highest officials at Peking and at Nankin expect the European governments to combine in a demand for redress for outrages perpetrated upon foreigners in China. The same paper adds: The secret society men are also expecting such action upon the part of the powers, and they are preparing to act when the right moment arrives. Many young men of the best Chinese families are connected with these secret societies. A prominent foreign resident of Shanghai, the same paper states, has been asked to send estimates to Nankin for organizing troops to be disciplined and armed according to the English system.

TELLING AGE BY HAIR.

How to Find Out Exactly How Old the Lady Was—

If, perchance, at any time during the past week you have seen a man stealthily pull a hair from a horse's tail by the curbing, you may know he has the experimental stage of the latest neighborhood fad, says the Lewiston Journal. The idea is this: Suspend a gold ring from a piece of hair over a glass of cold water, and the ring will begin to swing to and fro until it hits the side of the glass. Furthermore, it will strike the exact age of the horse, or, if it be a person's hair, of the person upon whose head it grew.

Thursday was fat man's day, at the Portland exposition and a great many fat men were on hand, and each imagined that he was just a little more corpulent than all the rest, and that he was entitled to the fattest man's prize. The prizes were carried off by F. S. Hammond, of Albina, an employee on the Willamette Bridge Railway Company, who tipped the beam at 373 pounds. Mr. Hammond is but 25 years old and 6 feet high. The prize consisted of a fine overcoat. The second prize a handsome cane, was won by Joseph McKee, who tipped the beam at 362 pounds and is 5 feet 4 inches in height.

Large Exhibits at the World's Fair

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—England and Germany have each applied for about five acres of space in the world's fair buildings for their exhibits. The applications were made to-day by Sir Henry T. Wood and James Drege, representing the government of Great Britain, and by Herr Awerantz, a royal commissioner from Germany. The requests made by the foreign commissioners has staggered the world's fair officers. They expected England and Germany would be largely represented at the fair, but the thought never occurred to them that these two powers would ask for ten acres of space.

The Work of a Coward.

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 25.—Last night Ernest Lehman, aged 18, poisoned and killed his sweetheart, Annie Bush, aged 18. Lehman intended to commit suicide, but his courage failed. He has been very despondent of late. Last night when he called upon Annie, he was unusually gloomy. He procured a bottle of soda water, and unknown to the girl, mixed some paris green in it, which she drank. Lehman then drank some of the mixture, but not enough to kill him. He was arrested in Elizabeth this morning.

No Danger of a Silver Crisis.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The question of the possibility of a silver crisis in this country having been raised, according to a telegram by Statistician Robert Giffen, chief of the commercial department and comptroller of coin returns of the British board of trade, the views of New York's financial men have become of interest and importance. A reporter showed the dispatch to a number of prominent New York men, and they all said that there was no danger of a silver crisis.

Minister Egan to be Removed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25.—A Washington special says at the state department to-day it was virtually admitted that Minister Egan has been acting as Chilean correspondent for a New York newspaper and that he was being investigated. The intimation was that he would soon be superseded. It is said Blair is to succeed Egan as United States minister to Chili.
