How the Russian Government Keeps Up the Supply.
S. F. GRUNWALD, president of the Russian Seal Skin Company, which has a concession from the Russian government for taking all seal skins in and contiguous to Behring sea in a Russian territory, arrived from St. Petersburg yesterday. The concession was given last year, and continues for ten years. Last year over 60,000 skins were taken and this year it may be as heavy, though that is uncertain. All the skins will arrive on one vessel in a few days, and General Grunwald is here to receive them. They will be forwarded at once to London, where they will be sold by C. M. Lamson, and doubtless will be sold at a high price. "Our business is in a splendid condition," said Mr. Grunwald; "and I have no doubt they will remain so. The Russian government has a thorough expert, practical man, who remains on the ground, and whenever the seal is scarce they have been taken by simply orders that we close down, and this is done. The system is admirable and our seals will continue for years as plentiful as now; in fact, they will never be reduced."

Another Crank Predicts the End of the World in 1892.
Salem, Sept. 28.—Revivalist Hutchinson is creating quite an excitement here. He preaches that the end of the world will be in an hour, and says that after March 29, 1892, it will do no good to become a Christian, it will then be too late.

Several People Injured by the Upsetting of a Motor Car.
PORTLAND, Sept. 28.—A very serious accident occurred this afternoon on a branch of the Willamette Bridge Co. motor line. The car jumped the track at the corner of Fifth and P streets in East Portland. It is not known whether the accident was caused by the breaking of the rear axle. The car was thrown violently over on its side, and the windows completely shattered. There were thirteen passengers in the car at the time. Those who unfortunately were inside at the time of the occurrence, were severely bruised and cut by the falling glass. The injured were: Mrs. W. E. Jones, Mrs. Sprague, Miss Finger, and Conductor J. M. Hunter.

THE AMERICAN NAVY

What Will Be Asked For And Done the Coming Year.

A NUMBER OF TORPEDO BOATS
It will take \$10,000,000 to continue work on the new U. S. Navy.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—About \$10,000,000 is the sum the navy department will ask for in its annual estimate for continuing work on the new navy. This does not include anything for new vessels. It is simply the amount required for meeting payments under the existing contracts, which will be due during the fiscal year ending 1893. The secretary, it is understood, will especially advocate the construction of a number of fast torpedo boats and small light draft cruisers. It is considered desirable to continue the addition to the large ships, but he only can choose the navy department's decision will be in favor of small ships, such as are now most urgently needed for China and on the Pacific stations. Ships of the protected cruiser type that can go from one part of the Pacific to another on short notice to look after Mexican interests, and at the same time to be serviceable in paying off the enemy's commerce in the event of war.
