Does it effect results.

Being an off year for Oregon, we can look on at the campaigns being carried forward in the states east and form opinions even if we do not criticize. The speech making is going rapidly forward, and in many states much activity and enthusiasm are manifested.

It is a query however whether this speech making and canvassing effects the desired object. The St. Louis Globe-Democrat pertinently remarks that it is by no means certain that the services of the stump orators are of any advantage to their respective parties in the way of making votes. They tend to confirm existing opinions and to kindle the fire of enthusiasm, but there is nothing to show that they produce any material changes of sentiment. The speaker of the party rarely has an audience of the other party except in cases of joint discussions, and even then each party is apt to listen only to its own champion. There is little in the average campaign speech that appeals to the intelligence or conscience of the voter. As a general thing, it consists of arguments that are nine-tenths sophistry to one-tenth logic. The idea is not so much to cause reflection as to stimulate zeal and promote the interests of organizations and discipline. In politics as in war, the chances of success are always on the side of the best concentration of energy. The votes that count are only those that are cast, and so the point of first importance for a party is to so drill its forces that they will not fail to be at the polls on election day. That is the main purpose of the public meeting and the stump speech. The "boys," as they are familiarly called, must be inspired with the feeling that they cannot afford to stay at home under any circumstances but that the welfare of their party depends upon their personal fidelity. It is for this object principally that campaigns are organized and conducted.

It looks as though Russia had succeeded in quietly absorbing Persia. The latter country has consented to an arrangement by which she will be represented abroad by men selected by Russia. This virtually amounts to protectorate, and in a very short time we may hear of a crop of Persian officials whose names terminate in "off." They won't be of Russian birth, but Persians as thoroughly Russified and as devoted to the Czar as if they were his born subjects. This is the great advantage Russia possesses in the Orient. Her system of government and administration resembles that of the barbarian so nearly that she assimilates with perfect ease all Asiatic peoples. England conquers, but never absorbs. Still, on the whole, Great Britain has done more to promote civilization in the East than her chief competitor, for while she rules with a firm hand she has taught her conquered provinces something of Western order and justice which has come to be regarded by many of the conquered of more value than their sacrificed autonomy.

ROMANTIC MARRIAGES, when consummated in haste, usually end in grief. A Chicago girl who is now suing for a divorce has learned that fact. She met and married a man on board a tug boat not far out from San Francisco. The man proved to be a gambler who simply wanted her money, and now she is sincerely repenting her folly and asking to be relieved from the romantically formed union.

No matter how alarming may be the warning from the examples furnished by fatal endings of vicious habits, the average human being keeps right on in the same path. For instance a New York dispatch says that George Geisel, a giant, hungry-looking young fellow, 20 years old, was locked up in the insane pavilion attached to Bellevue Hospital to-day. For eight years he has been a cigarette fiend of the worst type. He has smoked on an average forty cigarettes a day, and sometimes he would smoke as many as sixty or seventy. Yet all the same the vile cigarette flourishes, and is eagerly sought after and used by perhaps a majority of male human beings.

WORLD'S FAIR excursion schemes, similar to those put in operation in many parts of this country, are beginning to be regarded with favor in England, especially in London. Toybnce Hall is organizing a tour, and the Regent Street Polytechnic School has arranged to take parties of 100 each for four-weeks' trip for 20 guineas to see the fair, and to visit Philadelphia, Washington, New York and Niagara Falls. Similar excursion parties are being organized in Mexico.

It is said that Tennyson, the English poet, has written an entirely new comedy for the stage, and that it will be put on in New York next winter, with Miss Rehan as principal lady. For Tennyson to attempt comedy at his time of life seems an extravagant attempt at old dogs learning new tricks, and the news monger who penned the item was trying to see to what extent he could stretch the truth.
