THE TAX ROLL SENT IN.

A School Teacher Goes to the Asylum.—Large Circuit Court: Docket in Marion. Cruelty to Animals.

SALEM, Oct. 9.—The two arrivals at the state penitentiary today were Ed Purcell, for four years, and Green Hays, for two years, from Yamhill county for horse stealing. These are the fellows who a week ago stole a horse and cart from J. C. Scott at Lafayette and arrested at Ashland by Marion county officers.

Grant county's assessment roll reached the secretary of state today. It shows a total taxable property of \$1,199,840. Number of polls 474. This is the second roll received this year.

Carrie A. Fee was brought to the asylum today from Penitentiary. She is the sister of Hon. James P. Fee and is 21 years old. She is a school teacher and is insane through hard study.

The circuit court of Marion county convenes in Salem Monday next and probably will be in session more than two weeks. The docket was completed today and consists of ninety cases.

Redfield, a junk dealer, was found guilty of cruelty to animals. He had nearly starved a team to death, one horse covered head to foot with sores. This animal he drove under a blanket so none could learn the condition of the animal.

Goodland, Kan., Oct. 9.—Frank Melbourne, the Australian rainmaker, closed his experimenting at this place today. To the surprise of citizens, whom he had been under contract to explain, he explained that the old nights counteracted all the work he did during the day, and that it was useless for him to experiment further. Since his experimenting began in northwestern Kansas has had more rain than has ever fallen here before, and all the people are satisfied with his explanation. At a mass meeting of citizens last night Melbourne was asked to submit a proposition to water the forty counties in western Kansas, and he offered to do it for 10 cents for each cultivated acre. There were this year 2,000,000 acres under cultivation in the counties which it is proposed to water.

Fell in Love in America. LONDON, Oct. 6.—Among the reminiscences of Parnell is a contribution from Thomas O'Connor, member of parliament for Liverpool, who says he heard that while in America, during the visit Parnell paid to the United States, the Irish leader met at Newport one of the reigning beauties of the season and that he fell in love and proposed marriage to her and was conditionally accepted. But either the girl was fickle or marriage with a foreigner hateful to her American parents, and she married another. Parnell felt this blow most acutely.

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LA GRANDE, Oct. 9.—Ward has just reached here of a daring robbery which was perpetrated upon the National bank of Enterprise, Wallawa county. On Wednesday afternoon Cashier Holmes was alone in the bank, when a man entered and said: "How much money has John Smith, of Portland, on deposit here?" Upon Mr. Holmes saying that no such man had any money there, the visitor pulled out a pistol and sticking it in his face, said: "You are a damned liar." By this time two confederates had come up on horseback, and while one, sitting on his horse, with a pistol in each hand, warned the people back, the other entered the bank, and pushed all the money on the counter, and the three then escaped to the mountains in the direction of Cornucopia. A posse was organized and sent in pursuit, but as the country is sparsely settled, their capture is doubtful. Four thousand dollars more was in the till under the counter and could have been had as well as not had the robbers taken time.
