Returned from the East.

An Interview With Hon. J. W. Cusick—The Political Horizon.

Hon. J. W. Cusick, accompanied by Mrs. Cusick and their little son Harry, returned yesterday morning from a two months visit in the East. They left on August 10, and went over the Northern Pacific to St. Paul, thence to Chicago, where they saw the World's Fair site and preparations for the big exposition. They spent several weeks in Illinois, and Iowa, where Mrs. Cusick's friends reside, and also visited friends in Kansas. The farmers Alliance in Kansas, Mr. Cusick says, is "busted." Good crops and prosperous times has caused farmers to let the alliance run itself, while they looked after crops and business interests, and this once flourishing organization has about died of neglect. "What is the political sentiment as to presidential candidates," was asked. "There is a strong feeling for Mr. Blaine throughout the East," he answered. "Leading republicans with whom I talked as a rule favored the nomination of the man from Maine, and it certainly looks now as if he would be the nominee. There is a friendly enough feeling for president Harrison, but the warm-hearted enthusiasm and deep sentiment that Mr. Blaine's name causes, and which shows the trend of public opinion to be for his nomination is lacking in Harrison's case. They came back via Salt Lake City, the home of the Mormons, and attended their services at the tabernacle. About four thousand Mormons were present to hear the first sermon of Joseph Smith since his return from abroad. He denounced polygamy and adultery. Mr. Cusick stated and preached a discourse very similar to a modern orthodox sermon. There is still a bitter feeling between the Mormons and Gentiles in Salt Lake, and probably will be until polygamy is entirely obliterated. Mr. Cusick and family returned via San Francisco. They had excellent health and enjoyed the trip immensely, although they were glad to get back to Oregon, which Mr. Cusick says is the best state of them all."

Sensational Will Case.

Papers have been filed in the Lane county probate court instituting a will case that will probably prove of a highly sensational character. The petition filed sets forth that Sarah Maxwell died in Lane county, Oregon, May 1, 1879, at the age of 65 years, and was a resident of said county, that at the time of her death she was the owner of property of the value of \$20,000; that prior to her death she legally bequeathed all of said property to her four grandchildren, Wm. and Edw. Maxwell, the late Edw. Maxwell, and Matilda Maxwell, share and share alike to each of them; that the will was never revoked or annulled and was made at the request and dictation of decedent by Joel Ware, and Fannie Brantner and Helen Eaton were the attesting witnesses all now living; that when the will was made it was left with John Maxwell, son of the decedent and father of Susie and Matilda Maxwell, and uncle of petitioner, for safe keeping at the request of decedent; that John Maxwell had executed the will and kept the contents thereof and its effects from the petitioners and legatees, who were at the time of the execution thereof very young, and now neglects and refuses to produce the will, and thereby and fraudulently alleges it to be lost. Able legal talent has been engaged on both sides, and the case will be hotly contested.

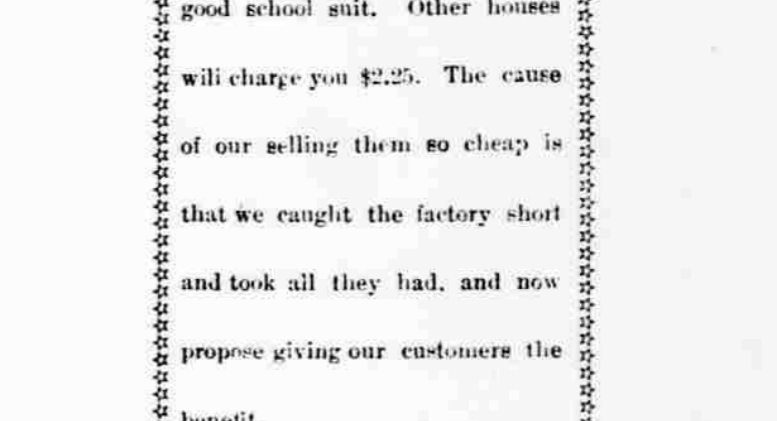
