Gold in Harney. Some fifty claims have been taken, and there are about one hundred men in the camp. Gold miners report the new find of rich gold, and predict it will become a lively camp.

THE CITY COUNCIL.

Its Session Last Evening Closed in Passing Ordinances.

Almost the entire session of the regular meeting of the city council last evening was taken up in reading and considering ordinances.

The committee on fire and water asked for and was granted further time in the matter of building latrines along the water front for the fire engine.

The committee on streets and public property reported favorably on recommendations made by the street commissioner at a previous meeting, and the report was adopted.

The petition of J. C. Powell and others for a sewer in block 1 was referred to committee on streets and public property and city surveyor with power to act.

Petition of E. W. Acheson and others for certain street improvements, was referred to the proper committee.

The committee on streets and public property reported favorably on the petition of B. Skinner and others for certain sidewalks, adopted.

The report of the referee in the matter of awarding damages to the Mountain View portable dam, caused by the opening of Washington street, was read and the sum of \$750 named. The report was adopted.

An ordinance to amend section 1, of ordinance No. 210, was read third time and passed.

Ordinance No. 235, in regard to the Albany lateral sewers was read third time and passed.

Ordinance No. 236, relating to the grade, depth and location of certain lateral sewers, was read third time and passed. This ordinance covers all the laterals connecting with the Maple street main sewer.

Ordinance No. 236, authorizing an appropriation to cover the expense of negotiating the loan of \$75,000 from L. Steinhart, was read third time and passed.

Ordinance No. 238 to appropriate out of the bridge fund \$750 to pay the purchase price of a perpetual right of way over certain lands, the property of the heirs of Walter Mendenhall for the purpose of erecting a high steel bridge from the northern terminus of Calapooia street across the Willamette river.

Resolution No. 28, embodying a report of the street commissioner for certain sidewalk improvements was read and adopted.

An electric light was ordered put in the rear of No. 2 engine house.

The committee on health and police were instructed to make a report at the next meeting of the council as to the purity of the water pumped into the city water mains by the Albany Water Company.

The city treasurer was ordered to file a supplemental bond of \$75,000.

The marshal was instructed to give legal notice to all property owners who have not connected with the sewers to do so at once.

The contract for building the lateral sewers across Maple street was let to Bays, Jeffrey & Co. at an average of \$1.35 per foot; work to be done by Jan. 1, 1892, and bond fixed at \$200.

"OREGON ON WHEELS."

The Advertising Car That Will Go Through the Eastern and Southern States.

"Oregon on Wheels," the car fitted up by the immigration board for a trip through the East and South to give the residents of those sections some idea of the fertility, wealth and resources of this glorious state, was opened Monday to the public in Portland, where it will be on exhibition for several days before leaving on its long journey.

A detailed description of the various articles in the car worthy of mention would occupy columns. The upper portion of the sides of the car and the roof are given up principally to grains and grasses, while inside of an iron railing which extends on each side of the alley through the car, shelves, arranged like stairs, contain the fruits, vegetables, etc.

In the center of the car on one side is the engine and dynamo for heating and lighting, opposite to which is a desk for the manager, where stood Secretary E. C. Masten, of the board of immigration, recording the contributions to the fund for maintaining the car presented by many as they passed.

At one side, near the door, stood Major Reed, manager of the car, clad in his uniform. On the shelves on one side were jars of preserved fruit and boxes of dried fruits in great variety and of extraordinary sizes and beauty.

On the opposite side are glass jars containing samples of all kinds of grains grown in the state, interspersed with fresh fruits. In the rear of the car, the smaller specimens being wired to the shelves in cabinets, and the larger on the shelves below. There are fine samples of all the ores found in the state—copper, iron, gold, quartz, marble, building stone, roofing slate, etc. Over these is a large photograph view of this city, the Portland, and other prominent buildings.

Opposite the display of minerals are the displays of a state fair green with envy. The display as a whole is one of which every Oregonian may feel proud, and which cannot fail to give a favorable impression among strangers.

The car is painted white outside, and has the word "Oregon" in large letters along on half of each side. On one side is a painting of Willamette falls, and a grain field. On the other side is a view of the mouth of the Columbia, the best harbor on the coast, the entrance having a depth of thirty feet. On one end is a view of Multnomah falls, and on the other of Cape Horn on the Columbia. In various appropriate places are painted such pictures as "no cyclones," "no blizzards," "the finest climate on the continent," "land of big red apples, glorious golden prunes and luscious berries," "no failure of crops since the settlement of the state," etc.
