The man who pulls up his hopvines in vexation at inadequate returns for one season is a speculator—and a speculator's fate awaits him.

In Pennsylvania hemlock tracts are much sought after, and it is in that state one of the most valuable woods. In Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota, where hemlock is only used through necessity for lumber, it is much despised. It is not supposed that hemlock will ever be used in Washington as lumber, for there is too much fir and spruce, that it will be utilized by the tanners is beyond question.

NOTES FROM BROWNVILLE.

Brownsville, Nov. 2.

Several new dwellings are in course of construction.

The Eagle Woolen Mills are running night and day and turning out some excellent goods.

Work on the new hotel is progressing nicely. It will be completed about the 1st of January.

They have handled at the flouring mills some 30,000 bushels of grain, making a fine article of flour.

The S. P. R. R., is ballasting the force along the road both above and below this place. They are doing some good work, and (stick a pin here) they are employing all white labor.

It is said a party came into Pillsbury's Bazaar recently and asked, "Have you Ben Hur?" Ben here, of course I have, I've been here ever since this Bazaar was painted red, and I'm here to stay, too.

Last Saturday night being Halloween the spirits were out in great shape. The barber shop bore the legend Lou Sing, washing and ironing. The prohibition grocery store had a saloon sign prominently by display, and the Red Front showed signs indicative of chickens and turkeys being bought and sold.

Joe Wolfe has returned from the Blue River mining district, and reports everything progressing finely at the front. These mines are located forty-five miles southeast of this place and were discovered four years ago. The Calapooia and Blue River Mill & Mining Co.'s mill, recently taken into the mines did not prove as successful as was anticipated. There has been no assays made this season.

A tunnel has been run in on the Poorman 330 feet, at a depth of 170 feet, to cut the main ledge diagonally. They started in on a spur and have struck a rich body of ore, larger in extent than the face of the tunnel, although they have as yet, not struck the main ledge. Work on the Poorman was commenced about eighteen months ago. There is no snow as yet to stop work although some has fallen. The company intend putting in a good mill next season and adding materially to their improvement. The main vein will in the course of a short time add materially to the wealth of the country, and to the fulness of the shareholders pocket books.

Peculiarities of the Law.

Salem Statesman: In Oregon, upon the death of a county clerk that office becomes immediately vacant, there being no one with authority to file a paper in a suit, issue a marriage license or transact any business of the office that requires a seal. All business to which a seal is not attached can, however, be done by the county judge. Immediately upon the death of Capt. Babcock, the county commissioners were summoned by telegraph and there will be a meeting of the county court to-day for the purpose of making an appointment to fill the vacancy. D. C. Sherman, assistant under Mr. Babcock, is prominently mentioned for the appointment. There are said to be several candidates.

STATE DISPATCHES

D. C. SHERMAN ELECTED CLERK OF MARION COUNTY.

To Fill the Vacancy Caused by the Death of F. J. Babcock—Notes From the Capital.

SALEM, Nov. 3.—Slowly Salem is acquiring an electric fire alarm system. To-day boxes were ordered at the state house, asylum and penitentiary.

This morning the county court appointed D. C. Sherman county clerk, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of F. J. Babcock. Sherman was deputy under Babcock.

The assessment roll of Lake county, received by the secretary of state to-day shows that the total amount of taxable property is \$1,414,055; number of polls 451.

James Maxwell, who killed his fellow sailor on the high seas 1,000 miles from Astoria, was released from the penitentiary to-day after serving 71 months for manslaughter.

Fourteen cents a pound has been paid for hops at Butteville and it is said fifteen cents has been offered and refused, at Aurora. Fourteen cents has been offered at Dallas.

R. Doty, P. F. Davis and W. B. Howley to-day incorporated Lorraine Hall, of Lorraine, Lane county.

The case of Elliott, appellant, vs. Oliver, respondent, involving the constitutionality of an act of legislature creating the office of recorder of conveyances for Union county was argued in the supreme court to-day. This is an important case as it effects the office of recorder in all the counties in the state except Multnomah. Oliver claims that the act creating such an office is unconstitutional.

NEWS OF THE COAST.

Interesting Items from Exchange Throughout the Northwest.

The Eugene Guard publishes this warning: "Look out for two tomb stone frauds who are taking Oregon mourners. Though professing to be strangers to each other they travel together and are in collusion to swindle the public. They are both attaches of an Eastern concern."

From W. N. Luckey, of Ashland, the following figures of fruit shipped from Phoenix and Ashland to the Eugene cannery are obtained: From Ashland—Peaches, 16,018 pounds; prunes, 23,688 pounds.

From Phoenix—151,638 pounds of apples, 34,961 pounds of prunes 5679 pounds of pears. Total amount of fruit from the two shipping points, 231,040 pounds net.

A prominent sporting man of Baker City received an anonymous letter through the postoffice on the 24th inst., containing the modest demand that unless he placed \$2500 in the First National bank to the credit of a friend of the person whose name was given in the letter, he would be killed. This Mafia scheme did not work, for the man did not deposit any money and is still alive.

Jerry Mott, of Roseburg, a fireman on the Southern Pacific railroad, has been placed under bonds for threatening the life of a widow of Drain. Mott has a wife and two children, but has been paying attention to the daughter of this widow, who ordered him out of the house, whereupon he threatened to kill her. Mrs. Mott has already consulted an attorney with a view to entering an action for divorce.
